Repeal Bill, 2021, will now be introduced in the Lok Sabha for passage in the upcoming winter session of Parliament beginning on Nov ember 29. The agriculture ministry is deliberating on the exact dates to discuss the three laws in the forthcoming Parliament session, informed Union minister Pralhad Joshi a day ago.

The bill - which has been listed for introduction and passage among the 26 new bills on the agenda of the government - seeks to repeal the Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020, the Farmers' (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020, and the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020, and the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020.

and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act provides for setting up a mechanism allowing the farmers to sell their farm produce outside the Agriculture Produce Market Committees (APMCs). APPLE SUING ISRAELI HACKER FOR-HIRE COMPANY NSO GROUP

Tech giant Apple announced Tuesday it is suing Israel's NSO Group, seeking to block the world's most infamous hacker-for-hire company from breaking into Apple's products, like the iPhone.



Apple said in a complaint filed in federal court in California that NSO Group employees are amoral 21st century mercenaries who have created highly sophisticated cyber-surveillance machinery that invites routine and flagrant abuse." Apple said NSO Group's spyware, called Pegasus, had been used to attack a small number of Apple customers worldwide.

State-sponsored actors like the NSO Group spend millions of dollars on sophisticated surveillance technologies without effective accountability. That needs to change, said Craig Federighi, Apple's senior vice president of software engineering.

NSO Group has broadly denied wrongdoing and said its products have been used by governments to save lives. Pedophiles and terrorists can freely operate in technological safe-havens, and we provide governments the lawful tools to fight it. NSO group will continue to advocate for the truth, the company said in a statement.

It's the latest blow to the hacking firm, which was recently blacklisted by the U.S. Commerce Department and is currently being sued by social media giant Facebook.

Security researchers have found Pegasus being used around the world to break into

the phones of human rights activists, journalists and even members of the Catholic clergy.

Pegasus infiltrates phones to vacuum up personal and location data and surreptitiously controls the smartphone's microphones and cameras. Researchers have found several examples of NSO Group tools using so-called zero click exploits that infect targeted mobile phones without any user interaction.

The Biden administration announced this month that NSO Group and another Israeli cybersecurity firm called Candiru were being added to the entity list, which limits their access to U.S. components and technology by requiring government permission for exports.

Also this month, security

researchers disclosed that Pegasus spyware was detected on the cellphones of six Palestinian human rights activists. And Mexican prosecutors recently announced they have arrested a businessman on charges he used the Pegasus spyware to spy on a journalist.

Facebook has sued NSO Group over the use of a somewhat similar exploit that allegedly intruded via its globally popular encrypted WhatsApp messaging app. A U.S. federal appeals court issued a ruling this month rejecting an effort by NSO Group to have the lawsuit thrown out.

Vaccination going smoothly in isles

Port Blair, Nov 24: The vaccination drive is continuing smoothly in A&N Islands. As per data available, a total of 5,40,356 beneficiaries have been vaccinated so far in A&N Islands, out of the target beneficiaries of 2,81,603 (approx.). A total of 1,75,124 eligible people in the age group of 18 to 44 years have been vaccinated till date. A total of 2685 people were vaccinated in these islands on Tuesday. 2214 beneficiaries were vaccinated in South Andaman District, out of which 78 beneficiaries were in the age group of 18-44 years. 394 beneficiaries were vaccinated in North & Middle Andaman District, out of which 7 beneficiaries were in the age group of 18-44 years. 77 beneficiaries were vaccinated in Nicobar District, out of which 5 beneficiaries were in the age group of 18-44 years.

Delta variant of COVID-19 can infect fully vaccinated; prevention and control strategy required: Study

New Delhi, 24th Nov, 2021: In a worrying development, a new study has revealed that the Delta variant of SARS-CoV-2 known as coronavirus can even infect a person who has taken both doses of an anti-COVID vaccine.

According to the study conducted by researchers from the INSACOG consortium, CSIR and the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), fighting against the 'Delta' variant of coronavirus requires a vaccine, plus an infection prevention and control strategy, even in populations with high uptake of inoculations.

In the study, it has been found that though vaccination prevents the severity of the viral attack, there have been cases of breakthrough



infection and that there is also a probable risk of onward transmission to potentially very vulnerable people.

