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## Keshav Chandra inaugurates 2-week workshop on 'Bird Identification & Basic Ornithology'

PORT BLAIR, NOV 15/--/ Mr. Keshav Chandra, Chief Secretary on Tuesday inaugurated the two-week workshop on 'Bird Identification & Basic Ornithology'. The workshop was organized by the Zoological Survey of India, A&N Regional Centre, Port Blair under the Accelerate Vigyan, Science & Engineering Research Board (SERB), Department of Science & Technology, Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India

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Addressing the gathering, the Chief Secretary thanked the Department of Science & Technology, GoI for taking the initiative in providing skill training under Accelerate Vigyan. He elucidated the most basic of bird watching definition, aside from simply watching or listening to birds, most birders go

a few steps by documenting their observations, identifying the birds, and sharing their findings with fellow bird enthusiasts. The Chief Secretary also mentioned that birding meaning is inextricably rooted in an appreciation and sense of wonder at the avian species in bird watchers and this is what everyone from novice bird watcher to expert birder has in common. He also highlighted how he expanded his species list with every trip and experience birding in different habitats with Dr. C. Sivaperuman, Officer-in-Charge, Zoological Survey of India. Landscape

photography is his passions have taught him to wake up before sunrise, and later he has shifted to Bird Photography also. He has beautifully described how bird watching can shape an individual's personality by developing the perseverance and patience of the watcher. He concluded by giving remarks upon the serenity and pristine beauty of these islands which attracts many bird watchers and flourishes an unimaginable biodiversity and wished ZSI for taking up this kind of activities. Dr. R.S.C. Jayaraj, Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, Andaman and Nicobar Islands highlighted about the collaboration between the Forests Department and ZSI in which they have carried out surveys from Landfall to Indira Point. The PCCF is also emphasised about the bird tourism and the value of education in this industry. He also mentioned to the students about the various new job opportunities waiting in the tourism industry and others etc. Dr. P. Vijayachari, Director, ICMR In his speech

mentioned the significance of Bird identification in basic and applied sciences and how these two embed into medical sciences. He signified the urgency in the need of more specialised experts in the field of ornithology in our country. Along with the experts he put forward the importance of youth of these islands in similar kinds of programme. He emphasized the status of inter-sectorial co-ordination between Animal Science, Veterinary Science, Health Science and local Community. The speaker also cited the interconnection between Zoonotic disease and biodiversity. Dr. C. Sivaperuman, Officer-in-Charge, ZSI, Port Blair, welcomed the dignitaries, guests, participants and other officials. In his welcome address he glided through the history of Zoological Survey of India through these hundred years and how it



has shaped the survey methodologies. ZSI, Port Blair, has conducted certificate courses on Para-Taxonomy, including People's Biodiversity Register under the Green Skill Development Programme (GSDP) of the Skill India Mission since 2017 and trained more than 100 local unemployed youths. Of which many of them joined in different departments of A & N Administration. There were mentions about the Bird Hazards studies which were carried out in the Naval Air Station of Port Blair, Campbell Shibpursince 2013 recommendations have been submitted for the hazard management. The faunal communities of marine and terrestrial ecosystems of these islands are being inventorized by the Centre by conducting exploratory surveys. Since its inception, about 95 research programmes have been completed on several faunal groups of this archipelago. The major areas of studies at this Centre are on Taxonomy, Ecology and Zoogeography of

terrestrial ecosystems. ZSI, Port Blair is a Nodal Centre on National Coral Reef Research Institute (NCRRI) for monitoring the coral reef research in Indian waters, in which he thanked the A & N Administration for allotment of land. The ZSI, Port Blair is recognized research centre for Ph.D., M.Phil., in Ecology, Taxonomy, Zoogeography, Marine Biology and Fisheries; P.G. Diploma in Animal Taxonomy and Biodiversity under Pondicherry University, Puducherry. This centre is also recognized field training centre for Islands Biodiversity by Indira Gandhi National Forests Academy (IGNFA) and Tamil Nadu Forests Academy, Coimbatore (TNFA). MoEF&CC, GOI recognized as a training centre under the Forestry &Research Training on Coastal and Marine Biodiversity for the Personals of Other Services

and Other Stakeholders. It is also one of the training centre under the Accelerate Vigyanprogramme (AV), Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB), Department of Science & Technology, GOI Over the period, the ZSI, Port Blair reported more than 11,000 species of fauna (both terrestrial and marine), presently ZSI, Port Blair holds about 1,80,000 preserved (Dry & Wet) specimens of various faunal group, of which 3500 of 22 faunal group are displayed in its museum for the viewing of researchers, students, and general public, which is recently renovated. The scientists of this centre have reported more

than 20 new species to science from different faunal group, which includes Narcondam Tree Shrew, besides about 900 new records to A & N Islands, India, & Southeast Asia from this archipelago. The valedictory function has concluded with the vote of thanks proposed by Dr. C. Sivaperuman, Officer-in-Charge, Zoological Survey of India. The programme was also attended by Officers from Department of Environment & Forests, Botanical Survey of India, Fishery Survey of India, Anthropological Survey of India, Andaman and Lakshadweep Harbour Works, Pondicherry University and GB Pant Hospital. The Inaugural Function was

started with a prayer song and lighting of traditional lamp. About 31 participants have registered for this two week workshop.



