

The West Bank Violence

The killing of five Palestinian men by Israeli security forces in separate incidents on Tuesday in Hebron and Ramallah is the latest flare-up of a continuing story of violence and retribution in the occupied West Bank. Organised armed resistance independent of the official Palestinian leadership has been growing in the West Bank ever since the clashes in Jerusalem in May 2021, which led to the 11-day war on the Gaza Strip, controlled by the Islamist Hamas. Among the new militant groups that have sprung up in the West Bank is the Lion's Den, reportedly based in the Old City of Nablus, attacking Israeli troops and illegal Jewish settlers in Palestinian territories. This year has seen a marked jump in attacks by Palestinians — Jerusalem was hit by two blasts in November in which a teenager was killed and 18 injured while the Israelis carry out raids in West Bank towns almost daily. The violence is cyclical. At least 140 Palestinians have been killed this year, including 26 children, which is a seven-year record. More than 30 Israelis have been killed by Palestinians.

If anything, the continuing violence despite Israel's disproportionate crackdown underscores the argument that the status quo in the occupied and blockaded Palestinian territories is unbearable and unsustainable. Israel's approach is that it can manage the security challenges from Palestinians with heavy force and no concessions. A weak and divided Palestinian leadership means that there is no organised, collective voice to negotiate with the Israelis. The Palestinian Authority, which runs parts of the West Bank, is led by Fatah, while the overpopulated Gaza Strip, on the Mediterranean coast, is ruled by its rival Hamas. Still, the situation is beyond Israel's control. The absence of a peace process, a deepening of the occupation and pentup frustration with their own leadership have led a new generation of Palestinians in the West Bank to embrace violence and militancy, recalling the days of the second Intifada. The return of Benjamin Netanyahu as Prime Minister could make the situation worse as some of his far-right and ultra-Orthodox allies want the Jewish settlements in the West Bank to be expanded and "disloyal" Arab citizens of Israel expelled. The slow death of the two-state formula and growing violence are bad news for the occupiers and the occupied. While it is making Palestinian lives extremely difficult, the unending conflict is reshaping Israeli society as well, which is becoming polarised with the clergy, far-right nationalists and extremists wielding an outsize influence on politics and governance.

Gorgeous, Pulse-Raising **Procedural Thriller Adds** Momentum to the HIT Franchise

December 4: HIT 2 is a significant improvement over its predecessor HIT, but buckles under the pressure of its ambitious setup by the time the mystery unravels.

Netflix struck gold with its depiction of serial killers with shows like "Mindhuter" and "Dahmer" – based on realworld serial killers – meant to investigate the inner world of a person. Successful movies and shows like "American Psycho" and "Dexter" depict unimaginably twisted and unpredictable individuals who are compelled to kill as a reaction to their own dispassion to society and its occupants. The "serial killer genre" doesn't exist by itself, but has wildly exploded

across multiple formats as a genre with a captive audience hungry for more.

South Korean cinema has served up some nuanced interpretations of the serial killer story with brilliant movies like "ISaw the Devil" and "Memories of a Murder" that get under the skin of the horrific nature of these crimes while taking a sensitive look at those affected by them. The "HIT Franchise" plays out alongsimilar lines as these are part social commentary, and edge-of-the-seat potboilers — with the stories at their heart drawing inspiration from real life crimes and the chaos that come with the attention that horrifying events like

these attract.

Adivi Sesh plays Krishna Deva (KD), an upbeat, charismatic SP incharge of the Homicide Investigation Team (HIT) in Vizag. KD has a laid back approach to even the most seemingly pressing situations, but makes up for his nonchalance through his efficient, straightforward manner of tackling the most challenging cases. In his interactions with one very persistent reporter (played by Posani Krishna Murali), KD presents the image of a person who is unfazed by any controversy, with notendency for second auessing himself once he feels he is in the right. The newly-appointed DGP (Rao Ramesh) is dismissive of his eager cadetand KD in turn has some tension seething under the surface towards hissubordinate Varsha



of work, KD convinces his

girlfriend Aarya (Meenakshi Chaudhary) to move in with him. A romantic

montage later, life seems to be looking up for KD.

