Wrong forum

India's negative vote at the UN Security Council (UNSC) on a draft resolution on climate change is a reflection of its long-held opposition to expanding the UNSC's mandate into areas that are already being dealt with by other multinational fora. The resolution, piloted by Ireland and Niger and which had the support of a majority of the UNSC members, was voted down by India and Russia it has veto powers — while China abstained. Their position is that the UNSC's primary responsibility is "maintenance of international peace and security" and climate change-related issues are outside its ambit. But the supporters of the resolution argue that the climate is creating security risks in the world, which will exacerbate in the future with water shortage, migration and a destruction of livelihoods. Germany had circulated a similar draft last year which was never put to vote in the Security Council as the Trump administration opposed it. Now, with support from the Biden administration, the developed world is pushing to include what they call "climate security" in the agenda of the UNSC. While the urgency to take action to tackle climate change is appreciated, the attempt to securitise the climate agenda could have unintended consequences. Bringing the issue under the UNSC will also give more powers to the world's industrialised countries, which hold a veto power, to decide on future action on climate-related security issues.

Currently, all matters related to climate change are being discussed in the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), a specialised agency. And with over 190 members, its framework has made progress in tackling climate change. It is this process that led to the Kyoto Protocol, the Paris Agreement and the recent COP26 summit, and has put in place an international approach to combat global climate change. Sure, there is valid criticism that decision making at UNFCCC conferences is slow and there has to be faster collective action to tackle climate change and associated challenges. But the solution is not outsourcing decision making to the five permanent members of the UNSC. Also, it is wrong to look at climate change through the prism of security. Each nation faces different challenges in transitioning into a greener economy. As India's Permanent Representative at the UN T.S. Tirumurti pointed out, the developed countries, all big polluters, have not met the promises they made with regard to climate action. The least developed and developing countries should be encouraged to keep the promises they made with financial assistance. This needs to be a collective process and the best way is through the UNFCCC, where decisions made are by consensus. The UNFCCC should not only make sure that the promises made by member countries, especially the powerful ones, in previous conferences are kept but also expand the scope of discussions to include climate-related security issues.

Speaking on the occasion, Mr. Puneet from Mantra4change explained that as a part of its continued efforts to work on COVID relief work, Mantra4change are setting up oxygenated beds in the hilly and remotely inaccessible areas along the international borders of India. This Mantra4change is setting up 5 beds in the northernmost region of Andaman Island i.e. Radha Nagar PHC of Diglipur district in the UT of Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

The PHC will be enabled to a plug and play infrastructure with power backup. This initiative is supported by Ashraya Hastha Trust - A philanthropic organisation run by one of the Co-founders of Infosys – Mr. K. Dinesh. The total donation is worth over INR 10,00,000/- (Ten lakh Rupees).

Puneet also said that this is just a small initiative to begin with. Mantra4change will be supporting the Andaman & Nicobar Administration in a big way. They had planned to donate a sea ambulance to stay in the mainland for but then decided to discuss the requirements from the Health Services.

Meanwhile, Dr. Munni Singhania requested the NGO to arrange form specialists and super specialists who come can come to the islands for supporting specialised treatments. She explained that there are super specialists and specialists visiting the islands from branded hospitals but their intentions remain with business. If super specialists and specialists come with the intention of helping the islanders, it would be a good gesture and much beneficial for the people. Mr. Puneet agreed to the point raised by the DHS and assured that such programmes will be arranged in futhre.

Dr. Avijit Roy suggested Mantra4change to support the islanders who are being sent to the mainland hospitals under Ayushman Bharat Scheme. They are forced to pay for the tests and also require

follow ups, which makes things difficult for them. If Mantra4changecan support the logistic requirements of such islanders, it will be a good gesture from the NGO.


Mantra4change is a notfor-profit organisation that is currently working on education and COVID relief. The NGO has worked very closely with various departments of government supporting Various COVID relief activities.

Mantra4change has so far distributed around 10,000+ ration kits, fed around 50,000 peopleand sent more than 3,000 migrant workers back to their natives. It has supported 9 COVID designated hospitals, 21 PHC's and ICMR Belgaum with critical medical consumables and set up around 100+ oxygenated beds across rural areas spanning in 7 states of Kamataka, Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Tamilnadu, Assam, Nagaland and Manipur.

Two Common Drugs Found Effective Against COVID-19, in **Early Testing**



Washington, Dec. 16: Two over-the-counter drugs have been found to inhibit the replication of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in preliminary tests, according to a study.

Researchers from the University of Florida in the U.S. noted that the combination includes diphenhydramine, an antihistamine used for allergy

When paired with lactoferrin, a protein found in cow and human milk, the compounds were found to hinder SARS-CoV-2 during tests in monkey cells and human lung cells, they said.

Lactoferrin is commonly used as a supplement to treat stomach and intestinal ulcers, among other uses, according to the researchers.

"We found out why certain drugs are active against the virus that causes COVID-19. Then, we found an antiviral combination that can be effective, economical and has a long history of safety," said David A Ostrov, an associate professor at the University of Florida.

In lab tests on human and monkey cells, the combination of drugs was particularly potent, the researchers said.

Individually, the two compounds each inhibited SARS-CoV-2 virus replication by about 30%, they said, adding that together, they reduced virus replication

The findings, published in the journal Pathogens, are a first step in developing a formulation that could be used to accelerate COVID-19 recovery.

Additional research into the compounds' effectiveness for COVID-19 prevention is already under way in mouse models, the researchers said.

To establish their findings, they focussed on proteins expressed in human cells known as sigma receptors.

