New Delhi, Dec 13: The on Friday included a Central Board of Secondary Education has expressed "regret" for including a misogynistic reading comprehension exercise in its Class 10 English examination, and vowed to review its paper setting processes.

Soon after the issue was raised in the Lok Sabha by Congress president Sonia Gandhi on Monday, followed by a walkout by Opposition MPs, the CBSE said the question would be dropped and all students granted full marks for that

passage which appeared to blamea "feminist revolt" for indiscipline teenagers, stating that the "emancipation of the wife destroyed the parents' authority over the children, contrasting it to the past when wives obeyed their husbands and "children and servants were taught to know their place". Students, parents and politicians had expressed outrage over the passage, demanding an apology from the Board, a review of gender sensitivity standards, and a classroom debrief to sensitise students to the problematic nature of the content.

Britons Rush to Get Shots in Booster Blitz Against Omicron



London, Dec 13: Long lines formed on Monday at vaccination centres across England as people heeded the government's call for all adults to get booster shots to protect themselves against the Omicron variant, as the U.K. recorded its first death of a patient infected

In a televised announcement late on Sunday, Prime Minister Boris Johnson said everyone 18 and up would be offered a third vaccine dose by December 31 — less than three weeks away, and a month earlier than the previous

Mr. Johnson said boosters would "reinforce our wall of vaccine protection" against an anticipated "tidal wave of Omicron." The British government raised the country's official coronavirus threat level on Sunday, warning that the rapid spread of Omicron "adds additional and rapidly increasing risk to the public and health care services."

U.K. health authorities say Omicron cases are doubling every two to three days in Britain, and it will replace delta as the dominant coronavirus strain within days. But it's unclear whether the expected wave of infections will inundate the country's state-funded health care system.

Mr. Johnson on Monday confirmed the country's first death from Omicron.

Freedom and Power

Since his election campaign last year, U.S. President Joseph Biden had promised to hold a "Summit for Democracy" in order to highlight the worrying trends around the world of growing authoritarianism, and to bolster democratic institutions that appear to be faltering. While the concerns are genuine, and Mr. Biden's successful delivery of his promise last week, with a summit that saw 110 nations invited must be credited, it has also thrown up troubling questions. The State Department's decision to "arbitrarily place" restrictions on the invitee list, has led to a controversy. In South Asia, the inclusion of Pakistan, along with India and Nepal, but the exclusion of Bangladesh, Bhutan and Sri Lanka raises serious doubts on the criteria applied. And, if the "quality of democracy" and the importance of human rights were the criteria, then the question is which country is qualified to make that valuebased judgment? Expectedly, the Summit was roundly criticised for the most notable exclusions: Russia and China. In a joint editorial, the Russian and Chinese Ambassadors to the U.S. claimed their own states are democratic in practice, and criticised the U.S.'s experiments in regime change and "democratic transformations" in Iraq, Libya and Afghanistan. That the summit was organised in a year when newest democratic entrants, Afghanistan and Myanmar, reverted to autocratic regimes that rule by the power of the gun casts doubts on the efficacy of the international system in enforcing democracy through external interventions.

Apart from a more inclusive guest list, as a result, the summit would have done better to begin with a globally accepted definition for democracy, and a common understanding of the challenges. The Biden administration committed to announcing specific targets on helping free media, ensuring free and fair elections, and the participation of women, and listed authoritarianism, corruption and human rights violations as key challenges. Prime Minister Narendra Modi referred to the principles of "inclusion, transparency, human dignity, responsive grievance redressal and decentralisation of power" as key to Indian democracy. Many accused big tech companies and social media of "digital authoritarianism", and some spoke of the devastating impact of COVID-19, climate change and rising economic inequality as major stumbling blocks. Few, however, were willing to concede the shortcomings in their own democracies, however, especially the rise in hyper-nationalism, xenophobia and majoritarianism that saps the very essence of representational, pluralistic and inclusive governance today. Democracy, like charity, begins at home, and rather than making international pledges at summit-level conferences, elected leaders must keep their promises of freedom and equality for the people or "demos" that make up their nations.