Abhilash (Srinath Maganti), an officer from the Hyderabad investigating a case, takes the audience back to the prequel. As they talk, KD is summoned to a crime scene at a restaurant where the female has been brutally murdered and as a last act of desecration, mutilated and neatly arranged in orderly pieces. The forensics report has yet another shocker waiting for us: except for the head, the limbs rearranged as the original murder victim's, in fact, belong to different people

And so begins a game of twists and turns, with the case taking on a life on its own under the glare of media publicity and misdirection that seem to lead KD to dead ends in the course of the investigation.

His eagerness to nail down the perpetrator as the pressure weighs down on him backfires when he realises that all may not be as it seems - especially in the light of evidence suggesting that the killer may have completely eluded them after all and is now going to go after Aarya.

Just like the first movie, HIT 2 is a star vehicle with the camera trained on Adivi Sesh from the moment he appears on screen. Adivi Sesh, on his part, is a delight to watch on screen as he switches between tenderness and intensity impressive with absolute ease. Since the choreography movie takes its procedural camerawork. part very seriously, it uses

(Komalee Prasad). Outside ample advantage of the screen time in building up the tension in key scenes that pull the viewer into its mystery. The first half has solid writing and is smartly directed. building up very well to an interval bang that will leave the viewers shocked. Not for the squeamish, the makers have been generous with the depiction of gore for full effect while avoiding gratuity.

However, it is in the second half where the problems of such a multi-layered narrative begin to emerge. Since the director spends so much time setting up red herrings and sub-plots for the rest of the movie, the pacing begins to meander in the second half.

contains film entertaining components, but these elements quickly run their course. The film tends to bite off more than it can chew and the end result turns into a disappointment.

More often than not, the director seems to have written his characters into a corner, leading up to an absurd plot hole here and there. The writing needed to be more insightful and incisive, particularly because of the real-world incidents it tried to play up on. In particular, perhaps the biggest let down was when the build up to the killer closing in on KD finally gets interesting, the bigreveal

simply comes across as a little too far-fetched.

Overall, however, the movie stands its ground as a slick, entertaining thriller with beautiful lighting and camerawork and a moody score to boot. The action sequencewhere KD gives the prime suspect of the killings, Raghava, a chase through the docks is worth noting for its action and

PSLV-C54 Successfully Places Earth Observation Satellite into Orbit

December Sriharikota: A Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle of ISRO on Saturday successfully placed earth observation



satellite (Oceansat) into a sun-synchronous orbit, Indian Space Research Organisation said on Saturday.

The 44.4 metre tall rocket lifted off at a prefixed time at 11.56 am from Satish Dhawan Space Centre at this spaceport at the end of a 25.30 hour countdown.

After reaching the intended orbit nearly 17 minutes after PSLV-C54 lifted off, the Earth Observation Satellite or the Oceansat successfully separated from

In a tweet, ISRO said, "PASLV-C54/EOS-06 Mission: EOS-06 spacecraft separation is successful. The spacecraft's health is normal. The mission is

Scientists would perform lowering of the rocket to place the other co-passenger satellites into a different orbit which is expected to take place in a two-hour

In his address at the Mission Control Centre, ISRO Chairman S Somanath said, "I am really happy to announce the successful accomplishment of injecting the EOS-06 (Earth Observation satellite) into the intended orbit very precisely."

"We also observed that the performance of the rocket in this mission in all stages and functions was exceedingly good. And congratulations to the entire team of PSLV for making yet another successful mission in the series of its long journey," he said.

Scientists had actually planned to launch the Earth Observation Satellite at 1,032 seconds after lift-off at 11.56 am. The rocket successfully placed the satellite at 1,033 seconds at an altitude of about 742 kms, he

"The mission is not completed and we are waiting for the change of orbit of the upper stage along with the remaining eight satellites."

Mission Director S R Biju said the EOS-6 satellite has been injected into precise orbit "as precisely as

"..it is because of the excellent team effort put in by all the team members and that is 'Team ISRO'. Team ISRO always delivers and that is again proven here," he said. The Earth Observation Satellite-6 is the thirdgeneration satellite in the Oceans at series. This is to provide continuity services of Oceansat-2 spacecraft with enhanced payload specifications as well as application areas.