## SC appoints amicus curiae to help it decide if lawmakers can claim immunity from prosecution for taking bribe to vote

NEW DELHI, NOV 15 /--/ The Supreme Court on Tuesday appointed senior advocate P S Patwalia as amicus curiae to assist it in examining whether an MP or MLA can claim immunity fromcriminalprosecutionfor taking bribe to make a speech or vote in the Legislative Assembly or Parliament.

A five-judge constitution bench headed by Justice SA Nazeer also asked advocate Gaurav Agarwal to assist Patwalia in the matter. The bench also comprising Justices B R Gavai, A S Bopanna, V Ramasubramanian, and BV Nagarathna, said it will hear the issue on December 6, 2022. In 2019, a bench headed by then chief justice Ranjan Gogoi andcomprising Justices S Abdul NazeerandSanjivKhannahad referred to a five-judge bench the crucial question, noting it had "wide ramification" and was of "substantial public importance". The three-judge bench had then said it will revisit its 24-year-old verdict in the sensational Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM) bribery case on an appeal

filed by Sita Soren, a JMM **MLAfromJamaconstituency** in Jharkhand.

The top court, in its 1998 five-judge constitution bench verdict delivered in the PV Narasimha Rao versus CBI case, had held that parliamentarians had immunity under the Constitutionagainstcriminal prosecution for any speech made and vote cast inside the

house. She had appealed against the Jharkhand High Court order of February 17, 2014 refusing to quash a criminal case lodged against herfor allegedly taking bribe to vote for a particular candidate in the Rajya Sabha elections held in 2012. She was charged by the CBI with allegedly taking bribe from one candidate and voting for another. Sita Soren is the

daughter-in-law of former union minister Jharkhand chief minister Shibu Soren, who was a key accused in the JMM bribery case. Shibu Soren, along with his four-party MPs, had allegedly taken bribe to vote against the no-confidence motion against the then PV Narasimha Rao government at the Centre in July 1993.

## Financial relief for next of kin of deceased Hope Town resident



## G20: For India, uneasy lies the head ...

India will host the next G20 summit in September next year. It is definitely a testimony to India's growing clout in international geopolitics. India's G20 presidency hopes to provide new strength, direction and perspective to discussions on diverse subjects which include green development, digital transformation, women-led development and greater voice to the Global South in issues of international economic cooperation. The G20 is a premier forum for international economic cooperation and it plays a crucial role in shaping and strengthening the global architecture and governance on all major international economic and development issues. G20 members represent around 85 per cent of the global GDP, over 75 per cent of the global trade and about two thirds of the world's population. Since the global economy is facing unprecedented uncertainties and instabilities and as the Central Banks across the globe tread into unchartered territories of QT (quantitative tightening), the role of the G20, as a platform connecting developed and emerging economies of the world, assumes greater significance in shaping global trends and practices. With the G20 Presidency, which India is going to assume on 1 December 2022, the country is sure to obtain the opportunities to showcase its leadership abilities at world stage.

Constituted in 1999 in the wake of the 1997 global financial crisis as a new group of countries having systemic economic influence, the G20 has a wide set of issues on its agenda ranging from financial stability, debt burden, Sustainable Development Goals, health crisis to food security. By assuming G20 Presidency, India will be able to focus on issues of critical global importance, put forth its narratives on development models and bring its strengths as the largest democracy and fastest growing economy of the world to bear on the G20 agenda. There is little doubt that, G20 being a key institution of global governance, India's role in it and prospects for Presidency would be keenly watched by the world powers. In the fast changing geo-political atmosphere, all accept the fact that India's inclusive governance model with emphasis on multilateralism and pluralism, promises one of the finest years of G20 leadership, where G20 can make a serious contribution to making globalisation fairer, sustainable, besides transforming the processes of international negotiations. And now India's presidency promises a lot more when it comes to reforming processes, contents and intents of negotiations and then multilateral engagements of greater hues and magnitude. Especially, the food security situation has worsened with growing conflicts, and spiralling climate crises marked by droughts, floods, cyclones, and economic downturns in the past few years. In this context, India's presidency of the G20 offers a historical opportunity for the country to share its successful journey in moving from a fooddeficit nation to a food-surplus nation. India's presidency of the G20 can also be utilised to address the growing challenges of food security for creating resilient and equitable food systems. After all, as the saying goes, uneasy lies the head that wears the crown.

## Retired CJI did a lot in his 74 days in Supreme Court

As we speak of a new Chief Justice of India ('CJI') being sworn-in, much has been written and said about the former CJI UdayUmeshLalit. It is difficult, if not impossible, to add anything new to the wealth of literature available on the subject. Yet, it must be said: Justice Lalit came with legacy.

Justice Lalit's grandfather, Ranganath Lalit was a prominent practising lawyer in Solapur, a town in Maharashtra which, to this day, is renowned for its enterprise and textile industry. His father, UmeshLalit was a judge of the Bombay High Court, who resigned during the Emergency, in protest against his transfer during his brief tenure. He was one of the founding members of the Akhil Bharatiya Adhivakta Parishad, an organisation of lawyers associated with the rightwing, Hindu nationalist volunteer organisation, the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh. Naturally, when Justice Lalit assumed the office of the CJI, there were fears about his own loyalties to the ruling dispensation. They were allayed as he displayed his independence from his former clients, which included the present Union Home Minister, Amit Shah.

