Travel in MV Dering a nightmarish experience

Port Blair, Nov. 28: Travelling in MV Dering, one of the oldest vessels of the DSS is really a nightmare for the passengers. The aging vessel has only seats for seating and passengers had to complete about 17-18 hours of journey by seating in their seats. This vessel has approachment four cabins and all seats which cannot be converted into sleeping seats to provide comfort to the passengers. As a result passengers have to travel sealed all throughout the night. The Directorate of Shipping Services has come out with the sailing schedule of MV Dering from Port Blair to Diglipur via Mayabunder. While passengers are happy that the sailing schedule of a vessel is being announced in advance, they are equally worried because of the inconvenience the passengers had to face availing the journey of MV Dering. The



vessel has only approachment four cabins and all the other passengers have to complete about 17-18 hours of journey by seating. As per the advance shipping schedule, the sailing timing of MV Dering is in the night. The vessel departs Port Blair at about 7.00 pm in the evening and reach Mayabunder in the early morning and after 4-5 hours of journey Diglipur. This means that

passengers have to travel more than 17 hours to reach Diglipur. Just imagine, is it possible for normal humans to travel such a long journey in a seated position, especially during night hours when people comfortably sleep. The main purpose of night sailing is that people can sleep comfortably in the ship during night and at dawn they can reach their destination. However, by

operating a vessel like MV Dering which has no arrangements for sleeping for the passengers during night hours, the Directorate of Shipping, it seems hardly cares for the comfort of the people. Passengers had to face a lot of hardship while travelling in vessels like MV Dering, an old vessel lacking basic facilities. It is really shameful that the Shipping department which is consuming the bulk of the annual budget of the UT of A&N Islands has no speed boats to operate in this route which can provide both comfort and facilities to the passengers. "It is high time, the Directorate of Shipping Services think about providing comfort to the passengers travelling in MV Dering by either converting the seats into folding seats so that passengers can spend their night by sleeping or deploying some other vessel having sleeping seat facilities", says some passengers.

Assistive devices are given to

PwDs with the aim to improve their independent functioning, to arrest the extent of disability and occurrence of secondary disabilities. Be punchy on munchy

Food regulator FSSAI should cut down on munchies. It's given the snack industry a long four-year-period before front of packet labelling (FOPL) becomes mandatory. And its limits for permissible sugar, salt and fat content in processed foods are very high. Lifestyle diseases like diabetes, hypertension and cardiac ailments are already at alarming levels. Factor in economic costs of morbidities – loss of productivity and household savings. The industry perhaps worries that FOPL will open people's eyes to the reality of processed foods. But that's exactly the point. Processed food is not healthy.

Good practices can start right away without waiting four years. Citizens have a right to know what exactly they are eating and its consequences down the line. Such consumer awareness will force the industry to adhere to safer levels of sugar, salt and fat content. FSSAI is opting for star rating – five stars for the healthiest food and half a star for the unhealthiest. But the positive factors for a higher rating like presence of vegetables, fruits, nuts, millets, fibres, etc are no consolation if the sugar, salt or fat content are also high in the same product. Such a munchy getting a five-star rating will be farcical.

What would help consumers most is knowing what percentage of the recommended dietary allowance (RDA) for a day is met by what they consume. Knowing whether a bar of chocolate meets 50%, 100% or 150% of the RDA for sugar and fat would certainly help. But FSSAI keeps this optional. Further, RDA claims of the packaged food industry need rigorous laboratory testing. FSSAI's baseline reference value for food risk factors at 21 gms per 100 gms serving for sugar in solid foods is too high considering that WHO had recommended keeping daily sugar intake to below 25 gms ideally, way back in 2015.

Should Govt consider using taxation as an instrument to discourage junk foods and incentivise healthy food? Kerala had initiated a "fat tax" on burgers and pizzas in 2016 before the GST rollout in 2017. Products high in sugar, salt and fat can be taxed higher while those low in these parameters get taxed lower. FOPL and regular tax hikes on cigarettes have helped disencentivise smoking. FSSAI should put citizens first. The market will adapt despite the snack food industry's current opposition. After all, everyone has to eat.

COVID NASAL SPRAYS MAY ONE DAY PREVENT AND TREAT INFECTION

We have vaccines to boost our immune response to SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid. We have medicines you can take at home (and in hospital) to treat Covid. Now researchers are trialling something new.

They want to develop drugs that stop the virus getting into the body in the first place. That includes nasal sprays that stop the virus attaching to cells in the nose.