The study was conducted in two Delhi hospitals and the researchers analysed data on 113 breakthrough infections among health workers by "constructing probable transmission networks from epidemiological and virus genome sequence data using a suite

of computational approaches". "Among known cases, we identify a high probability that doubly-vaccinated individuals transmitted SARS-CoV-2, and potential cases of virus transmission between individuals who had received two doses of vaccine," TOI quoted the study as saying. Meanwhile, a Lancet study has said that the two doses of India's Covaxin have 50 per cent effectiveness against symptomatic COVID.

The first real-world assessment of BBV152, a COVID-19 vaccine developed by Bharat Biotech suggests that two vaccine doses result in 50% effectiveness against symptomatic COVID-19, according to the study published in The Lancet Infectious Diseases journal.

many more. The Forest Department also plans to introduce some reasonable forestry to the Nature Park-cum-interpretation Centre soon.

Since 2002, the Department of Environment and Forests has been working on its plans to shift the Mini Zoo to Chidya Tapu Biological Park in South Andaman, which came into existence in 2001 with the aim to conserve and study endemic and endangered species of animals found in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. The Mini Zoo at Haddo presently houses just one

salt water crocodile infamous for killing at foreigner at Havelock and one huge Python. The Chidya Tapu park has been a centre for biodiversity and conservation where one can catch a glimpse of the rich fauna of the islands. The plan for the park has been meticulously laid out to span over 20 years and three phases, of which only one phase is currently open to public. A green and dense jungle like environment recreates the natural habitat of the animals here. Sprawled over 40 hectares, the

park is covered with a variety of plant, right from the majestic Mahua to the exquisite Paduaks. While walking through this jungle, one would be able to catch a glimpse of a variety of birds flying around freely. Other than birds you could spot wild pigs as well as barking deer and spotted deer. Those fascinated with reptiles would enjoy the saltwater crocodile spotting. The future phases will see the park housing an aquarium, an insectarium, a reptile house, butterfly house and a walk in Aviary.

More than half of women and children found anemic in India: survey

New Delhi, 24th Nov, 2021: Anaemia among children and women continues to be a cause of concern, with more than half of them being found anemic in 14 states and UTs, according to the findings of phase two of the National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5).

The government on Wednesday released the factsheets of key indicators on population, reproductive and child health, family welfare, nutrition and others for India as well as 14 states and UTs, dubbed under phase two of, of the 2019-21 NFHS-5 here. The states and UTs which were surveyed in this phase were Arunachal Pradesh, Chandigarh, Chhattisgarh, Haryana, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, NCT of Delhi, Odisha, Puducherry, Punjab, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand, a Health Ministry statement said. At the national level, the occurrence of anaemia among women and children was found to be same as that in 14 states and UTs. The findings for national level were calculated by using data from phase one and phase two of the NFHS-5. The findings of phase one of the NFHS-5 for 22 states and UTs were released in December, 2020.

According to the findings, child nutrition

indicators showed a slight improvement at all India level as stunting declined from 38 per cent to 36 per cent, wasting from 21 per cent to 19 per cent and underweight from 36 per cent to 32 per cent. In all, the phase two states and UTs, the situation improved in respect of child nutrition but the change was not significant as drastic changes in respect of these indicators are unlikely in a short span, the statement said.

"Anaemia among children and women continues to be a cause of concern. More than half of the children and women (including pregnant women) are anemic in all the phase two states and UTs and all India level compared to NFHS-4, in spite of substantial increase in the composition of iron-folic acid (IFA) tablets by pregnant women for 180 days or more," it said.

Exclusive breastfeeding to children under six months of age has shown an improvement in all India level from 55 per cent in 2015-16 to 64 per cent in 2019-21. All the phase two states and UTs are also showing a considerable progress, it said.

There is an increase from 51 per cent to 58 per cent of women receiving the recommended four or more ANC visits by health providers at all India level, the findings stated. Also, all the phase two states and UTs have shown improvement, except Punjab, between 2015-16 to 2019-20. Institutional births have increased substantially from 79 per cent to 89 per cent at all India level.