His judicial philosophy was best expressed in his approach to bail. He granted bail to high profile undertrials including poet, activist and teacher Dr. P. Varavara Rao, civil rights activist and journalist Teesta Setalvad and journalist Siddique Kappan, who were languishing in jail. Kappan, though, continues to suffer incarceration because of denial of bail in the Enforcement Directorate case against him by a Prevention of Money Laundering Act Court, his appeal against which was not placed before or heard by ex-CJI Lalit.

Given Justice Lalit's brief tenure, he chose to leave a legacy on the administrative side by setting up more than one Constitution Bench and clearing arrears to the extent possible. What endeared him to the Bar was that he was one of them, opening up for this generation of lawyers a dream to chase if appointed to the Bench at a young age to become the CJI rather than continue indefinitely as a practising lawyer. After him, the next directly-appointed advocate to become CJI, if all goes well, will be Justice P.S. Narasimha. Beginning his career in Delhi, in the chambers of late senior advocate and jurist Soli Sorabjee, he could not have gone wrong. From then on, he got all the right

breaks. Assisting senior advocate Harish Salve as amicus in T.N. Godavarman Thirumulpad versus Union of India (1995) at the Supreme Court, he rose to prominence and acquired a public profile. He was often seen at judicial seminars as a resource person – a sure road to success.

Justice Lalit's appointment as special public prosecutor in the 2G case by the Supreme Court recognised his expertise in criminal law. In hindsight, one may say he was the chosen one. For me personally, what stands out most was his demeanour as a judge, indeed reflecting his human qualities. Polite to a fault, I never saw him lose his temper even with those who deserve a mouthful. It was always a pleasure appearing in his court. He tried his best to achieve closure in the senior designation matter; nevertheless, he had no option but to refer the on-going controversy to a larger bench of three judges. Regardless, the process, which was in cold storage in the Supreme Court, was kick-started under his tenure and will soon be complete. How and why was the challenge to the judgement of the Bombay High Court discharging scholar, writer and human rights activisit Dr. G.N. Saibaba and six others in an alleged Maoist links case listed on a Saturday? That weekend, in fact, CJI Lalit was travelling to Solapur and hence I had my doubts as to who constituted the bench. On Friday that week, Justice Dr. D.Y. Chandrachud had already said that there was no hurry and the CJI could be approached for listing of the matter on any urgent ground. Naturally, therefore, the decision to list on a Saturday was that of the master of the roster.


Moving on to the constitution of the bench, the division bench comprising Justices M.R. Shah and Bela M. Trivedi, which heard the appeal against the Bombay high court's judgement, was not a bench which was in session ordinarily. Folklore has it that during a weekend, few judges are available in Delhi. Given the unprecedented order of suspension of an order setting the accused at liberty, this matter

remains an unresolved mystery. Given Justice Lalit's reputation of being transparent, an explanation could have been in order. Since there can be as many approaches to a case as there are judges in the court, this was a conscious choice. But why? The answer will be blowing in the wind till we get one from former CJI Lalit. The stay of the Bombay High Court's order discharging Dr. Saibaba has brought the reputation of the Supreme Court down and resulted in a loss of confidence in the court. It is childish to pretend that judges have no political philosophy, overt or covert. The polarisation among them reflects in which petitions the court chooses to entertain on a daily basis and from the profile of the petitioners. In a situation of this kind, it is imperative for the CJI to demonstrate neutrality and commitment to the

The court awaits reform in this respect. The most frightening debate during his tenure was the dog whistle often made by the then Attorney General for India, K.K. Venugopal, that the age of retirement of Supreme Court judges should be extended. That could well have happened, especially since CJI Lalit had a tenure of only 74 days. Thankfully, it did not happen, paving the way for Justice Dr. Chandrachud to fulfil his legitimate expectation of being elevated as the 50th CJI. Yet, I believe that given the majoritarian basis of the politics of this country, every CJI must feel insecure, sadly so, despite constitutional guarantees of a secure tenure. Watching the swearing-in of Chief Justice Dr. Chandrachud on Wednesday morning, I was impressed by the smooth transition of power, where the old order changed giving way to the new. There was no Trump-like effort to allege the stealing of constitutional office. But for how long? Given the Union Law Minister KirenRijiju's lament that the power to appoint judges has been hijacked by the judiciary, we are most likely going to see a move to shift this power back to the Executive. It is then that the Bar and the Bench will be truly tested.

The wish list from CJI Dr. Chandrachud is long and lengthy. But above all, I look forward to seeing a commitment to liberty, a restoration of eroded secular values, and a check on majoritarianism and an anti-Constitutional concentration of power in the hands of the Executive. (IPA)

## New CJI is a person of diverse interests

Supreme Court Justice D Y Chandrachud took over as the Chief Justice of India on November 9 following the superannuation of Chief Justice U ULalit who was in the position for only 74 days. New CJI Chandrachud will remain in his position for two years.

Chandrachud has endeared himself to a vast majority of court watchers with the manner in which he manages his court. His demeanour is said to be refreshingly different. If his humility is a rare quality in a person of his stature, he puts everyone at ease with his sense of humour.