Other researchers are looking at the potential for nasal sprays to stop the virus replicating in the nose, or to make the nose a hostile place to enter the body.

Here's where the science is up to and what we can expect next.

How could we block the virus?



Viral blockade, as the name suggests, is a simple premise based on blocking SARS-CoV-2. In other words, if something gets in its way, the virus cannot attach to a cell and it can't infect you.

As SARS-CoV-2 is a respiratory virus, it makes sense to deliver this type of medicine where the virus mainly enters the body via the nose, in a nasal spray.

There are various groups around the world working on this concept. Some research is still being conducted in the lab. Some agents have progressed to preliminary human trials. None are yet available for widespread use.

Heparin is a common medicine that's been used for decades to thin the blood. Studies in mice show that when heparin is delivered via the nose, it's safe and effective in preventing the virus binding to nose cells. Researchers believe heparin binds to the virus itself and stops the virus attaching to the cells it's trying to infect.

A clinical trial is being conducted in Victoria in collaboration between multiple Melbourne-based research centres and the University of Oxford.

Covixyl-V (ethyl lauroyl arginine hydrochloride) is another nasal spray under development. It aims to prevent Covid by blocking or modifying the cell surface to prevent the virus from infecting.

This compound has been explored for use in various viral infections, and early studies in cells and small animals has shown it can prevent attachment of SARS-CoV-2 and reduce the overall viral load.

Iota-carrageenan This molecule, which is extracted from seaweed, acts by blocking virus entry into airway cells.

One study of about 400 health-care workers suggests a nasal spray may reduce the incidence of Covid by up to 80 per cent.

IGM-6268 This is an engineered antibody that binds to SARS-CoV-2, blocking the virus from attaching to cells in the nose.

A nasal and oral (mouth) spray are in a clinical trial to assess safety.

Cold atmospheric plasma This is a gas that contains charged particles. At cold temperatures, it can alter the surface of a cell.

A lab-based study shows the gas changes expression of receptors on the skin that would normally allow

the virus to attach. This results in less SARS-CoV-2 attachment and infection. Scientists now think this technology could be adapted to a nasal spray to prevent SARS-CoV-2 infection.

How could we stop the virus replicating?

Another tactic is to develop nasal sprays that stop the virus replicating in the nose.

Researchers are designing genetic fragments that bind to the viral RNA. These fragments known as locked nucleic acid antisense oligonucleotides (or LNA ASOs for short) put a proverbial spanner in the works and stop the virus from replicating.

A spray of these genetic fragments delivered into the nose reduced virus replication in the nose and prevented disease in small animals.

How could we change the nose?

A third strategy is to change the nose environment to make it less hospitable for the virus.

That could be by using a nasal spray to change moisture levels (with saline), alter the pH (making the nose more acidic or alkaline), or adding a virus-killing agent (iodine). Saline can reduce the amount of SARS-CoV-2 in the nose by simply

washing away the virus. One study has even found that saline nasal irrigation can lessen Covid disease severity. But we would need further research into saline sprays.

An Australian-led study has found that an iodine-based nasal spray reduced the viral load in the nose. Further clinical trials are planned. One study used a test spray containing ingredients including eucalyptus and clove oils, potassium chloride and glycerol. The aim was to kill the virus and change the acidity of the nose to prevent the virus attaching.

This novel formulation has been tested in the lab and in a clinical trial showing it to be safe and to reduce infection rate from about 34 per cent to 13 per cent when compared to placebo controls. Despite promising data so far on nasal sprays for Covid, one of the major barriers is keeping the sprays in the nose. To overcome this, most sprays need multiple applications a day, sometimes every few hours.

So based on what we know so far, nasal sprays will not singlehandedly beat Covid. But if they are shown to be safe and effective in clinical trials, and receive regulatory approval, they might be another tool to help prevent it. - Source : The week

Adani port protest: Over 3,000 booked for attack on police station in Vizhinjam

Over 3,000 persons have been booked in connection with violent clashes during an ongoing protest against the Adani port project in Kerala's Vizhinjam area on Sunday night.

Police said cases have been registered against 3,000 'identifiable persons' for vandalising a police station and injuring police personnel. As many as 36 police personnel were reported to be injured in the violence that ensued.

the police station and attacked the officers. An SI has received an open fracture on his leg. It seems like he was hit by a brick," Kumar told the media.

