Nadda's term as BJP chief extended till June 2024

Party will win bigger mandate than 2019: Shah

term was extended till June next year at the party's national executive meeting on Tuesday, with Union home minister Amit Shah asserting that it will win the 2024 Lok Sabha polls with a bigger mandate than 2019.

The widely expected development underlines the party's preference for continuity as it gears up for the all-important Lok Sabha polls next year, expected in April-May. Shah told reporters here that defence minister Rajnath Singh, a former party president like him, moved the proposal of extending Nadda's tenure till June next year and the executive unanimously endorsed it.

BJP's parliamentary board has already approved the extension of Nadda's term as the party president. "I, on behalf of the party, express

Nadda-ji for his committed contributions, and extend the best wishes for his

future term," Shah said. With Nadda set to lead



the party during the Lok Sabha elections, he will be following the footsteps of his predecessor Shah, whose tenure was also extended so as to allow him spearhead organisation during the 2019 polls. The home

Narendra Modi and party chief Nadda, will achieve a bigger win than the last general elections. He lauded Nadda's leadership, saying he connected the party organisation with the service of people during the Covid-19 outbreak. "During the pandemic, our party has done a lot of significant works under Nadda-ji's leadership; be it about providing food and rations to the poor or taking people to hospitals for check-ups and treatment," he added.

Shah further said that Nadda's throughout leadership term, the BJP has worked on the principle of 'Seva Hi Sangathan' right from the booth till the national levels. Noting that the party won many state Assembly polls under Nadda, Shah said the BJP won 73 Assembly by-polls out of 120 held during his tenure. It was under Nadda's leadership that the BJP performed well in Bihar, and

and Haryana, he added. The BJP won Assembly polls in Assam, Manipur, Uttarakhand and Uttar Pradesh during Nadda's tenure as the party president, Shah said, adding that it also formed the government on its own for

Joshimath crisis: Technical survey of houses to be demolished in JP Colony begins

GOPESHWAR, JAN 17 /--/ As the crisis in subsidence-hit Joshimath in Uttarakhand deepens, the Chamoli district administration on Tuesday began a technical survey of the damaged buildings situated in JP Colony for the demolition exercise. A majority of houses in the colony, which is located in one of the worst-hit Marwari area of Joshimath, are singlestorey buildings with roofs made of tin sheets. "A survey of damaged buildings of JP colony has begun after which a formal order to dismantle them will be issued." Chamoli district magistrate Himanshu Khurana said. "A technical team is on the spot to conduct the survey. When it will submit its report, the order to demolish the unsafe buildings in the colony will be issued," Khurana said. JP Colony houses employees of Vishnu Prayag hydro-electricity project and the residential buildings here are made of light construction material, and their dismantling may not take long, an engineer engaged in the survey said on request of anonymity. The colony was vacated on January 3 after an underground water channel burst on January 2.

The Uttarakhand government had on Monday decided to mechanically demolish all such buildings in JP Colony whose retrofitting was not possible. Ranjit Kumar Sinha, secretary, disaster management had said cracks on some of $the buildings in Joshimath have wide ned \, by \, 1 \, to \, 2 \, millimetres,$ but they are old fissures not new. "The area from Hathi Pahad to JP Colony and the Alaknanda river is the most affected by land subsidence as there is pressure underneath the ground." he said. The senior official said the decision to dismantle the already damaged buildings and infrastructure in the colony is part of a strategy to ease the burden on the affected area. He also clarified that the cracks on the ground are being filled not to hide them, but to ensure that rainwater does not percolate through them to further weaken the foundation of the town. However, water flowing constantly 2 has ebbed from 540 LPM in the beginning to 163 LPM now. Joshimath, the gateway to famous pilgrimage sites like Badrinath and Hemkund Sahib and international skiing destination Auli, appears on the edge of a precipice with gaping cracks appearing on buildings, roads and public facilities.