Often at 4pm, he asks the lawyers in his court, "Don't you feel the urge for a cup of tea? Some time back, as the clock struck four, he elaborated on his love for tea and spoke about how he felt a strong craving for the beverage at that hour, which also happens to be the time

for the court to wrap up for the day. He recalled that when he was a lawyer in the Bombay High Court, he would have his tea in the staff canteen which was next to a courtroom. When he became a judge, he sat in the same courtroom, while he could not just enter the canteen anymore.

As Chief Justice of the Allahabad High Court, since the lawyers were more comfortable arguing in Hindi, he would help them shed their hesitation to switch from English to Hindi by starting off in his 'Bambaiya Hindi'. Proceedings would commence in English but would shift soon to Hindi and lawyers appreciated the efforts he

the day. He took to make the situation more a lawyer in convenient for them.

He also won admirers with his ability to differ from the established ways of working. Recently, he observed in his court with reference to providing the larger population with access to court proceedings: "Yesterday, I saw someone using a mobile phone, perhaps recording what we were saying during the proceedings. Initially, I thought, how can he record the proceedings? But then my thoughts changed. What is the big idea? It is an open court hearing. Nothing is confidential here."

The 63-year-old Chandrachud, enjoys a rock-star appeal in legal

corridors and beyond. It is much for his youthful smile and non-stuffy persona as his ability to sympathise with human sufferings, giving law a playmates including the likes of children of film star ShashiKapoor as also kids from the servants quarters. "He is a hard worker. He has no vice except for his obsession with work. He has ability to built bridges and reach out to people who may not be in agreement. I am confident that as CJI he will be able take along his judge colleagues and also reach out to the bar and resolve their issues", said an eminent lawyer.

Chandrachud's first wife, Rashmi, had died from cancer in 2007. Some years later, he married Kalpana Das, who was formerly working with the British Council. His elder son, Abhinav, practices law at the Bombay High Court and younger son, Chintan, is employed with a law firm in the UK. (IPA).

## My head hangs in shame, says Delhi HCCJ over nonpayment of compensation to kin of sewer death victims

NEW DELHI, NOV 15 /--/ "My head hangs inshame,"the Delhi High Court Chief Justice said on Tuesday, lamenting the "complete unsympathetic attitude" of the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) towards the families of two people who died inside a sewer

The high court, which was annoyed over non-compliance with its October 6 order by which the DDA was directed to pay Rs 10 lakh compensation each to the families of the deceased, said it had asked the authorities to pay the amount to the vicitims' kin as they had lost their sole bread earners in the incident. Pursuant to the high court's direction, DDA Vice Chairman Manish Gupta was present at the hearing. A sweeper and a security guard had died on September 9 in Outer Delhi's Mundka area after they inhaled toxic gases inside a sewer. The incident occurred when a sweeper had gone down to clean the sewer and fainted. A security guard who rushed to his rescue also fell unconscious. and both died.

The high court, which was hearing a public interest litigation (PIL) initiated by the court on its own based on a news report of the incident, expressed displeasure over non-payment of Rs 10 lakh each by the DDA to the victims' families and said "not even a single penny" was released by the authority. It, however, noted that as a part of a separate compensation, the Delhi government has paidRs1lakheachtothetwofamilies and the remaining Rs 9 lakh will be paid to them within 15 days. "We are dealing with people who are working for us so that our life is made comfortable. And this is the manner and method they are being dealt with by the authorities. Very unfortunate," a bench of Chief Justice Satish Chandra Sharma and Justice Subramonium Prasad said. The chief justice added, "My head hangs in shame." "From October 6, we are now on November 15. When the court had directed DDA to pay the amount, why it was not done? This is the question," the bench said.

of the Delhi government to pay the amount. Delhi government standing counsel Santosh Kumar Tripathi submitted the DDA was trying to mix up the compensation which is to be paid as per the Supreme Court order and that the amount of Rs 10 lakh to be paid by the Delhi government was by a cabinet decision of March 5, 2020. The bench said the question of liability could have been decided later on but the anxiety of the court was that, as an immediate measure, something needed to be given to the affected families. On being asked by the bench about the total annual budget of the DDA, the Vice Chairman said it was Rs 3,000 crore. "You have the budget of Rs 3,000 crore and we requested you to pay only Rs 10 lakh as an immediate measure and you came up with all kinds of excuses. Later we could have adjusted the amount by fixing the responsibility. We asked you to pay so that there is some financial and emotional sense of security to the families who have lost their bread earners." the bench said.

