## A tragic loss

India has lost a capable and experienced military leader in the tragic death of the country's first Chief of Defence Staff (CDS), General Bipin Rawat, in a helicopter crash near Coonoor in the Nilgiris on Wednesday. His wife, Madhulika, and 11 others also perished when the Indian Air Force's Mi-17V5 helicopter came down in a heavily wooded area. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh has announced in Parliament that a tri-service inquiry, headed by Air Marshal Manvendra Singh, Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief, Training Command, of the IAF, will take place into the incident. The IAF chief, Air Chief Marshal V.R. Chaudhari, has already visited the crash site; the cockpit voice and flight data recorders have been recovered, which would give investigators insights into how the crash occurred. It is imperative that the inquiry be done both thoroughly and speedily. Without speculating on the cause, it needs to be stressed that speedy course corrections in training or hardware are imperative given that these Mi-17VF choppers are being used to ferry top military leaders across the length and breadth of the country.

Gen. Rawat had not even completed two years as CDS when the Coonoor tragedy happened. After completing his tenure as Army Chief on December 31, 2019, he slipped into his new role as CDS the very next day. Many of his plans to give India genuine tri-service operational capabilities are still to be realised. In such a situation, the Government should not lose time in appointing his successor to ensure that the plans on the drawing board do not suffer. An aggressive China and a still belligerent Pakistan define India's security challenges. The situation along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) continues to be tense with Indian and Chinese troops staring down each other. Gen. Rawat, known to have been proximate to the ruling establishment, had never minced words while speaking about the challenges facing the country and had waded into political controversies. Though the concept of having a CDS was recommended by a Group of Ministers in 2000 after the Kargil war, it took another 20 years for one to be appointed. The CDS, who functions as Principal Military Adviser to the Defence Minister, is expected to work in tandem with the three service chiefs who continue to operate in their respective domains — a role and function that is still in the making. To ensure that the new CDS and the service chiefs function as a team, the Government would do well to keep in mind the principle of seniority while choosing Gen. Rawat's successor.

## Sundance Film Festival Unveils Lineup for Hybrid 2022 Edition

The Sundance Film Festival is returning to the Utah mountains in January armed with documentaries about Bill Cosby, Princess Diana, Kanye West and Lucille Ball and the directorial debuts of Eva Longoria, Tig Notaro and Jesse Eisenberg.

Festival organizers unveiled the lineup for the 2022 edition on Thursday, which includes 82 feature-length films culled from over 3,700 submissions.

"This year's program reflects the unsettling and uncertain times we've been living in for the past year and a half," said Kim Yutani, Sundance's director of programming.

As in years past, the festival boasts a robust documentary lineup, including "We Need to Talk About Cosby," in which director W. Kamau Bell attempts to examine the art and artist question as it applies to the actor/ comedian, who spent time in prison before his sexual assault conviction was overturned.

Festival director Tabitha Jackson says the Cosbydocis, "A real cultural analysis of what happened."

"Lucy and Desi," which marks Amy Poehler's documentary debut, and "The Princess" from director Ed Perkins are also in the lineup.

Directors Clarence "Coodie" Simmons and Chike Ozah also have "jeenyuhs: A Kanye Trilogy," chronicling 21 years of Kanye West with never-before-seen footage, and Kathryn Ferguson charts the career of SinéadO'Connor in "Nothing Compares."

The documentaries also go beyond the big names and biopics. Director Ramin Bahrani will debut his film "2nd Chance," about the bankrupt pizzeria owner who invented the modern bulletproof vest, and Rory Kennedy has "Downfall: The Case Against Boeing," which looks at the two Boeing 737 MAX crashes and the aftermath. Others look at the last ship carrying enslaved Africans to the U.S. ("Descendant"), the U.S. maternal health crisis ("Aftershock"), TikTok ("TikTok, Boom") and midwives in Myanmar ("Midwives").

Lena Dunham goes behind the camera once more with



"Sharp Stick," about a 26year-old who begins an affair with her older boss, Michel Hazanavicius will premiere his zombie comedy, "Final Cut," and Riley Stearns will debut "Dual," starring Karen Gillan as a woman who attempts to clone herself after a terminal diagnosis.

There are some notable debuts, like "AM I OK?" a film about female friends directed by Tig Notaro and Stephanie Allynne and starring Dakota Johnson and Sonoya Mizuno. Eva Longoria directs a rivalry between boxers Oscar De La Hoya and Julio César Chávez, and Jesse Eisenberg has "When You Finish Saving the World," starringJulianne Moore and Finn Wolfhard as mother son. "Carol" screenwriter Phyllis Nagy has also written and directed "Call Jane," about abortions in the late 1960s. Itstars Elizabeth Banks and Sigourney Weaver.