Vaccines, previous infection offer 'stronger than basic' protection against Omicron



Beijing: People previously infected with COVID-19 and those vaccinated will have some "stronger than basic" protection against Omicron, according to one of the earliest peer-reviewed studies looking into the recently identified variant of coronavirus.

However, the study conducted in a lab suggests that Omicron "exceeds" all other variants in its potential capability to evade the protection gained from previous COVID-19 infection or vaccination.

The findings, published in the journal Emerging Microbes & Infection, also suggest that although a thirddose of vaccines can "significantly boost immunity", the protection from Omicron "may be compromised".

The researchers from the National Institutes for Food and Drug Control in China, however, noted that more research is needed to better understand the association.

The results support recent findings in South Africa which highlight that for Omicron it was "easy to evade immunity, they noted.

"We found the large number of mutations of the Omicron variant did cause significant changes of neutralisation sensitivity against people who had already had COVID," said study lead author Youchun Wang from the National Institutes for Food and Drug

"However, the average ED50 (protection level) against Omicron is still higher than the baseline, which indicated there is still some protection effect that can be observed," Wang said.

Wang cautioned that because the antibody protection — in the form of previous infection or vaccination decreases gradually over a period of six months, Omicron "may be able to escape immunity even better".

The researchers looked at 28 serum samples from patients recovering from the original strain of SARS-

They tested these against in-vitro Omicron samples, as well as four other strains marked 'of concern' by the World Health Organization such as Delta, and two variants marked as 'of interest'.

"This study verifies the enhanced immune escape of Omicron variant, which sounds the alarm to the world and has important implications for the public health planning and the development of matching strategies,"

The researchers noted that more research carried out not just in-vitro but in real-world studies is urgently needed to better understand Omicron.

It will be of ut most importance to know whether the variant can escape from the vaccine elicited immunity to cause more severe disease and death, they said.



Kashi has Seen Sultanates Rise and Fall, is a Symbol of India's Soul, says PM Modi

Varanasi, Dec 13: After a dip in the Ganga and rituals inside the temple, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday inaugurated the Kashi Vishwanath corridor that connects the temple to the banks of the river, terming it a "symbol of Sanatan culture of India" and placing it at the centre of the sacred geography of the country.

He said India today had begun to come out from the the effects of slavery.

"The long period of slavery broke our self-confidence in such a way that we lost faith in our own creation. Today, from this 1,000-year-old Kashi, I call upon every countryman — create with full confidence, innovate, do it in an innovative way," Mr. Modi said.

Today's India had both "virasat" (heritage) and "vikas" (progress), he said.

"Today's India not only beautifies Somnath temple. but also lays thousands of kilometres of optical fibre in the sea. Today's India not only renovates Kedarnath temple, but is preparing to send Indians to space. Today's India is not only making a Ram Temple in Ayodhya, but is also making medical colleges in every district. Today's India is not only giving the Vishwanath temple a grand look, but making crores of houses for the poor," Mr. Modi said.

On a two-day visit to his Lok Sabha constituency of Varanasi, Mr. Modi was greeted by supporters who had lined up on the streets. After taking a dip at Lalita Ghat, he made his way up a red carpet to the newly constructed corridor, carrying a vessel of water from the holy river as an offering. After the rituals, Mr. Modi had a photo-op with construction workers who had worked on the project, where he showered flower petals on them.

Addressing a gathering of around 3,000 people, including Hindu religious heads from across the country, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, BJP president J.P. Nadda and other party functionaries, Mr. Modi said it wasn't until now that "this much work" had been done for Kashi, after Maratha queen Ahilvabai Holkar's efforts to rebuild the temple in the 18th Century.



He spoke of the important place that Varanasi or Kashi held through history, resisting onslaught of invaders. He said the city was witness to the atrocities of Aurangzeb, but the soil of India was different from rest of the world.