Institutional delivery is 100 per cent in Puducherry and Tamil Nadu and more than 90 per cent in seven states and UTs out of 12 phase two states and UTs, the statement said. Along with an increase in institutional births, there has also been a substantial increase in C-section deliveries in many states and UTs, especially in private health facilities, it said. According to the findings, unmet needs of family planning have witnessed a significant decline from 13 per cent to 9 per cent at all India level and in most of the phase two states and UTs. The unmet need for spacing which remained a

major issue in India in the past, has come down to less than 10 per cent in all the states, except Jharkhand (12pc), Arunachal Pradesh (13 pc) and Uttar Pradesh (13 pc).

Full immunisation drive among children aged 12-23 months has recorded a substantial improvement from 62 per cent to 76 per cent at all India level. Also, 11 out of 14 states and UTs have more than three-fourth of children aged 12-23 months with full immunisation and it is highest for Odisha at 90 per cent, the statement said.

On comparing NFHS-4 and NFHS-5 data, the increase in full immunisation coverage observed to be expeditious in many states and UTs. More than 50 per cent of phase two states and UTs are sharing over 10 percentage points during the short span of four years. This can be attributed to the flagship initiative of Mission Indrakhan launched by the government in 2015. The Total Fertility Rate (TFR), the average number of children per woman, has further declined from 2.2 to 2.0 at the national level and in 14 states and UTs. All phase two states have achieved replacement level of fertility (2.1), except Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Jharkhand and Uttar Pradesh, it said. Overall

Contraceptive Prevalence Rate (CPR) has increased substantially from 54 per cent to 67 per cent at all India level and in almost all phase two states and UTs, with the exception of Punjab. Use of modern methods of contraceptives has also increased in almost all states and UTs, according to the statement. Women's empowerment indicators portray encouraging improvement at all India level and across all 14 states and UTs. Significant progress has been recorded between NFHS-4 and NFHS-5 with respect to women operating bank accounts from 53 per cent to 79 per cent at all India level, it said. For instance, in the case of Madhya Pradesh, the increase was from 37 per cent to 75 per cent. More than 70 per cent of women in every state and UT in the second phase have operational bank accounts.

The main objective of successive rounds of the NFHS is to provide reliable and comparable data relating to health and family welfare and other emerging issues, the ministry said in the statement. The NFHS-5 survey work has been conducted in around 61 lakh sample households from 707 districts (as on March, 2017) of the country.

HOW ANTIBIOTIC OVERUSE CAN CAUSE SEVERE HEALTH PROBLEMS

ENT (ear, nose and throat) infections are quite common among children and adults. In majority of the cases, the symptoms are quite mild. However, in some cases, the infections can become severe, requiring treatment from an ENT specialist. To deal with persistent severe infections, doctors often recommend antibiotics.

The problem arises when people take antibiotics irresponsibly to protect themselves from infections without knowing that overuse can cause severe health issues. As per the centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), adverse reactions to antibiotics are responsible for one in five medication-related emergency room visits. Therefore, it is always advised to stop antibiotics if any side-effects show up and consult with an expert before taking antibiotics.

Consequences of unnecessary antibiotics usage ENT infections can be bacterial or viral. Bacterial infections usually do not happen as often, but such infections can become more serious. However, if an ENT infection is caused by bacteria, then it may be possible to treat it with antibiotics. Antibiotics only work against bacteria and cannot help with viral infections. Therefore, it is critical to understand the cause of the infection first before taking antibiotics.

Unnecessary or overuse of antibiotics can cause serious health issues, some of which are discussed below:

Diarrhoea in children Since common colds and flu are mostly viral, treating them with antibiotics can result in unwanted side effects. A study by the CDC has revealed that children prescribed antibiotics for routine upper respiratory infections can be more susceptible to antibiotic-resistant strains of the bacteria commonly known as C. diff. C. diff is a bacteria found in

the human gut that can cause severe diarrhoea and is responsible for thousands of deaths every year among children and adults.

Fungal infections Antibiotics are specifically designed to kill harmful bacteria but they sometimes also kill good bacteria that protect people from various fungal infections. As a result of that, people taking antibiotics develop fungal



infections in certain parts of the body like the mouth, throat and vagina. The symptoms of fungal infections usually include fever and chills, vaginal itching, loss of taste, white patches on the throat and pain during peeing.