The U.S. dramatic competition slate, which has launched films like "CODA," "Passing" and "Minari," includes one of Michael Kenneth Williams' final projects, "892," starring John Boyega as a desperate veteran who is on the brink of homelessness.

Aftergoing largely virtual in 2021, organizers are planning to return to an inperson festival in Park City, Utah, with some satellite screenings at regional theaters across the U.S. during the second weekend and virtual options as well. Earlier this year, the festival announced that all attendees, from filmmakers to ticket buyers and volunteers, would be required to have received the COVID-19 vaccine.

"We're excited to return to our homein Utah, but also to come together in new ways," Jackson said. "Building on documentary about the our experience last year, we've discovered new possibilities of convergence, and we embrace the fact that we are now an expanded community in which active participation matters, and audience presence — however it manifests — is essential to our mission."



# Democracies Should Shape Social Media, Cryptocurrencies, Says PM Modi

New Delhi, Dec. 10: Democracies should jointly deal with social media and crypto currencies, said Prime Minister Narendra Modi in his Official Intervention at the Summit for Democracy convened by U.S. President Joe Biden.

Speaking on the occasion, Mr Modi said India is the largest democracy in the world which has 2,500-year-old democratic traditions and proposed to share India's democratic experience through digital solutions.

"We must also jointly shape global norms for emerging technologies like social media and crypto-currencies, so that they are used to empower democracy, not to undermine it," said Mr. Modi in his Official Intervention. The Summit for Democracy was convened by President Biden to strengthen democracy around the world.

Opening the summit on Thursday, President Biden announced the establishment of the Presidential Initiative for Democratic Renewal that will provide foreign assistance initiatives.

The initiative will be poweredby \$424.4 million and will be aimed to support free media, fight corruption, strengthen democratic reforms, for use of technology for democracy and for defence of free and fair elections. Mr Modi said democracy has



taken various shapes across the world and that there is a need to work on the democratic practices and symptoms adding, "Different parts of the world have followed different paths of democratic development. There is much we can learn from each other. We all need to constantly improve our democratic practices and systems. And, we all need to continuously enhance inclusion, transparency, human responsive dignity, grievance redressal and decentralisation

Mr Modi referred to the civilisational tradition of democracy in India citing the ancient city states under the Lichhavis and other people that flourished in India during the late Vedic and Buddhist

period and continued to the early medieval period. He said democratic traditions had made ancient India the "most prosperous".

"Centuries of colonial rule could not suppress the democratic spirit of the Indian people. It again found full expression with India's independence and led to an unparalleled story in democratic nation building over the last 75 years," said Mr Modi.

Prime Minister Modi said India would be happy to share "expertise" in organising "free and fair elections" and in increasing "transparency in all areas of governance through innovative digital solutions".

"Democracy is not only of the people, by the people, for the people but also with the people, within the people," said Mr Modi.

# SC Says Scribes Should not Suffer for Reporting on What is Already in Public Domain

New Delhi, Dec. 10: The Supreme Court in an order has said that "State force" should not be used to "browbeat a political opinion" and journalists should not be made to suffer the consequences of reporting on what is already in the public domain.

The court observed that the political class across the country should introspect on the "debasement" in dialogue which was taking place.

"State force should never be used to either browbeat a political opinion or journalists suffer the consequences of what is already in public domain," a Bench led by Justice Sanjay Kishan Kaul stated in an order.

The court hastened to add that "this does not take away the responsibility of journalists in how they report matters, more so in a "Twitter age".

The court order said it could not "let go off the opportunity of saying something which is troubling society and the court. It is undoubtedly the

debasement in the dialogue which is taking place which needs introspection from the political class across the country".

It noted, "In a country which prides itself on its diversity, there are bound to be different perceptions and opinions which would include political opinions. That is the very essence of a democracy".

The Bench stressed that political exchanges may get heated, but should not explode. "No doubt by the very nature of the job required to be performed by the political class, at times their exchanges may get heated. But it should not explode. We are sure difference in perceptions can be expressed in better language."

Quashing of FIRs

The order came after West Bengal informed the court that it had no objection to the quashing of FIRs registered on the



basis of reports in 'OpIndia' portal.

'OpIndia' editor Nupur Sharma and other petitioners had moved the court, saying the FIRs amounted to an abuse of law and suppression of Press free dom.

Quashing the FIRs, the court said that what the petitioners had done was to "reproduce what the political class has stated against each other and which is already in public domain". West Bengal's stand to not proceed with the FIRs was "better late than never and should be a model for others to follow".