On the issue of rehabilitating and giving compassionate appointment to one of the family members of the deceased who was an employee of the DDA, the agency urged the court to grant 15 days for the purpose. The court said, "We are not concerned with any other compassionate appointments. This one has to be done on priority basis." It granted 15 days-time to DDA for doing that. "The conduct of DDA reflects complete unsympathetic attitude towards the deceased' families," the court observed. On October 6, the court had directed the DDA, under whose jurisdiction the incident took place, to pay Rs 10 lakh each as compensation to the families of the deceased and consider granting compassionate appointment. It had also sought the presence of the authority's vice chairman in case the order was not complied with till November 14. The court had then remarked it was unfortunate that even after 75 years of Independence, the poor were forced to work as manual scavengers. On September 12, the high court had taken cognizance of the two deaths and directed that a PIL be registered. (PTI)

## J&Kpanchayatmembers' body demands allowance for gram sabhas to award works up to Rs 3 lakh

JAMMU, NOV 15 /--/ A representative body of elected panchayat members on Tuesday alleged that the Jammu and Kashmir administration's decision to resort to e-tendering even for small works was depriving educated youths from local villages of employment avenues. The All Jammu and Kashmir Panchayat Conference (AJKPC) also demanded that works up to Rs 3 lakh should be sanctioned by gram sabhas. The AJKPC alleged that the works done by contractors under the capex budget in rural areas were of very low quality. The contractors also don't pay heed to the requests of gram sabha members while district officials ignore the panches and sarpanches, it said. "Despite repeated prayers to the government and assurances by senior officers, even tenders for petty works are being allotted by e-tendering, which is not only undermining the autonomy of gram sabhas but also depriving the local educated youth of emavenues. ployment AJKPC chief

A White House readout said Biden met Modi and President Joko Widodo of Indonesia on the margins of the G20 summit in Bali to reaffirm their shared commitment to the G20 as the premier forum for international economic cooperation. "Facing significant global challenges, the leaders discussed how the G20 continues to demonstrate its collective capacity to bring together major economies to advance sustainable and inclusive growth in our economies and beyond, tackle the ongoing climate, energy, and food crises, strengthen global health architecture and promote technological transformation," it said.

The readout said Biden applauded Indonesia's G20 Presidency and that he looks forward to continuing to support the G20's work under India's Presidency. The MEA said the two leaders expressed satisfaction about close cooperation between India and US in new groupings such as Quad and I2U2. While the Quad comprises India, the US, Australia and Japan, the members of the I2U2 are India, Israel, the US and the United Arab Emirates. On the Modi-Biden meeting, MEA spokesperson Arindam Bagchi described the conversation as "useful exchange". "A useful exchange between PM @narendramodi & @POTUS @ Loo Biden on

sidelines of G20 Bali Summit. Leaders appreciated the continuing deepening of India-US Strategic Partnership & close cooperation in groups like Quad, I2U2, etc. Agreed to maintain close coordination during #G20India," he tweeted. Modi and Biden held the conversation days after external affairs minister S Jaishankar met US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on the sidelines of the ASEAN-India Summit in the Cambodian capital of Phnom Penh. Jaishankar and Blinken discussed a range of issues including bilateral ties, the Ukraine conflict and the situation in the Indo-Pacific among others. Since the Ukraine conflict began in February. Prime Minister Modi spoke to Russian President Vladimir Putin as well as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy a number of times. In a phone conversation with Zelenskyy on October 4. Modi said that there can be "no military solution" and that India is ready to contribute to any peace efforts. In his meeting with Russian President Putin in the Uzbek city of Samarkand in September, Modi conveyed to him that "today's era is not of war". India has not vet condemned the Russian invasion of Ukraine and it has been maintaining that the crisis must be resolved through diplomacy and dialogue.

## Centre should do away with GST if it can't clear our dues: Mamata

JHARGRAM, NOV 15 /--/ Launching a tirade against the BJP-led Union government, chief minister Mamata Banerjee on Tuesday said the Centre should do away with the Goods and Services Tax (GST) regime if it is unable to clear the dues it owed to the

Mamata wondered if she would have to "beg" to get the dues cleared. Addressing a rally in the tribaldominated Belpahari area of the Jhargram district, she said the BJP-led government must either make the payment or the party must step down from the seat of power. "They are not releasing funds under the MNREGA scheme. The BJP has to step down from power if it does not clear our dues. The Centre must scrap GST if it is can't clear the state's dues ('Jodi amader bokeya na dey, tahole bondo kore dik GST'). "They are not doing us any favour by giving us GST dues; it is people's money that they have taken through GST," she said at the birth anniversary programme of tribal freedom fighter Birsa Munda. Mamata said that she had also met Prime Minister Narendra Modi and raised the matter. "We had agreed on implementing the GST; we thought the Centre would clear our dues. But

money collected as GST but not giving us our dues. I had met the Prime Minister and requested him, but nothing moved forward. Are we supposed to beg for it? "Why should we pay GST if the Centre is not clearing our dues? If the Centre can't give us the money, we can also stop paying GST. (Amrao tho bondho kore dite pari, keno GST tax debo?) The country is for the people, not for politicians. This is not BJP's money," Mamata said. Listing out schemes, "under which funds have been withheld", the chief minister said Union government is constitutionally bound to pay the state for the 100-day work scheme.


"I would like to tell the Central government that releasing funds for the 100-day work scheme is a constitutional norm. The Centre must pay; it is not an obligation, but a compulsion as the law has been passed by both Houses of the Parliament," she said. Hitting out at Bengal BJP leadership for asserting that it would ensure the Centre stopped fund flow to the state, Mamata sought to know if that money was "personal property" of saffron party leaders. Later, interacting with the locals, Banerjee claimed that shortage of central funds

was the primary reason for the piped water project under Jal Jeevan Mission to have come to a halt. "By 2024, all the houses were to get piped drinking water. But the Centre has stopped giving funds, which is why the project has come to a halt. Once they pay, we will start implementing it. We are fighting against the injustice meted out to us by the Centre," she said.

