

Leading from the Front

The Government's summit for developing nations, called the "Voice of the Global South Summit", as its first big leadership-level G20 event, is an extremely important signal. It is also a departure from New Delhi's looking towards the "high-table" of global leadership, involving its relationship with the UNSC P5 and G-7 (the most developed economies), to focusing on a more just view of the world and how the developing world is being affected by global inequities. In his opening remarks at the virtual summit, Prime Minister Narendra Modi explained the reasons for the shift: how "challenges of the COVID pandemic, rising prices of fuel, fertilizer and foodgrains, and increasing geopolitical tensions have impacted our development efforts". External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar too spoke of India's need to envision a common future with the Global South and acknowledge India's "common past" with the Global South, many of whom have suffered colonialism. Over 10 different sessions, India and representatives of 125 countries, of the 134 that make up the G-77, agreed that the key issues include the fragmentation of the international landscape, shortages in grain exports, oil and gas, and fertilizer as a result of the Ukraine war, and terrorism. Of note was Mr. Modi's push for "human centred" globalisation countering the "first world's" view of expediting climate change goals at the cost of development, ensuring immigration and work mobility for skilled populations of the global south, and resilient renewable energy access. The summit appears to mark a reset in India's foreign policy outlook in its year as G20 president: one which has made the Government reclaim the true meaning of non-alignment, in the wake of the Ukraine war where it refused to take sides. Minister of State for External Affairs Meenakshi Lekhi's visit to Cuba as it took over G77 chairpersonship (a grouping India has shunned) and the invitation to the President of Egypt, a NAM co-founder, as Republic Day chief guest were significant too.

Of note were some of the summit's exclusions: Pakistan and Afghanistan. Of note too was the inclusion of Myanmar, whose junta regime has not been recognised but with which India has chosen to forge closer ties. It is hoped that the collective South-South understanding of global issues will lead to a more inclusive meeting at the summit level, particularly with reference to South Asian and the subcontinent's regional problems. It is also of note that the grouping did not release a common or joint statement, and much of the narrative on outcomes is built on what Mr. Modi and Mr. Jaishankar said. For India to be heard as the 'Voice of the Global South at the G20', it must reflect on the aspirations of the other nations and amplify them, as a true leader of the developing world at the G20 summit later this year.

"But much to my surprise the results were announced around 7 AM. 'What!' I said. I was thrilled to bits," recalls Rahul, adding that his mobile phone has been ringing incessantly since then.

Composer MM Keeravani won the Golden Globe award for Best Original Composition for the Naatu Naatu song from the film RRR recently. The song was shot on Ram Charan and Jr NTR. Rahul, who sang the song along with Kalabhairava (Keeravani's son), describes winning the Golden Globe as the "best moment in life."

"I never expected the award! I don't know how many times it happens, but to see the song I crooned winning a Golden Globe is my greatest achievement. It was beyond words. I haven't won any major award so far, but getting the Golden Globe is incredible," says Rahul with a big smile.

Once in 50,000-Year Comet may be Visible to the Naked Eye

January 17: PAR IS: A newly discovered comet could be visible to the naked eye as it shoots past Earth and the Sun in the coming weeks for the first time in 50,000 years, astronomers have said.

The comet is called C/2022 E3 (ZTF) after the Zwicky Transient Facility, which first spotted it passing Jupiter in March last year.

After travelling from the icy reaches of our Solar System it will come closest to the Sun on January 12 and pass nearest to Earth on February 1.

It will be easy to spot with a good pair of binoculars and likely even with the naked eye, provided the sky is not too illuminated by city lights or the Moon.

The comet "will be brightest when it is closest to the Earth", Thomas Prince, a physics professor at the California Institute of Technology who works at the Zwicky Transient Facility, told AFP.

Made of ice and dust and emitting a greenish aura, the comet is estimated to have a diameter of around a kilometre, said Nicolas Biver, an astrophysicist at the Paris Observatory.

That makes it significantly smaller than NEOWISE, the last comet visible with an unaided eye, which passed Earth in March 2020, and Hale-Bopp, which swept by in 1997 with a potentially life-ending diameter of around 60 kilometres. But the newest visit will come closer to Earth, which "may make up for the fact that it is not very big", Biver said. While the comet will be brightest as it passes Earth in early February, a fuller moon could make spotting it difficult.

For the Northern Hemisphere, Biver suggested the last week of January, when the comet passes between the Ursa Minor and Ursa Major constellations.

The new moon during the weekend of January 21-22 offers a good chance for stargazers, he said.

"We could also get a nice surprise and the object could be twice as bright as expected," Biver added.

Prince said another opportunity to locate the comet in the sky will come on February 10, when it passes close to Mars.'Rare visitor'The comet has spent most of its life "at least 2,500 times more distant than the Earth is from the Sun", Prince said.