The mission objective is to ensure data continuity of ocean color and wind vector data to sustain the operational applications.

Congress Attacks Modi Govt Over 'Chinese Shelters in Depsang'

December 4: New Delhi: Citing media reports that China has built shelters in the Depsangarea in Ladakh, the Congress on Saturday questioned the government's "silence" over the issue and asked what steps were being taken by it to ensure status quo ante of April 2020.

Congress spokesperson Supriya Shrinate also attacked Prime Minister Narendra Modi over his handshake with Chinese President Xi Jinping at the G20 summit in Indonesia last

There was no immediate reaction from the government to the Congress' allegations.

While the Congress has attacking government over its handling of the border issues with China, officials have maintained that India has significantly enhanced its border infrastructure in recent years with the Centre giving a major boost to such efforts following the eastern Ladakh standoff.

"On November 15, Modi had met Xi Jinping, the Chinese head of state. He was not showing angry red eyes, hewas infactadorning ared shirt and I wonder what he talked about as he met Xi Jinping after the supreme sacrifice of 20 of our bravehearts," Shrinate said at a press conference at the AICC headquarters here.

Citing media reports, she said that in the area of Depsang, China has built temperature-regulated "shelters" that help anyarmy personnel to be stationed permanently.

"Two hundred such shelters have been built by China in our territory 15-18 km inside the LAC (Line of Actual Control)," shealleged.

Why has there not been a single statement from Prime Minister Modi, government or the Ministry of External Affairs, Shrinate



asked. "Remember, Depsang and Demchok are extremely strategic places for us. Also, remember China continues to occupy large parts of territory in the Depsang area," she

Shrinate also showed photographs of what she said were satellite images showing that China is doing "huge fortification" both on land and at sea.

"In fact, around the Pangong Tso lake area, China has built a PLA division headquarter, a garrison, artillery and antiaircraft gun shelter," she claimed.

"China getting is emboldened by the abject pin drop silence of Modi and the clean chit that the prime minister has given that 'nobody has entered our territory'," Shrinate said.

Posing questions for the prime minister, Shrinate asked why the prime minister is "looking in the other direction when permanent shelters and fortifications are being built in the Demchok and the Depsang areas".

What steps are being taken to remove these fortifications and structures, she asked.

Shrinate also asked what steps are being taken to push away the Chinese from the Depsang and Demchok

"Moreimportantly, whatis nationalism? You are so eager to issue certificates of nationalism to anybody that you warrant to. Is

nationalism looking the other way and keeping the eyes shut and meeting the Chinese president with your open arms after 20 of your bravehearts have died," Shrinate said.

"The one question that Indian armed forces are raising, the one question several army personnel past and present are raising, defence experts are raising, is when will India return to status quo ante of April 2020 and what steps are being taken to ensure status quo ante is restored," Shrinate

She also asserted that the Congress will raise these issues at all forums available, including Parliament.

Theeastern Ladakh border standoff between India and China erupted on May 5, 2020, following a violent clash in the Pangong lake areas. Both sides gradually enhanced their deployment by rushing in tens of thousands of soldiers and heavy weaponry.

As a result of a series of military and diplomatic talks, the two sides completed the disengagement process last year on the north and south banks of the Pangong lake and in the Gogra area.

The disengagement in the Pangong Lake area took place in February last year while the withdrawal of troops and equipment in Patrolling Point 17 (A) in Gogra took place in August last year.

Shri. Abhishek Bhukal appreciated the Department of Home Science for taking

India go Into Bangladesh ODI Series with One Eye on Next Year's World Cup

December 4: Since the combination of captain Rohit Sharma and coach Rahul Dravid tookover after the 2021 T20 World Cup, India have played 21 ODIs, the joint-highest for a Test side along with the West Indies in this period. Of course, almost all of these games slipped under the radar in a T20 World Cup year, but not anymore.

After the three-match away series against Bangladesh starting on Sunday, India have at least 12 more ODIs lined up at home, plus potentially half a dozen more in the next Asia Cup in similar conditions, as they build up to the 2023 World Cup which they will host.