"If an Aurangzeb comes, then so does a Shivaji. If any Salar Masood comes, then brave warriors like King Suheldev make him taste the might of India's unity. And during British rule, the people of Kashi know what happened to Hastings," he said, adding that Kashi had seen "sultanates" rise and fall.

Laying the foundation stone for a Maharaja Suheldev memorial in Bahraich earlier this year, Mr. Modi had said the contributions of the legendary king, who was believed to have defeated a nephew of Mahmud of Ghazni, had been ignored till now.

Speaking a few sentences in Tamil, Kannada and in a local dialect, Mr. Modi said the Vishwanath templewas dear topeople across the country. Varanasi had been the city where Adi Jagadguru Shankaracharya got the inspiration from Dom Raja to resolve to unite the country, he said. The Doms, a so-called low caste community, have historically carried out

He said it was also the city were Goswami Tulsidas wrote Ramcharitmanas and Lord Buddha's enlightenment was revealed to the world in Sarnath, near Varanasi. It was also the land of four Jain tirthankaras, he said.

Mr. Modi said for him, every Indian was a part of God so asked all to make three solutions cleanliness, creation and continuous efforts towards a self-reliant India.

Taking a dig at critics, Mr. Modi said some people had doubted that Varanasi could see any change when he first became its MP in 2014. He said whenever Kashi took a new turn, it changed the fate of the country.

Earlier, the U.P. Chief Minister said development of the corridor was the next step in a series starting with construction of the Ram temple in Ayodhya. The corridor, which was started in 2019, was carried out after demolishing around 300 buildings, making a wider path from the river to the temple. Mr. Modi said the number of pilgrims who visit the temple would increase, with the space increasing from 3,000 square feet to 5 lakh square feet.

Estimated to cost 1 800 crore, the portion of the corridor opened on Monday was the first phase of the project. The gateway to the river and the steps going to the ghat would be completed in the coming months, according to district officials.

Gujarat Revises COVID-19 Death Tally

Ahmedabad, Dec. 13: The Gujarat Government has apparently revised the COVID-19 death figure disbursing compensation to the victims' families as per the apex court's guidelines.

Officially, 10,098 people died of the virus as per the Health Department's figures. These figures were mentioned in the bulletin issued by the State Government daily.

However, the State has so far paid compensation to more than 19,000 persons.

"We are following the Supreme Court guidelines in paying the compensation. It's ongoing process as the district authorities are distributing the forms and disbursing compensation in accordance with the guidelines," Additional Chief Secretary (Health and Family Welfare) Manoj Aggarwal

The State has received 34,678 applications for the 1 50,000 compensation.

Mr. Aggarwal said the State administration intends to help as many families as possible.

He said the compensation was being paid by the Collector offices.

In October, the Supreme Court while hearing a PIL had approved the payment of 1 50,000 to the families to be paid over and above the amounts paid by the Centre and the State under various schemes.

The death figure has remained the bone contention in the State which has reportedly under-reported the number during the first and the second wave of the pandemic.

Audit committees

The State Government had formed districtwise audit committees which determine the cause of deaths during the pandemic. It is said the committees consisting of civil hospital doctors and officials did not consider co-morbid patients who died of the infection as COVID-19 induced

According to former Gujarat Congress president Amit Chavda, more than three lakh persons died of COVID-19 since March 2020.

"The Congress party has already received 70,000 applications from the families of the deceased. We have asked people to submit their applications," Mr. Chavda said.

The Opposition party has demanded a compensation of 1 4 lakh each to the family of those who lost their loved ones.

Verstappen Wins 1st F1 Title with Last Lap Pass of Hamilton

Abu Dhabi, Dec. 13: Max Verstappen ripped a record eighth title away from Lewis Hamilton with a pass on the final lap of the Abu Dhabi GP to close one of the most thrilling Formula One seasons in years as the first Dutch world champion.