# Vaccination Drive in A&N Islands

Port Blair, Dec. 10: Atotal of 5,72,860 beneficiaries have been vaccinated so far in A&N Islands, out of the target beneficiaries of 2,81,603 (approx.). A total of 1,76,631 eligible people in the age group of 18 to 44 years have been vaccinated till date. A total of 3101 people were vaccinated today in A&N Islands.

2945 beneficiaries were vaccinated in South Andaman District, out of which54 beneficiaries were in the age group of 18-44 years. Similarly, 134 beneficiaries were vaccinated in North & Middle Andaman District out of which 5 beneficiaries were in the age group of 18-44. 22 beneficiaries were vaccinated in Nicobar District.

Brisbane, Dec. 10: Joe Root and Dawid Malan put on a defiant unbeaten partnership of 159 to give England hope of salvaging a draw in the opening Ashes Test at the Gabba on Friday.

A rejuvenated England was 220 for two at close of play, with skipper Root on 86 and Malan 80, only 58 runs behind Australia.

Root's year!

After England lost both openers in the session before tea, Root and Malan looked increasingly comfortable on the third-day Gabba pitch as they steadily wore down the Australian attack.

Root's classy 86 not out is one short of his highest score in Australia and took him past 1,500 runs in a calendar year, the most everby an Englishman, surpassing Michael Vaughan's 1,481 in 2002.

Leading by example, the skipper barely offered a chance in his innings, stroking 10 boundaries including a sublime reversesweep off spinner Nathan Lyon.

The South Africa-born Malan scored his only Test century on the last tour of Australia and although not as comfortable as his captain, he also looked in control.

He did struggle with fatigue towards the close, however, and went down with cramps. Earlier, Travis Head scored a

superb 152 to put Australia in what seemed a commanding position.

Australia was dismissed for 425, 30 minutes before lunch, a

Rory Burns, who was out first ball of the series on Wednesday when clean-bowled by Mitchell Starc, was lucky to survive the dreaded pair when he was adjudged leg-before off Starc's sixth ball of the first over.

But, replays showed the ball was just missing the top of middle stump, and a relieved Burns survived.

But he didn't last long after lunch and gloved to wicketkeeper Alex Carey off Australia captain Pat Cummins.

Haseeb Hameed looked in great touch and eased to 27, but he tried to glance a wide ball from Starc, only to get a faint touch to Carey.

Work to be done

Malan knows that plenty more work lies ahead despite England's improved showing.

"To come here today and do what we did after a day and half of hard fielding is fantastic, but that's only half the job." he said.

"We need another 250-300 runs on Saturday to put ourselves in a good position."

Review plans

Labuschagne said the hosts needed to hold their nerve.

"Test cricket is a grind, it's meant to be hard otherwise it wouldn't mean so much," he said.

"For us it's a day at the office. We'll review our plans and how we bowled today, and come up with some ideas and get those last eight wickets."

# World Chess Championship: Magnus Carlsen Wins Fifth Title with Three Games to Spare

As anticipated, Magnus Carlsen ended Ian Nepomniachtchi's agony with three games to spare after winning the 11th game of their best-of-14 game World chess championship match in Dubai on Friday.

Carlsen punished Nepo's blunder, committed on the 23rd move, with a tactical plan and eventually finished the job in 49 moves. The champion's fourth victory — second with black — left the final score reading 7.5-3.5.

This was the fourth time Carlsen defended the world title he first won from Viswanathan Anand in 2013. He overcame the challenges of Anand (2014), Sergey Karjakin (2016) and Fabiano Caruana (2018) before destroying Nepo.

After five drawn games, Carlsen pulled off a 136-move victory in the sixth. Thereafter, it was clear that Nepo was not the same. He committed one pawn-move



blunder three times in the next five games and the result was a premature end to the match.

"I'm relieved, of course. It's hard to feel that great joy when the situation was so comfortable to begin with, but I'm happy with a very good performance overall," was Carlsen's initial reaction after winning his fifth world title.


"I didn't expect it to go quite like this," said Carlsen during the postmatch media conference and continued, "I think it was just a very good professional performance overall. No regrets at all, just very

"I guess it's the most similar to my first match with Anand (in 2013), which was quite even and nervous at the start, When I got my first win, it was kind of the same story: it was relatively clean from there on out."

On Friday, after Nepo employed the Italian opening, the game progressed on expected lines. Once Nepo erred on the 23rd turn, Carlsen took just 79 seconds to spot the precise continuation. He immediately traded his rook for a knight and took it back by force following the exchange of queens. He reached a rook-and-pawn ending with an extra pawn. Carlsen sacrificed the rook to 'queen' his pawn and then forced the resignation, four moves later.

On his part Nepo said, "In my career llost quite some stupid games but not as many in such a (short) time".