Meanwhile, reacting to Mamata's allegations, BJP leader Rahul Sinha said fund flow was stopped as the TMC government failed to submit utilisation certificates on the money spent under MNREGA. "Let the state government first submit the utilization certificate for the funds received earlier; only then it will start receiving funds again," Sinha said. Earlier in the day, Mamata had tweeted that Munda taught people the importance of respecting and protecting indigenous rights. "I pay my humble respects to 'Dharti Aba', brave revolutionary Birsa Munda on his Birth Anniversary. As a true son of the soil, he taught us the importance of respecting and protecting indigenous rights. May we continue to be steadfast on the path shown by him. Jai Johar!" she wrote. (PTI)

Rahul, who is leading the party's Bharat Jodo Yatra, has not campaigned so far in the poll-bound states of Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh. Ashok Gehlot and Bhupesh Baghel, the chief ministers of Congress-ruled Rajasthan and Chhattisgarh, are also among the star campaigners for the December 1 and 5 polls in Gujarat, the home state of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The Congress is seeking to oust the BJP from power in the state and had put up a good fight in 2017 assembly elections. The BJP has been in power in the state for over 27 years now. Among the other star campaigners listed by the party are AICC general secretary Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, CLP leader in Kerala Ramesh Chennithala, former chief ministers Digvijaya Singh, Kamal Nath, Bhupinder Singh Hooda and Ashok Chavan. Besides, AICC general secretary Tariq Anwar, CLP leader in Karnataka assembly B K Hariprasad, senior party leaders Mohan Prakash, Shaktisinh Gohil and AICC in-charge for party affairs in Gujarat Raghu Sharma are also listed by the Congress as its star campaigners. ## India undertaking arduous effort to fight climate change: environment minister

NEW DELHI, NOV 15 /--/ India is undertaking an arduous effort to fight climate change despite accounting for less than four per cent of the world's cumulative emissions so far, Union environment minister Bhupender Yadav said on Tuesday. Delivering the national statement at the UN climate summit in Egypt, Yadav said India responded to the call for increased ambition in the 2030 climate targets and updated its Nationally Determined Contributions in August. "India, home to 1.3 billion people, is undertaking this arduous effort despite the reality that our contribution to the world's cumulative emissions so far is less than 4 per cent and our annual per capita emissions are about onethird of the global average," he said. The minister said the country has embarked on far-reaching new initiatives in renewable energy, e-mobility, ethanol blended fuels, and green hydrogen as an alternate energy source. It seeks to foster strong international cooperation through action and solutions-oriented coalitions like International Solar Alliance and the Coalition of Disaster Resilience Infrastructure, both of which were launched and nurtured by India, Yadav said. "This is a testimony to our ethos of collective action for global good," he said. Yadav mentioned that India would assume the presidency of the G20 in 2023 with the motto of 'One Earth, One Family, One Future'. "Our journey towards a planet safe for humanity is one that no nation can undertake alone. This is a collective journey to be undertaken with equity and climate justice as our guiding principles," he said. "We hope that the fight against climate change will unite the world as one family," the minister said. Yadav underscored that 'LiFE' (Lifestyle for Environment) is at the heart of India's vision of a safe planet. The LiFE is a propeople and pro-planet effort that seeks to shift the world from mindless and wasteful consumption to mindful and deliberate utilisation of natural resources. (PTI)

## Everyone living in India is 'Hindu': Mohan Bhagwat

AMBIKAPUR, NOV 15 /--/ Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) chief Mohan Bhagwat on Tuesday said every person living in the country is a 'Hindu' and the DNA of all Indians is the same, and asserted there was no need for anyone to change his way of offering rituals

Addressing an event of Swayamsevaks (Sangh volunteers) in Ambikapur, the headquarters of Chhattisgarh's Surguja district, he repeatedly highlighted unity in diversity as India's age-old feature and said Hindutva is the only idea in the world that believes in taking everyone along. "We have been telling since 1925 (when RSS was founded) that everyone living in India is a Hindu. The Sangh's work is to build individual and national character and bring unity among people," added the RSS leader. He emphasised on respecting everyone's faith and asserted the DNA of all Indians is the same and they had common ancestors. "Despite having diversities we all are like one We had common ancestors. Every Indian who is part of the 40,000-year old 'Akhand Bharat' has common DNA. Our ancestors had taught that everyone should stick to their faith and rituals and not try to convert others' faith. Every path leads to a common place," said Bhagwat. The RSS



leader called for respecting all religious faiths and their rituals. "Respect everyone's faith and rituals. Accept everyone and walk on your own way. Fulfil your wishes, but don't be so selfish to not take care of wellbeing of others," he added. Bhagwat said the entire country fought the coronavirus pandemic unitedly. "Our culture connects us. No matter how much we fight among ourselves, we become united in times of crises. We fight together when the country faces some kind of trouble. During the coronavirus pandemic the whole country stood as one to deal with it," he maintained.