Upsets gut flora There are more than 100 trillion bacteria of different strains in the intestines. Though some are deadly, a natural balance is maintained in the gut that can go haywire with the use of antibiotics. The helpful bacteria in the gut known as gut flora, support proper digestion and immunity.

Aggressive antibiotics can wipe out a significant proportion of these helpful bacteria thus causing plenty of health issues.

Antibiotic-resistant bacteria With the rapid and overuse of antibiotics, some bacteria develop resistance to low

antibiotics. Antibiotic-resistant infections can be severe and potentially life-threatening.

Antibiotic-resistant gonorrhoea is an emerging threat that has been linked to ectopic pregnancy, pelvic inflammatory disease, neonatal eye infections and tubal infertility, among other conditions. Presently, cephalosporin antibiotics are the only class that meets the standards set by CDC to fight resistant gonorrhoea.

Drug interactions Antibiotics can also interact with other medications, making them less effective. Certain combinations can worsen the side effects of the other drug or antibiotics. The commonly observed side effects of antibiotics include nausea, diarrhoea, and stomach ache. Sometimes these symptoms can lead to dehydration and other problems.

Things to keep in mind while taking antibiotics

1. It is important to take only the prescribed dose of antibiotics by a doctor.

2. Antibiotics should not be saved for later use.

3. One should not share his/her antibiotics with others.

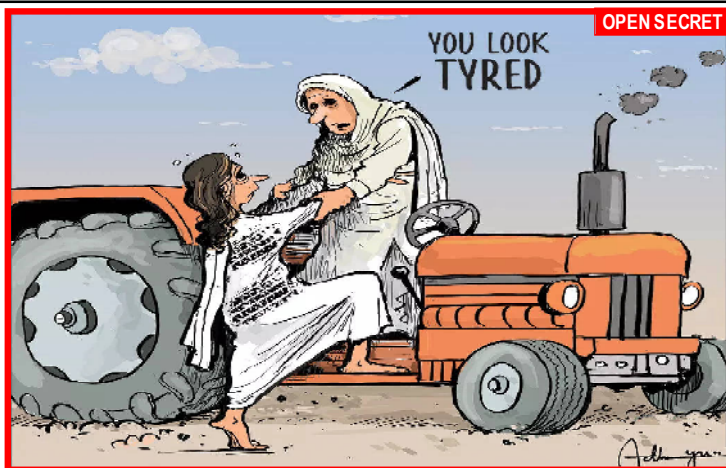
4. Also, one should not take antibiotics prescribed for someone else. This may delay the best treatment for the person.

Antibiotics are the most effective when used appropriately. This begins by making sure that the patient really needs the antibiotic.

Also, antibiotics should be taken in the prescribed amount as directed by a physician.

One might feel better within a few days of taking an antibiotic but it is vital to talk to the healthcare provider before stopping the treatment early.

SAI Athlete Wellness Centre makes timely intervention to help cyclist Ronaldo

NEW DELHI: One of India's ace sprint cyclists, Ronaldo Singh was back on his feet after he was provided timely and optimal intervention by the Sports Authority of India's (SAI) Athlete Wellness Centre after he felt immobilised by pain in his lower back after practice in Slovenia on Tuesday.

Ronaldo Singh developed lower back spasms, possibly due to inadequate hydration, on the last day of the team's training in Nova Mesto ahead of his travel to Andorra, Portugal. Within minutes of his alerting the Sports Authority of India around midnight on Tuesday, the Athlete Wellness Centre swung into action and facilitated some intervention through a video conference to help reduce his pain.

A top physiotherapist, Dr Danish, was able to guide the coach

RK Sharma and the rider to make the optimal use of the TENS (Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation) machine with the team. He also suggested a couple of isometric exercises and some medication. In about 15 minutes, Ronaldo Singh felt the pain come down by half and was able to get on his feet.