Kumar said there was no provocation on behalf of the police. He said officials were trying to maintain law and order in the region by exercising maximum restraint. It was when the protests turned violent that the police had to resort to lathi charge and tear gas to disperse the mob,

"Today's talks have ended now. The people who have gathered in the nearby areas will leave without creating any trouble for the public. Talks will continue in the morning. We will have multiple meetings with the officials," he had said on Sunday.

Pereira said the facts of the cases registered against protesters have to be verified with regard to the violence and the church representatives will attend Monday's meeting called by the Collector.

He alleged the police had detained five local persons without giving details of the reasons for taking them, which provoked the locals. "Many people are wounded and have been admitted to various hospitals of the city. We still don't know how many are injured. A few persons are said to be missing.

So in tomorrow's meeting we will include all the matters," Pereira said. An uneasy calm prevailed in Vizhinjam on Monday morning with a strong police force being deployed to keep the situation under control in Vizhinjam. Late on Sunday night protesters had attacked media persons who were present at the site. ACV local channel cameraperson, Sheriff M John was attacked by the protesters, who damaged his camera and snatched his cellphone. He has been shifted to Thiruvananthapuram Medical College Hospital. - Source : The week



Earlier on Sunday, the state police lodged an FIR against at least 15 Latin Catholic priests, including metropolitan Archbishop Thomas J Netto and Perera, over the violence at Vizhinjam.

Additional Director General of Police M R Ajith Kumar told the media that around 36 police personnel injured in the Sunday evening attack by the mob which vandalised the police station were admitted to various hospitals in Thiruvananthapuram.

"...a mob gathered at the police station in the evening and demanded the release of a few persons who were arrested in another case. They vandalised

he added. Around 600 policemen were already deployed in the region and around 300 more were added to them, Kumar said.

In Thiruvananthapuram, the district administration on Sunday night held a meeting with the Latin Church authorities, who were leading the protests against the port project.

Vicar General Eugene Pereira, who attended the reconciliatory meeting on behalf of the protesters, told the media that the protesters who have gathered in the region will disperse without creating any trouble for the public.

Sensex to hit 80,000 by 2023?

Even as benchmark indices scaled fester highs on Monday, rallying for the fifth straight day, global brokerage firm Morgan Stanley is confident that the bull run is here to stay in 2023. According to the firm, the 30-share BSE Sensex may hit 80,000 in the next one year. India equity strategist of Morgan Stanley, Ridham Desai, said in the base case scenario, Sensex will hit 68,500 by December 2023. According to Morgan Stanley, Sensex hitting the target of 80,000 is contingent on domestic growth continuing its strong path as per its forecasts, the aftereffects of Ukraine-Russia conflict not spilling over into 2023, and the US



not slipping into a protracted recession. It is also dependent on government policy remaining supportive, and the RBI executing a calibrated exit. "At the helm of India's outperformance has been government policy, including a structural rise in the domestic

equity saving pool, a boost to corporate profit share in GDP, and a focus on FDI flows, which raised the share of FDI in BoP, allowing India to run monetary policy that is less sensitive to the US Fed, and reduce the equity market's sensitivity to US growth

conditions and oil prices," Economic Times quoted Desai as saying. Other factors that may lead to markets hitting record highs include a sharp correction in commodity prices, and earnings growth compounding at the rate of 25 per cent annually. The firm expects the domestic bid on shares to continue and also the foreign portfolio investors to continue buying. On Monday, rallying for the fifth day in a row, BSE Sensex climbed 211.16 points or 0.34 per cent to settle at 62,504.80, its fresh record closing high. The broader NSE Nifty gained 50 points or 0.27 per cent to end at 18,562.75, its record closing high.

HOW XI JINPING'S DRACONIAN COVID POLICY TRIGGERED THE CURRENT UNREST IN CHINA

China is witnessing an unprecedented movement, civil disobedience that has prompted thousands of frustrated Chinese citizens to take to the streets against the government's draconian zero-Covid measures. Despite the measures to curb the unrest, the demonstrations seem to be only spreading to other cities, in a direct challenge to Chinese president Xi Jinping's iron grip over his citizens.

But what triggered this situation in China, despite most of the world moving on from Covid to normalcy? Why brought China, which boasted the success of its zero-Covid policy last year, to the breaking point?

Many experts allude to the flaws in the zero-Covid measures, including lockdowns aimed at smothering outbreaks and a failed vaccination policy, for the current crisis. While China may have succeeded in controlling previous outbreaks by imposing lockdowns and restricting the movement of at-risk groups, its efforts were hampered by the state's failure to raise immunity among the vulnerable population by allowing some amount of transmission.