## G-20 to hold tough on Russia, urge end to Ukraine war

NUSA DUA (INDONESIA), NOV 15/--/Leaders of the world's largest economies appeared ready on Tuesday to convey a strong message from most condemning Russia's invasion of Ukraine, as President Joe Biden and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy pressed the group to maintain pressure on Moscow over its nine-month war that has devastated Ukraine and roiled the global economy. A draft declaration by leaders of the Group of 20 major economies under discussion on Tuesday echoes the condemnation of Russia's war on Ukraine by the United Nations, while acknowledging differing

views among members. The

careful wording of the

statement reflects tensions

prevailing at the gathering,

which includes leaders from

Russia and China, and the

challenge facing the US and its allies to isolate Russian President Vladimir Putin's

government as some nations

seek to avoid becoming

entangled in antagonisms

between the big powers. The statement seen on Tuesday by The Associated Press "deplores in the strongest terms the aggression by the Russian Federation" and "demands complete its unconditional withdrawal from the territory of Ukraine". The G-20 draft statement also noted there were different views on the situation and sanctions against Russia, saying that the G-20 was not the forum for resolving security issues.

the summit, Zelenskyy joined Biden in trying to persuade the G-20 to further isolate Russia diplomatically economically, despite a souring global financial outlook that has tested many nations' resolve. Inflation and slowing economies are weighing on countries that have imposed penalties on Russia for starting the war. Higher costs for energy and food have destabilised business activity around the world, as much of Europe prepares to brave the winter without imports of Russian natural gas. In opening the summit, host Indonesian President Joko Widodo impressed on the gathering what's at stake. "If the war does not end, it will be difficult for the world to move forward," he said.

In a video address to the leaders from Kyiv, Zelenskyy reiterated 10 conditions for ending the conflict that began in February, among them a complete withdrawal of Russian troops and full restoration of Ukrainian control of its territory. He spoke days after Ukraine retook the strategic city of Kherson from Russian forces, in his country's latest step in a counteroffensive that has forced Moscow to withdraw its forces from

previously-occupied areas.

"Ukraine should not be offered conclude to compromises with conscience, sovereignty, territory and independence," he said. "Ukraine has always been a leader in peacekeeping efforts, and the world has

# FIFA World Cup: Countdown enters final week with Qatar under microscope

**DOHA, NOV 15 /--/** The week-long countdown to the World Cup in Qatar began on Monday as the world's leading footballers focused their attention on one of the most controversial tournaments in history. After a last weekend of action, domestic leagues paused for six weeks for the global showpiece but preparation time is short for the teams. Γhe first World Cup to be held in the Arab world will kick off on Sunday when the host nation face Ecuador. Holding football's showpiece event in a desert state has necessitated an

unprecedented reorganisation of the international calendar, shifting the World Cup from its normal slot in the northern hemisphere summer to avoid the Gulf's scorching heat. As teams rushed to submit their final squad lists, Iran named Sardar Azmoun, their star player who has expressed support for the demonstrations in his homeland, in their squad. Azmoun, who plays for German club Bayer Leverkusen, has posted several social media messages in support of the protests that were sparked by the death of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini. Dozens of people, mainly demonstrators but also security

personnel, have been killed during the protests, which the authorities have branded as "riots". Activists have called on fans attending Iran's matches in Qatar to chant Amini's name.

Hundreds of Tunisian fans, closely watched by riot police. gave a noisy welcome to their national team in Doha on Monday. Four buses of police with riot gear watched the Tunisians, including some families with children, wait outside the team hotel in the business district of the Qatari capital. The crowds chanted the national anthem and banged drums, surging onto the road as the team arrived and players waved. Two of Europe's big guns, England and the Netherlands, are among the teams due to arrive on Tuesday. Sunday's kickoff marks the culmination of Qatar's extraordinary campaign first to win the vote to land the tournament and then embark on a spending spree of tens of billions of dollars to build stadiums and infrastructure. World governing body FIFA's pleas to "focus on the football" have struggled to be heard as the countdown to kick-off has only increased scrutiny of the country's treatment of migrant workers, women and the LGBTQ community. Labourers from South Asia have been at the centre of an often acrimonious dispute over deaths, injuries and working conditions since Qatar was awarded the World Cup in 2010. Amnesty International has urged FIFA to commit to compensating migrant workers "for abuses suffered" during preparations for the tournament. Qatar has angrily rebuffed most of the attacks and local media have blasted the

"arrogance" of some Western countries. Australian players refused to enlarge on their comments about Qatar's rights record on Monday, saying they were fully focused on a daunting opening match against defending champions France. The Socceroos released a video last month featuring 16 players, in which they spoke out against rights abuses in the Gulf state, although they acknowledged progress had been made. "To be honest I think we timed things well with what was said," Australia forward Mitchell Duke said at the team's training base in Doha. "We've done that purposely before we all came to the camp because our main priority now, once we turned up, was just to focus on the football side of things." Qatar, a country of barely three million people and one of the world's biggest producers of natural gas, has spent lavishly. New stadiums have cost more than \$6.5 billion and a driverless metro system with a price tag of \$36 billion serves five of the eight venues. Some estimates put total infrastructure spending over the past decade at \$200 billion. Organisers have predicted more than one million fans will travel to Qatar. Tournament chiefs say that 2.9 million of the 3.1 million tickets have been sold, with fans waiting outside ticketing centres in hopes of seeing top games. Qatar announced its first arrests of World Cup ticket touts on Monday, with three foreign men detained outside official ticketing centres in Doha. No details were given of their