Biver said the comet was believed to have come from the Oort Cloud, a theorised vast sphere surrounding the Solar System that is home to mysterious icy objects.

The last time the comet passed Earth was during the Upper Paleolithic period, when Neanderthals still roamed Earth.Prince said the comet's next visit to the inner Solar System was expected in another 50,000 years.

But Biver said there was a possibility that after this visit the comet will be "permanently ejected from the Solar System". Among those closely watching will be the James Webb Space Telescope. However, it will not take images, instead studying the comet's composition, Biver

The closer the comet is to Earth, the easier it is for telescopes to measure its composition "as the Sun boils off its outer layers", Prince said.

This "rare visitor" will give "us information about the inhabitants of our Solar system well beyond the most distant planets", he added.



Viacom 18 Win Media Rights for Women's Indian Premier League for Rs 951 Crores

January 17: Viacom18 Media Private Limited has bagged the media rights for Women's Indian Premier League (WIPL) for Rs 951 crores for the period of 2023-2027. It means the cricket board will earn Rs 7.09 crores per WIPL game, which is likely to be held in March. The BCCI will share 80 per cent from the revenue pool among five franchises in the first five years.

It is learnt that two companies wanted more time to bid but the Indian board turned down their request. BCCI secretary Jay Shah in a statement said he was thrilled to have such an encouraging response for a league that will revolutionise women's cricket not just in India but across the globe.

"This is a commitment I had made to the Board and our women cricketers and today we have taken one big leap. The broadcasters play a key role in taking the game to a wider audience and their active interest in the league is a clear indication that the Women's Indian Premier League is headed in the right direction," Shah said in its

"BCCI shall pay the franchisees 80% share of Central Rights income in the first five years, 60% in next five years and 50 per cent post that," the statement read.

As per Shah after pay equity already done by the Indian board, the media rights deal has been a decisive step for empowerment of women's cricket in India, which willensure participation of women from all ages.

The pay scale change meant, Indian women cricketers now receive Rs 15 lakh per Test, Rs 6 lakh per ODI, and Rs 3 lakh per



T20I, the same as their male counterparts. Earlier, the women players received Rs 1 lakh each for ODIs and T20Is while the match fee for a Test match was Rs 4 lakh.

Diana Edulji, former India player and BCCI administrator, was pleased with the development.

"Now women cricketers will bring revenue to Indian cricket. Earlier everyone felt that only men generate revenue. The media rights showed today that people want to see women's cricket. They needed the opportunity and support from all stakeholders,"

"Since 2017, women's matches which are telecasted have received great response. Everyone is watching them closely and have been following them too. I feel there has been great improvement in the quality of cricket they play; it has attracted people. The India vs Australia game in Mumbai had a packed stadium, so interest is definitely there for women's cricket.

With Women's IPL we will get more talent and more exposure

these girls will gain. With under 19 World Cup on now, we can see more talent coming in. There will be great competition ahead in women's cricket."

The WIPL's first season is likely to be held in Mumbai and the BCCI will be having five teams this season. Many current franchises have shown interest in having an WIPL team and have submitted their bids to the Indian board. The new teams will be announced on January 25.

The BCCI was hopeful of attracting high bids after the way crowds turned out to watch India vs Australia women's home series in Mumbai last month. "Women's cricket has been on the up since a few years and the recently concluded bilateral series against Australia is a great testament to how popular women's cricket has become in India. It was only apt to get our own women's T20 league and give the fans more of women's cricket," BCCI president Roger Binny said



'I Didn't Get the Freedom of Virender Sehwag, Whatever he Got in his Life, I Didn't': Murali Vijay

January 17: India opener Murali Vijay, the highest run scorer for the visitors in the 2014 Test series in England, has revealed what it was like to play alongside Virender Sehwag and how it impacted his career.

"Consciously, I didn't get the freedom of Virender Sehwag to be honest. Whatever Sehwag got in his life, I didn't. If I could have got that kind of backing and open-spreaded talks, I could have also tried," the 38-year-old batter told Sportstar. "The honest thing is the team's backing and how you can contribute to the

team at an international level. It's a high-level competition and you don't have many chances to experiment in different ways," Vijay added.

Speaking on playing with legendary opener Virender Sehwag, Vijay said, "When Sehwag was there, I felt controlling my instincts and playing was hard but to see him go through that kind of freedom was something spectacular."

"Only he could have done that. Nobody else I feel could have played like Sehwag. What he did for Indian cricket was amazing. Different... he is something else which I have seen visually. I had the privilege to interact with him. It was so simple. He kept his mantra so simple – See the ball and hit. He was in that mode; singing songs to 145-150 kph bowlers. You are experiencing something else. It's not normal," he further added.

Vijay last featured in a Test for India in December 2018 during the tour of Australia. In his 61 Test career for India, he scored 3982 runs averaging 38.29. This included 12 centuries and 15 fifties.