Hamilton was cruising past Michael Schumacher's record of seven titles Sunday in a race he controlled until Nicholas Latifi crashed with five laps remaining. F1 sent out the safety car for a cleanupand resumed therace with one lap remaining.

Hamilton and Verstappen started side-by-side for one final triparound Yas Marina Circuit and the British driver surged to the lead. Verstappen stalked him through the first four turns then made his pass in turn five and pulled away in his Red Bull.

It was a fitting end to a season that saw the two contenders go

wheel-to-wheel over 22 races spanning four continents and arrive in Abu Dhabi tied in the c h a m p i o n s h i p standings. It marked the first time the contenders were equal at the season final e since 1974.

But Hamilton had the race well under control until the Latifi crash.

Multiple rival drivers headed to the grid to congratulate Verstappen as Hamilton sat

motionlessinsidehis Mercedes. The defeat ended his reign of four consecutive titles and denied Hamilton a chance to pass Schumacher as best all-time in F1.

"Congratulations to Max and to his team, I think he did an amazing job this year," Hamilton said to close what had become a bitter



rivalry this season between Mercedes and Red Bull.

Hamilton received a long hug in the garage from his father, who then went to the garage and hugged both Verstappen and Verstappen's father. Jos Verstappen was himself a former F1 driver and raised his 24-year-old son to become a world champion.

Injured Rohit Sharma out of South Africa Test Series; Priyank Panchal Named Replacement

New Delhi, Dec. 13: India's Test vice-captain Rohit Sharma was on Monday ruled out of the entire three-Test series against South Africa as his old left-hamstring injury resurfaced during the team's net session in Mumbai where he also took a hit on his hand.

India Acaptain Priyank Panchal will be Rohit's replacement opener in the Test series.

"Team India Test vice-captain Rohit Sharma sustained a left hamstring injury during his training session here in Mumbai yesterday. He has been ruled out of the upcoming 3-match Test series against South Africa. Priyank Panchal will replace Rohit Sharma in the Test squad," BCCI stated in a press release.

The Board has not announced a stand-in vice-captain but it is expected that KL Rahul is the front-runner for being Virat Kohli's deputy during the Tests.

Other contenders could be Rishabh Pant and Ravichandran Ashwin considering that Ajinkya Rahane has been removed from the role with his place in the eleven not being assured. The Tests will wind up on January 15 followedby three ODIs, scheduled to begin on January 19 in Paarl.

The 34-year-old Rohit also sustained a hit on his hands at the Mumbai nets while taking throwdowns from Raghavendra aka Raghu.



"Yes, Rohit did suffer an injury on his hand but even after that he had batted. So we can presume that hand injury isn't serious. But thereafter, it seemed the old hamstring problem resurfaced once again and it might take some time before he is fully fit and available.

"They are trying to sort it out. Hamstring injuries normally take four weeks which could effectively rulehim out of Test series," a senior BCCI source told PTI on Monday.

As of now, the extent of Rohit's injury is not very clear. It is not known whether it's a strain which is a less serious injury or a tear, which will have to be graded.

"There are some issues but the medical team is trying to sort it out," a source close to the cricketer told PTI. The BCCI is yet to share the details of his scan report which

will ascertain the degree of the injury.

"Any hamstring injury, even the lowest grade takes a month to heal with rehabilitation sessions. In Tests we have Mayank Agarwal ready to open with KL Rahul, who could potentially be the vice-captain.

"And now we have Priyank Panchal also as cover. We would be hoping that he is fit and ready for the ODI series," the source added.

It is learnt that Panchal reported to the team hotel this evening.

"Panchal has been asked to report at the Mumbai team hotel tonight. He is there as a cover for Rohit. Also because he recently played in South Africa and scored runs, he was asked to join," an official associated with the India A team informed.


Panchal is no greenhorn as he has 100 first-class matches under his belt with 7011 runs, including 24 hundreds.