#### G20 Summit: FIFA appeals for World Cup ceasefire in Ukraine

NUSA DUA, INDONESIA, Nov 15 /--/ The president of the world football body called Tuesday for a one-month ceasefire in Ukraine to mark the World Cup, saying sport could bring people together. FIFA president Gianni Infantino, addressing leaders of the Group of 20 major economies gathered in Bali, said the World Cup opening Sunday in Qatar could serve as a "positive trigger" in the nearly nine-month Russian invasion of Ukraine. "My plea to all of you is to think of a temporary ceasefire for one month for the duration of the World Cup," he told a G20 lunch for the leaders. If not a full ceasefire, there can be "the implementation of some humanitarian corridors or anything that could lead to the resumption of dialogue," he said. (AP)

#### **BWF World Tour Finals relocated from** Guangzhou to Bangkok due to COVID-19

NEW DELHI, NOV 15 /--/ The upcoming BWF World Tour Finals have been shifted from Guangzhou to Bangkok due to COVID-19 and will begin on December 7, a week earlier than originally scheduled, the world badminton body announced on Tuesday. The tournament, which was slated to start on December 14, was preponed due to stadium availability issues. The season-ending event will now be held at the Nimibutr Arena in Bangkok from December 7 to 11. "BWF in consultation with the Chinese Badminton Association (CBA) agreed to relocate the HSBC BWF World Tour Finals 2022 due to the various challenges brought about by the current pandemic situation," the BWF said in a statement. ankle. ## **US Soccer Federation uses** rainbow crest in Qatar

WASHINGTON, Nov 15 /--/ The U.S. Soccer Federation is using a rainbow version of its crest at the Americans' World Cup training facility in Doha, Qatar. The federation, which normally uses a crest with blue lettering and red stripes, changed the stripes to seven different colours at Al Gharrafa training facility, where workouts started Monday ahead of the Americans' World Cup opener against Wales on Nov. 21. The rainbow crest is part of the Be the Change initiative of the USSF and its players, which also called for tougher U.S. gun laws. Qatar has been criticized over attitudes towards LGBTQ fans and the treatment of migrant workers. "When we are on the world stage and we are in a venue like Qatar. it's important to already bring awareness to these issues,' U.S. coach Gregg Berhalter said Monday. "And that's what Be the Change is about, it's not just stateside that we want to bring attention to social issues, it's also abroad. And we recognize that Qatar has made strides, there has been a ton of progress, but there's still some work to do. And it's just about Be the Change basically represents



opportunity to make change or to have change start with them. So I think it's appropriate that we have it here, as well." The USSF said the rainbow crest will not be worn on the field but will be used in areas in Qatar it controls, such as fan parties.

WELLINGTON, NOV 15 /--/ The seasoned Martin Guptill and Trent Boult were on Tuesday dropped from New Zealand's squad for the home limited overs series against India, beginning here on November 18. Opener Guptill has been dropped to accommodate rising star Finn Allen while New Zealand Cricket (NZC) decided to give others an opportunity in the sixmatch series ahead of Boult, who has opted out of a central contract with the board. Allen is primed to face India for the first time after being confirmed in both BLACKCAPS squads for the series. The 23-yearold Allen has already played 23 T20s and eight ODIs, amassing five half-centuries and a hundred. In Boult's absence, Tim Southee, Matt Henry (ODIs only), Lockie Ferguson, Blair Tickner and Adam Milne form the pace attack. Milne is in line to play his first ODI since 2017, building on his return to the T20 International arena during the recent Tri Series and last year's T20 World Cup in the UAE. Head coach Gary Stead said it was never easy leaving out the experience of Boult and Guptill but the team had to keep looking ahead. "When Trent opted out of his NZC contract in August, we indicated that priority would be given to those players with either central or domestic contracts, and that's been the case here," he said in a statement. 'We're all aware of Trent's world class ability, but at this time - as we build towards more global events, we want to give opportunities and experiences to others. "The emergence and success of Finn at the top of the order in white-ball cricket means a guy of the class of

Martin Guptill misses out - that's just the nature of high performance sport." he added. For both New Zealand and India, the preparation for the ODI World Cup next year will begin with the series. "With the 50over World Cup less than a year away we're keen to give Finn every opportunity to keep gaining ODI experience, especially against quality opposition such as India. "The message to both those players (Boult and Guptill) is that there's a lot of international cricket ahead and the door is certainly not closed to them,' said Stead. The tour begins with a three-game T20 International series across Wellington (Nov 18), Tauranga (Nov 20) and Napier (Nov 22), before moving into the ODI series across Auckland (Nov 25), Hamilton (Nov 27) and Christchurch (Nov 30). The one-day series could see Southee become the fifth New Zealander to claim 200 ODI wickets, with the 33-year-old's tally poised on 199. Tom Latham returns as the ODI wicketkeeper with Devon Conway continuing behind the stumps for the T20 side. Kane Williamson will captain both sides with the T20 squad assembling here on Wednesday. All-rounder Jimmy Neesham has been excused from the squad for the third ODI as he prepares for his wedding, with Henry Nicholls the replacement for the final match in Christchurch. Ben Sears (back) and Kyle Jamieson (back) were not considered for selection due to injuries. Stead said it was always a special time having India in the country and was sure the tour would be an exciting one for players and fans alike. . (PTI)