According to Yanzhong Huang, a senior fellow for global health at the Council on Foreign Relations, China's focus was on containment. "More intensive-care beds and better vaccination coverage should

have started two-and-a-half years ago, but the single-minded focus on containment meant fewer resources focused on this," he told The Washington Post.

Huang added that even the effective mRNA boosters, which China currently lacks, will be of little help to "resolve the fundamental problem with China's goal of eliminating infection rather than mitigating symptoms."

The country's lockdown measures, costlier yet ineffective, to deal with new variants of the virus is no longer appropriate. Experts believe the government could

transmissibility is no longer appropriate. The whole world has abandoned this approach – nobody can stand the cost, it's simply not working," Jin Dongyan, a virologist at the University of Hong Kong, told CNN.

Vaccination
The Chinese vaccination policy too is full of flaws. The country's zero-Covid policy has stopped a majority of its 1.4 billion people from being exposed to the virus. Though they have launched a more aggressive vaccine drive now, a huge chunk of the elderly community remains vulnerable.

Ironically, for a country that claims to have developed the first Covid vaccine, China is yet to come up with a native mRNA vaccine. Thanks to the ruling Communist party's innate nationalism, it has refused to import or licence a foreign one. This has resulted in the country's vaccination programme ending up mostly ineffective.

This is besides the questions raised over the efficacy of Chinese vaccines. Private pharma firm Sinovac and state-run Sinopharm which manufactures the vaccines in the country have reportedly not yet published the final-stage clinical trials, casting doubts over the success of the vaccines. -Source : Theweek

To change corrupt behaviour, change the message

Every day we are bombarded with messages that try to persuade us to change our behaviour for the good of ourselves and society. Drink less alcohol! Eat less food! Wear a mask! Get vaccinated!

Millions of dollars are spent each year on information campaigns designed to foster more cohesive and inclusive societies.

In developing economies, this includes efforts to foster democratic attitudes and more effective political systems.

Say no to gender-based violence! Reject corruption! Do not sell your vote!

Given how pervasive they are, the most surprising thing about these campaigns is that many just don't work.

Some even make the situation worse.

The reason why is important, because it tells us something about why it's so hard to change human behaviour.

Take anti-corruption campaigns.

Almost all of the programmes designed to reduce graft in high corruption countries include an awareness raising component.

The idea is that through raising awareness about an issue,

citizens will become more willing to reject requests for bribes and act against corruption.

The hope is they'll report it or vote against corrupt politicians.

But until the last five years, no one had systematically tested whether these messages were effective.

When researchers started to look into this, they got a nasty surprise: in most cases anti-corruption messages don't make citizens more likely to reject or condemn graft.

A test in Lagos, Nigeria, a nation with a history of high-level corruption, had some alarming results.

From 1200 randomly selected participants, it found people were actually more likely to pay a bribe.

The 1200 took part in a bribery game. They were told that paying a bribe would mean another participant would lose money much like in the real world. Some participants received an anti-corruption message and some did not.

Those who received an anti-corruption message were on average more likely to pay a bribe. In other words, the effect of the messaging was the opposite of what was intended.

This means the millions of

dollars being spent on anti-corruption messaging in countries like Nigeria may not just be wasted it may actually be making things worse.

Blame human nature.

Recent research in political and social psychology found that when we hear about topics that are pervasive, we tend to become cynical and focus on how big the problem is.

The way we behave is less shaped by what we are told to do than by what we believe our peers are already doing.

So, we are more likely to get vaccinated and follow social distancing protocols if we think all our friends have already done so than if the government tells us. The consequences of this for how governments need to communicate are profound.

If a campaign focuses on how corrupt the police are, or how few people are recycling, we point out how big the problem is and so run the risk of undermining people's confidence that a better future is possible while simultaneously suggesting that bad behaviours are socially acceptable.

The effect of this double whammy is perfectly illustrated by anti-corruption messaging which confirms people's most cynical

inner beliefs that the system is beyond repair and the only way to get things done is to take part in corruption by paying bribes.

Individuals who were already particularly pessimistic about the prevalence of corruption were significantly more likely to be negatively affected by reading an anti-corruption message.

The biggest worry is that this logic doesn't only apply to corruption.

One study tested messages designed to prevent the theft of wood from Arizona's Petrified Forest National Park.