In COVID-19 cases, the virus "hijacks" stress-response machinery, including sigma receptors, in order to replicate in the body, according to the researchers.

Interfering with that signalling appears to be the key to inhibiting the virus's potency, they said.

"We now know the detailed mechanism of how certain drugs inhibit SARS-CoV-2 infection," Mr. Ostrov

Data from the experiments show that a highly specific sigma receptor binding drug candidate and formulated combinations of over-the-counter products have the potential to inhibit virus infection and decrease recovery time from COVID-19, the researchers said.

While the findings are encouraging, Mr. Ostrov cautions against self-medicating with either diphenhydramine or lactoferrin as a COVID-19 prevention or treatment.

Surveskshan Grameen (SSG) 2021



Port Blair, Dec. 17: The Ministry of Jal Shakti, Department of Drinking Water and Sanitation, Govt. of India has launched the Swachh Survekshan Grameen - 2021, a survey of cleanliness, hygiene and sanitation to boost the government's push for Open Defecation Free (ODF) Plus status for villages and shall guide the ranking of all Districts of India on the basis quantitative and qualitative sanitation (Swachhtha) parameters.

The Swachh Survekshan Grameen 2021 shall support the States/UTs to accelerate ODF Plus interventions and increase momentum for improving Sustainability as well as Solid and Liquid Waste Management (SLWM) activities across the villages in the country. Earlier the Surveksnan was neid in 2018 and 2019. The focus areas of Swachh Surveskshan Grameen (SSG) - 2021 are Solid and Liquid Management, Waste Menstrual Hygiene Management, ODF sustainability and ODF

implementation and are broadly classified into three parts - Service Level Progress, Direct Observation and Citizen Feedback.

As part of Swachh Survekshan Grameen, 17,475 villages in 698 Districts across the country will be covered. 87,250 public places schools, namely anganwadis, public health centres, haat/ bazaars/religious places in these villages will be visited for survey. Around 1,74,750 Households will be interviewed for their feedback on SBM related issues. Also, citizens will be mobilised to provide feedback on sanitation related issues online using an application developed for the purpose.

Under Citizen Feedback component, the Ministry has launched a SSG Citizen Feedback Mobile Application available in playstore, wherein, feedback from the Citizens shall be obtained

on the above focus areas. The Mobile Applications seeks answers from citizens in Yes/No format for five predeveloped questions.

The UT of Andaman and Nicobar Islands has also launched the Survekshan in the rural parts of the islands. Active awareness programmes to mobilize the rural mass on the various focus areas aspects of SSG-2021 and Door to Door mobilization of all rural households are being undertaken by Department under the overall supervision and direction of State Mission Director, SBM-G.

The Secretary (RD/ Panchayat) has exhorted all citizens to come forward and participate in the Swachh Survekshan Grameen - 2021 and implored that SSG is not just a ranking exercise but has been a vehicle for creating a Janandolan (people's movement).

Harmanpreet (8th, 53rd minutes) converted two penalty corners, while comeback-man Akashdeep Singh, who couldn't make the Tokyo Olympics squad, found the net from a field effort in the 42nd minute for his second goal of the tournament.

Pakistan's lone goal was scored by Junaid Manzoorin the 45th minute.

It was India's second win in the tournament after their 9-0 drubbing of hosts Bangladesh, while Pakistan are still winless, having drawn goal-less against Japan in their opening match.

India had earlier drawn 2-2 against Korea in their tournament opener.

India are currently leading the points table with seven points from three games and will take on Japan in their last roundrobin match of the five-team tournament on Sunday.

Pakistan, meanwhile, have just one point from two games.

India and Pakistan were the joint winners in the last edition of the tournament in Muscat after the final was was hed out.

The Indians completely dominated possession in the first two quarters while Pakistan preferred to sit back. But they defended admirably save for Harmanpreet's lone strike.

The play was mostly on the Pakistan half in the first two quarters as Indians pressed hard from the onset and created a couple of chances but credit must go to goalkeeper Mazar Abbas who was brilliant overall.

But expectedly, it was India who took the lead in the eighth minute when Harmanpreet converted the team's first



penalty corner with a powerful low flick to the left of the Pakistan goalie.

Four minutes later, skipper Manpreet Singh' deflection from outside the circle was saved by an alert Abbas.

The second quarter continued in the same manner as India made numerous inroads but the Pakistan defence was upto the task.

While Pakistan defence stood out, the team's forward line looked unimpressive as it failed to register a single shot on the goal or secure a penalty corner. Leading 1-0 at half time, the Indians kept up the pressure on the Pakistan goal and increased their lead in the 42nd minute when Akashdeep slapped in Sumit's drive from the left flank with a reverse hit.

But the fighting Pakistanis didn't give up hope and upped their game from hereon, reducing the margin 27 seconds from the end of the third quarter through Manzoor's diving deflection from Abdul Rana's pass.

If the first three quarters belonged to India, Pakistan gave Manpreet and his men a run for their money in the final quarter, which produced end-to-end enthralling hockey.

Pumped up by the goal, Pakistan went on the offensive and secured their first penalty corner of the tournament in the 47th minute, which was rejected after India asked for the referral.

Pakistan didn't lose hope and continued to press hard and secured two more penalty corners in quick succession but young Indian custodian Suraj Karkera made two brilliantsaves to keep his side's lead intact.

In between, India secured their second penalty corner and once again Harmanpreet was precision personified with his drag-flick.

India earned another penalty corner just three minutes from the final hooter but Varun Kumar's effort was saved by the Pakistan goalkeeper.