After the recent ODI series in New Zealand that was hampered by rain, stand-in skipper for the tour Shikhar Dhawan had said that all these upcoming ODIs in South Asian conditions, starting with the Bangladesh series, would be a more "practical" way to prepare for the World Cup. Dhawan's point is bolstered by India's recent past; of the 21 ODIs they have played under this team management, only six have been at home, and all the rest have in fact been played outside Asia – in South Africa, England, West Indies, Zimbabwe and New Zealand.

Also, the Bangladesh tour is the first time captain Rohitand former captain Virat Kohli will be playing ODI crickets ince the England tour in July. Another first-choice player, KL Rahul, hitby one injury or another and workloadmanaged as well, has played a mere six ODI innings since as far back as March 2021. So it will be after quite some time that India will have at their disposal a moreor-less first-choice ODI batting line-up of Rohit, Dhawan, Kohli, Shreyas Iyer, Rahul and Rishabh Pant, with the exception of the rested Hardik Pandya and, arguably, Suryakumar Yadav.

Given this fact, it remains to be seen what kind of opportunities the likes of Ishan Kishan, Rahul Tripathi and Rajat Patidar get. Considering there has been only a three-day gap between the end of the New Zealand tour and the first ODI in Dhaka, therecould be acase for giving some of the fringe players a go on Sunday, and the



regulars – Dhawan, Iyer and Pant – who have flown in from Christchurch – could play the remaining two matches. It was considering this short interval between the two away series that theselectors had picked a 17-man squadfor Bangladesh, as the nowoutgoing chief selector Chetan Sharma had informed then.

Therewill be more opportunities available on the bowling front, with Mohammed Shami's injury now added to the continued absence of Jasprit Bumrah and Ravindra Jadeja. The wrist-spin pair of Yuzvendra Chahal and Kuldeep Yadav is not part of this trip as well, with the finger-spin of Axar Patel and Washington Sundar expected to be effective on the slow pitches in Bangladesh. Again, with pacers Shardul Thakur, Deepak Chahar and Umran Malik flying in from New Zealand, will Kuldeep Sen get an opportunity on Sunday? And if and when Umran Malik plays, how potent will he be on these surfaces?

The Indian attack is coming off a poor ODI series in New Zealand. They were blown away by Tom Latham and Kane Williamson in Auckland, unable to exert much pressure while defending 306. They had only 219 to work with in Christchurch, but on a helpful track, were again in effective as New Zealand moved to 104 for 1 in 18 overs before rain ended the match

Conditions will be vastly different in Bangladesh, but the opponents could be no less tricky. Bangladesh do not get enough

creditfor having built up a formidable ODI record at home over the past decade or so – they have lost just one series since 2014. On India's last trip there, back in 2015, they lost the ODI series 1-2.

Rohitis wellaware of the challenge the hosts could pose. "In the last 7-8 years, the Bangladesh team has been a different team, a very challenging team. We have not had easy wins against them. We have had to play good cricket towin against themand every time we played them, it has been a close game. Even in the T20 World Cup, it was a close game," Rohitsaid ahead of the series opener.

"And we lost the 2015 series last time we were here. By no means do wecome herethinkingthat it is going tobea cakewalkforus. We know they are a good team, a very improved team in the last few years, so we will have toplay good cricket to win this. It is not going to be easy for us."

Even without the presence of the injured Tamim Igbal and Taskin Ahmed, Bangladesh have the services of veterans Shakib Al Hasan, Mushfigur Rahim and Mahmudullah in the middle order. Liton Das, who had India worried in the T20 World Cup with a sparkling knock, will lead in Tamim's absence, and the crafty Mustafizur Rahman, who announced himself to the world with a five-for on debut against the Indians in 2015, will lead the bowling attack. With a series win against the neighbours in their backyard no longer guaranteed, especially in this format. India have some work to do. At the same time, they also have the World Cup at the back of their minds, but Rohit said that it was important not to get too caught up just with the ultimategoal. "The World Cup is still 8-9 months from now. We cannot think so far ahead. We will keep an eye on what we need to do as a team, where we need to improve," he said.