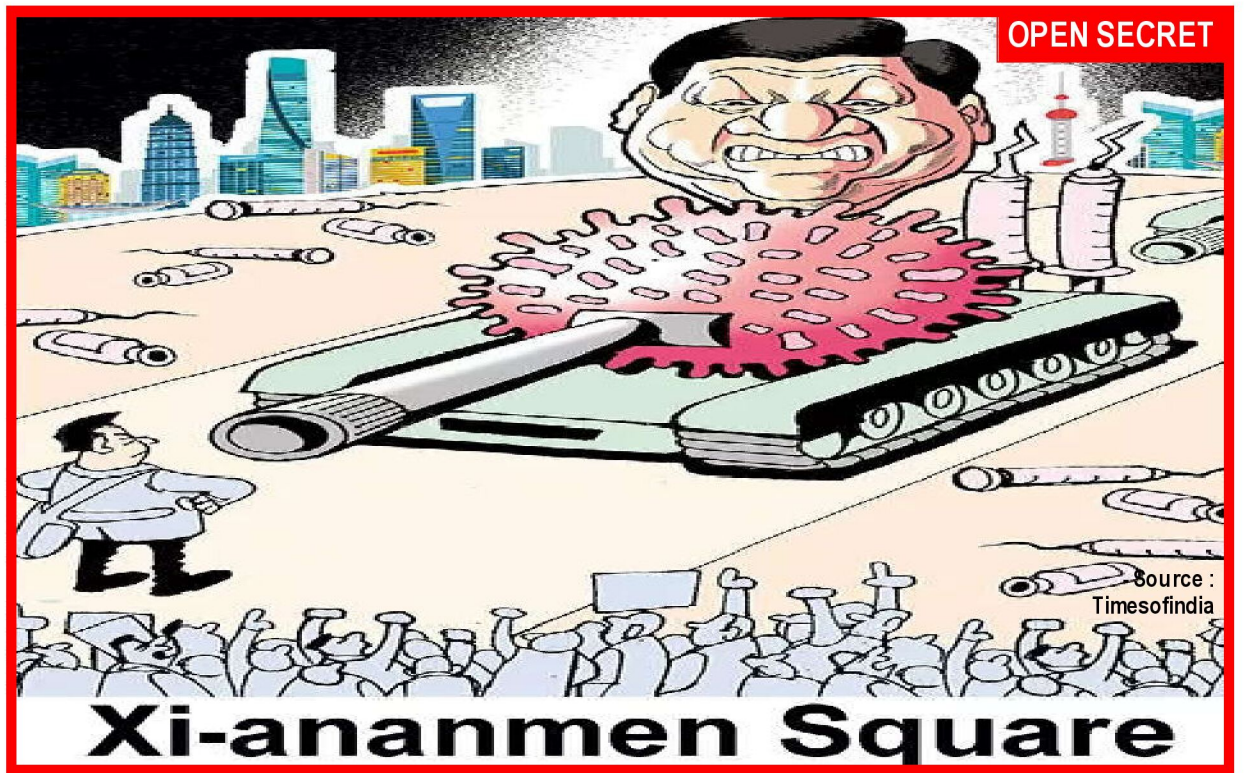
It found that signs that described the problems caused by others' behaviour stealing wood were most likely to increase theft.

Similar conclusions have been reached with campaigns to stop gender-based violence and vote-buying.

It's important, then, to realise that raising awareness may actually make the problem worse. Before embarking on awareness-raising campaigns policymakers could try and design less problematic messages.

Only then can we make sure that when we try and do good, we do no harm.

P.T. Usha lone candidate, set to get elected as IOA chief unopposed



The legendary P.T. Usha is set to become the first woman president of the Indian Olympic Association (IOA) as she emerged as the lone candidate for the top post for the December 10 elections.

The 58-year-old Usha, a multiple Asian Games gold medalist and a fourth-place finisher in the 1984 Olympics 400m hurdles final, filed her nomination papers for the top job on Sunday, along with 14 others from her team for the various posts.

The deadline to file nomination papers for the IOA elections ended on Sunday. IOA elections returning officer Umesh Sinha did not receive any nominations on Friday and Saturday but 24 candidates filed nominations for various posts on Sunday. There will be contests for one post of vice-president (female), joint secretary (female). There were 12 candidates in the fray for four executive council members. The IOA polls will be held to elect one president, one senior vice-president, two vice-presidents (one male and one female), one treasurer, two joint secretaries (one male and one female), six other executive council members, out of which two (one male and one female) shall be from the elected SOMs. Two members of the executive council (one male and one female) will be the Athletes' Commission representatives.
