Success is not an activity but a process ...

#### The First of the Four

Popularly known as the 'Happy Slam', the Australian Open has been anything but in recent times. Unprecedented bushfires, COVID-19 lockdown restrictions and Novak Djokovic's unsavoury deportation over his unvaccinated status marred the competition in each of the previous three years. But come Monday, as the 2023 edition of the tournament gets underway, the season's first Major looks set to regain its freespiritedness. So unshackled is the atmosphere that even COVID-positive players can compete, a far cry from the happenings of the last two years. It is expected that the on-court action would march in step, despite the absence of the now-retired duo of Roger Federer and Ash Barty, two-time Australian Open women's singles champion Naomi Osaka, and the reigning men's World No. 1 Carlos Alcaraz. Djokovic's mere presence makes him the automatic favourite, for Melbourne is to him what Paris is to Rafael Nadal. The Serb has won the event nine times, an Open Era record, and was undefeated in his last 21 matches at the site. He has also warmed up well by securing the tune-up in Adelaide after saving a match-point in the final against Sebastian Korda. Nadal — the top seed, defending champion and a men's record 22-time Major winner — looks underprepared, but as the Spaniard proved in 2022, he is not one to be discounted.

Among women, all eyes will be on World No.1 and three-time Grand Slam champion Iga Swiatek. A disappointing loss to Jessica Pegula in the United Cup and a right shoulder injury may have affected her preparations, but the Pole is still the player to beat. Second seed Ons Jabeur, who has emerged as a solid all-court threat, will look for her maiden Slam title after finishing as runner-up at the Wimbledon and US Open last year. The championship will also be an opportunity for the next rung of players to stake claim as the stranglehold of the 'Big Three' (Federer, Nadal and Djokovic) will only loosen going forward and the women's game has already moved into the post-Barty, post-Serena Williams era. Daniil Medvedev, the 2021 US Open champion and a two-time finalist in Australia; Casper Ruud, runner-up at two of the four Majors in 2022; Stefanos Tsitsipas; and Felix Auger-Aliassime will all want to come good. So will the in-form American Pegula, also the third seed; Frenchwoman Caroline Garcia; Belarus's Aryna Sabalenka; and the continuously rising Coco Gauff.

## **PIO Student Gets** Scholarship for Research in Water Treatment **Using Membrane Tech**



January 16: New York: An Indian-American PhD student has received a fellowship from the American Membrane Technology Association (AMTA) and the US Bureau of Reclamation for undertaking cuttingedge and innovative research in the field of advanced treatment of alternative water supplies.

Harsh Patel, a Chemical Engineering PhD student and Graduate Research Assistant at the University of Michigan was named among the four recipients of the USD 11,750 fellowship, said the AMTA statement.

Patel's research looks at establishing novel low water content membranes capable of selectively removing targeted ions to meet rising water and energy demands, it said.

Innovations in membrane technology have significant potential to reduce the cost, energy, and environmental impact of advanced treatment of recycling wastewater and seawater that would offer clean, safe, abundant, and cost-effective water supplies in arid areas.

"I am extremely pleased to have received this honour knowing that successful work in this area will have direct implications on global problems like water scarcity," said Patel.

Patel did his Bachelor's in Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology in 2021 and is currently associated with Michigan's Kamcev Lab which aims to develop nextgeneration polymeric materials for water treatment and energy generation and storage applications.

Patel is set to attend the 2023 Membrane Technology Conference and Exposition to share his research through a podium presentation or poster in Knoxville in February.

The AMTA and Reclamation Fellowships together award four scholarships each year to support graduate students who are pursuing a full-time Master's degree or a PhD student conducting research in the advancements needed to pursue innovation in membrane technologies.

#### Tourism Department Imposes **Guide Fee for Tourists Visiting** Natural Bridge at Laxmanpur-II

Port Blair, Jan. 16: It has visitors/tourists with Do's & come to the notice of the Tourism Department that some tourists while on visit to the Natural Bridge at Laxmanpur-II, Shaheed Dweep walk on corals and protected marine biodiversity due to lack of information and knowledge. The coral reef & coastal ecosystem is fragile in nature and therefore, it needs to be protected & conserved.

In view of this, it has been decided by the Tourism Department of A&N Administration henceforth, tourists visiting Bridge Natural Laxmanpur-II should compulsorily take the services of Certified Tourist Guide, to properly guide

Don'ts etc. This step has been initiated to conserve and protect the fragile ecosystem of this unique terrain.

The visiting tourists/visitors/ general public have been requested to abide by the instructions/directions of the authorities and co-operate and also be part of the conservation of marine ecosystem.