Dr. Pralay Majumdar, Head, Sports Science, Sports Authority of India, said the timely response on Tuesday night was in keeping with the philosophy behind the establishment of the Athlete Wellness Centre. "It was important and satisfying that we could provide the best intervention without loss of time," he said. "From the time Athlete Wellness Centre was launched in June this year, we have assisted 25 athletes under its

umbrella," Dr. Majumdar said. "We had started this for TOPS Development Group athletes but have expanded it to include all athletes in the SAI National Centres of Excellence across the country."

The multi-layered design of the Athlete Wellness Centre allows health and fitness issues to be dealt with quickly. From the support in the National Centres of Excellence to regional National Referral Repository Team of doctors and physiotherapists to the central core team of experts.



Green Hydrogen : India to soon launch scheme to boost R&D of electrolyzers

Union Minister Bhagwant Khubra on Wednesday said a scheme for boosting research and development of electrolyzers will be rolled out soon, a step in the direction of achieving India's renewable energy targets.

An electrolyser is a system that uses electricity to break water into hydrogen and oxygen in a process called electrolysis.

Khubra made the remarks

while addressing the first International Conference on Hydrogen Energy - Policies, Infrastructure Development and Challenges organised here by Central Board of Irrigation & Power.

In his inaugural address, Khubra highlighted Prime Minister Narendra Modi's conviction for decarbonisation of India in COP26. India has the target of achieving 500 GW of renewable energy by 2030

and net-zero emissions by 2070 for which the country is continuously moving forward.

The Minister of State for New & Renewable Energy urged technologists from IITs and other organizations to do maximum research in hydrogen energy so as to help reduce cost of production for electrolyzers.

He said the renewable energy ministry is coming out with a

scheme for the same. India has to work towards production of hydrogen energy so that apart from domestic consumption it may also be able to export.

He hoped that the two-day conference beginning November 24 will be able to deliberate future challenges for hydrogen energy and find solutions.

About 200 participants from 60 organizations from India and three international experts from Germany, Japan and Sweden are participating in the conference. The conference would highlight the vast developments that have taken place in the country over the last few years in the field of hydrogen. The technical committee of the conference selected 29 papers including 3 papers from foreign authors which will be discussed during the conference.



Indonesia Open: PV Sindhu, Kidmabi Srikanth, Sai Praneeth advance to second round

BALI: India's double Olympic medalist PV Sindhu showed great determination to oust her opponent in the women's singles opening round, while B Sai Praneeth and Kidmabi Srikanth also advanced to the men's singles second round of the Indonesia Open Super 1000 event here on Wednesday.

After a slow start, Sindhu, the reigning world champion, engineered a turnaround to register a hard-fought 17-21 21-17 21-17 win over a tenacious Aya Ohori of Japan in one hour 10 minutes.

With this, Sindhu improved her impressive record against the Japanese shuttler to 11-0.

World number seven Sindhu, who made a semifinal exit after suffering a straight game defeat to

Japan's Akane Yamaguchi here last week, will meet 23-year-old German shuttler Yvonne Li in the second round. It will be the first meeting between the third seed Indian and world number 26 Li.

In the men's singles, world number 16 B Sai Praneeth clinched a 21-19 21-18 win over France's Toma Junior Popov. In a repeat of

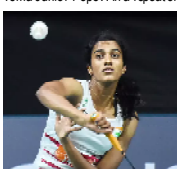
last week's Indonesia Masters quarterfinal, Srikanth once again got the better of compatriot HS Prannoy.

The former world number one Srikanth, who is coming off two back-to-back semifinal finishes at the Hyo Open and Indonesia Masters, continued his good run of form as he eked out a 21-15 19-21 21-12 victory over Prannoy in 56 minutes.

While Praneeth will next take on Christo Popov of France in the second round, Srikanth will meet the winner of the first round clash between Tokyo Olympics gold medalist second seed Dane Victor Axelsen and Japan's Koki Watanabe.

The mixed doubles pairing of N Sikki Reddy and Dhruv Kapila, however, made a first round exit, failing to the Japanese duo of Kyohi Yamashita and Naru Shinoya, 7-21 12-21.

It was a bad day in the office for Reddy who made a first round exit in the women's doubles event as well. Reddy and veteran shuttler Ashwini Ponnappa went down 21-29 18-21 to the fifth seeded Bulgarian duo of Gabriela Stoeva and Stefani Stoeva.