The prescribed fee for Certified Tourists Guides for visiting Natural Bridge, Laxmanpur-II, Shaheed Dweep are as under:-

No. of Tourists 1-10: Rs 500/-(1/2 an hour) Point 1

No. of Tourists 1-10: Rs 1000/-(1 hour) Point 2

No. of Tourists 1-10: Rs 1 500/ - (1 ½ hourto 2 hours) Point 3

## Mumbai Marathon: Course Records Shattered as Ethiopia's Hayle Lemi and Anchalem **Haymanot Make Most of Cool Weather**

January 16: Records tumbled at the Mumbai Marathon on Sunday, fueled by the city seeing it's coldest day this season so far.

Ethiopia's Hayle Lemi bettered the elite men's course record by more than 30 seconds, comfortably finishing the race in 2:07:32 to better the record of 2:08:09 set in 2020 by Derara Hurisa. Lemi's compatriot Anchalem Haymanot finished the race in 2:24:15 to better Kenyan Valentine Kipketer's record of 2:24:33 set in 2013.

Lemi and Anchalem took home prize money of \$45,000 as well as a course record bonus of \$15,000 each.Kenyan Philemon Rono finished behind Lemi with a timing of 02:08:44, followed by Hailu Zewdu, who clocked 2:10:23.Rahma Tusa and Letebrhan Haylay completed an Ethiopian sweep in the women's event with timings of 2:24:22 and 2:24:52 respectively.

While the cooler temperatures played a massive part in the records being broken, 10 of the men's elite runners have better personal bests than the previous record.

The temperature in South Mumbai, where the racewas held, saw temperatures of 16.2 degrees Celcius while the temperature in Santacruz — near the end of the Bandra-World Sea link – went as low as 13 degrees.

Winner of the 2016 Boston Marathon, Lemi, whose personal best is 2:04:33, said he could've gone for a time of two hours and five minutes but since it was his first time running in Mumbai, he was warned by his compatriots



who've run the race before about the weather becoming slightly unbearable in the latter stages of the race. He was also warned about the difficult uphill route (Peddar road flyover) post the 32km mark.Lemi, with a hint of regret, said that had he not listened to those warnings, he could've run a better race as they didn't affect him anyway. "The weather was great. It didn't get hot like I was told it would. The uphill was also not difficult. In fact, I didn't know that uphill was the difficult part and I thought maybe it was further in the race so I was conserving my energy. I think I could have finished at least two minutes earlier than I did," Lemi said at the post-race press conference, adding that he was actually surprised he was able to win as he hadn't a i n e d completely.AdvertisementItwas a dream debut for Anchalem in the women's elite race who kept pleading with her pacer to push harder throughout the race.

"This was my first marathon and I won gold. I was nervous regarding the weather and the

conditions. Before the start, I didn't tell myself that I have any hope of winning as the women's field was very strong but I just stuck to the basics. My whole body was feeling good in the endso I went for the win,"

Opposite stylesThe elite men and women began their respective races with completely different strategies. While the women pushed from the start and slowed down towards the end, the men's race began relatively slowlyand it was only after the 25km mark that they actually began upping their pace.

After breaking from the rest of the group post the 26km mark, Lemi, Rono and Zewdu climbed Peddar Road together. Seeing that his opponents were struggling to keep up with him, he pushed even more to take a comfortable lead on Marine Drive.In the women's race, there were as many as five runners in the lead pack at the midway stage before 2019 champion Worknesh Alemu took the sole lead. She however couldn't match the drive of Anchalem and Tusa who kept pushing each other till the end.

## Virat Kohli Gets to his 74th International Century in 3rd ODI Against Sri Lanka

January 16: Virat Kohlibrought up his 46th ODI century against Sri Lanka in Greenfield International Stadium on Sunday. Kohli is now just four ODI centuries away from breakingSachin Tendulkar's record for most hundreds in the format. Kohli has 46 ODI centuries, whereas Tendulkar has scored 49 ODI hundreds in his career. This was also his 74th hundred in international cricket. He took 10 fours and 1 six to reach his latest ton. He also broke

Tendulkar's record for most centuries at home with 21 hundreds to his name at home now.

Kohli also broke into the list of top 5 batters to have the most ODI runs in history, leapfrogging Sri Lanka's Mahela Jayawardene. He is now only behind Tendulkar, Kumar Sangakkara, Ricky Ponting and Sanath Jayasuriya in the elite list. Kohli had ended his ODI century drought during India's tour of Bangladesh in the fagend of last year. The number 3 batter had remained century-less for 1214 days.Kohli will likely break more ODI records as India has a packed ODI calendar in the 10month window in the build-up to the World Cup in October-November.

Earlier, India skipper Rohit Sharma won the toss and elected to bat against Sri Lanka in the third ODI on Sunday. India made two changes as Hardik Pandya and Umran Malik made way for Suryakumar Yadav and Washington Sundar in the playing XI.