Talking about India's vision of according the topmost priority to healthcare as 'seva' (service), he said: "Be it launch of the world's biggest government funded health assurance scheme, PM Jan Aarogya Yojana covering approximately 500 million people or establishment of 150,000 health & wellness centres, we have put the vision of 'Antyodaya', that is, 'Rise of the last person' into action in healthcare and a keyfacet of ensuring Universal Health Coverage." Mandaviya said India has the highest number of USFDA manufacturing plants outside the US, besides being a world leader in generic medicines.(PTI)

Concerted efforts made to increase representation of women in Central govt jobs: Jitendra Singh

NEW DELHI, JAN 17 /--/ Union minister Jitendra Singh on Tuesday said the Centre has made concerted efforts to increase the representation of women in Centralgovernmentjobsand provide them a balance between professional and family life.

Singh said the reforms in governance introduced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi provide an enabling environment for working women and the department of personnel and training (DoPT) is implementing them.

The minister of state for personnel said it has been decided to grant special maternity leave of 60 days to women central government personnel in case of death of a child soon after birth or stillbirth keeping in view the potential emotional trauma. The Union minister said in child care leave (CCL), some new measures have also been

employee while she is on CCL, he said and added that the employee can also undertakeforeigntravelafter taking clearances from appropriate authorities in

The minister said that a

special allowance of Rs 3,000 amonth to women employees with disability has been granted for child care with effect from July 1 last year. He said a special leave provision has been made in connection to inquiry of sexual harassment. Leave up to a period of 90 days can be availed by an aggrieved women government servant and it will be granted during pendency of inquiry, Singh

The leave granted to the aggrieved government employee under this rule will not be debited against the leave account, the minister said, according to a ministry personnel statement

The minister pointed out that during Covid, special provisions for women officers and staffers were made through various office included provisions for attendance according to roster while pregnant employees were exempted from the roster and allowed to "work from home", he said.

Dwelling on the womencentric reforms in the Department of Pensions and Pensioners' Welfare, Singh referred to a recent office order wherein a divorced employee, in whose case a decree of divorce was issued after the death of her parents, will be eligible for family pension, if the divorce petition was filed before the death of the parents. Similarly, the families of missing employees covered under the National Pension System can now get pension within six months of lodging of FIR and not wait for seven years, after which a missing employee is considered

BJP dubs AAP chief Kejriwal 'egoistic leader' after Delhi CM's tirade against LG

NEW DELHI, JAN 17 /--/ Hours after Delhi chief minister Arvind Kejriwal launched a tirade against Lt Governor VK Saxena, the BJP dubbed the AAP chief an "extreme egoistic leader" who believed that winning an election had given him the "right to misinterpret and override Constitutional provisions".

In a statement, the BJP's Delhi unit working president Virendra Sachdeva quipped that it was shocking that a party that did not have a single MP in Lok Sabha was dreaming of forming a government at the Centre. Addressing the Delhi Assembly on Saxena's

alleged interference in his government's work, the chief minister said: "Not even my teachers checked my homework as much as the LG scrutinises my files." "The LG is not my headmaster. The people have elected me as chief minister," he said. Kejriwal further claimed that Saxena had told him during a meeting that the BJP won 104 wards in the Municipal Corporation of Delhi elections because of him and that the saffron party would win all seven Lok Sabha seats in the national capital in the next General

minister added that the Lt Governor did not have the power to make decisions on his own. "The Supreme Court has clearly said that he cannot take a call on issues barring the police, land and public order," he

In a sharp rebuttal to Kejriwal's speech, Sachdeva said everything Kejriwal and his party had been doing post its "crushing defeat" in the Gujarat assembly elections indicated that he had lost his political balance and mental peace. "The way CM Kejriwal is debating with the Lt Governor of Delhi and trying to misinterpret

The Kerala chief minister urged the BJP government to focus more on uplifting the poor and downtrodden of the country instead of framing policies to help the corporates. The veteran CPM leader accused the Union government of trying to 'strangulate' the Kerala government financially. He said the state government was trying to bring out an alternative policy for the benefits of the poor. "What have you done for the majority of the people in this country who are commoners? A government should focus on the welfare of the people. The governance in our country is for the corporates and not for the poor. Kerala is trying to put forward an alternative policy to this but the Centre is against it and trying to financially strangle the State," the Left leader said. Vijayan said in the last eight years only 0.33 per cent of the job seekers could obtain a job while the rest remain unemployed. "Over 10 lakh posts are lying vacant across the country in the Central government sector. In the last eight years, only 0.33 per cent of job seekers could enroll in jobs in the country. The rest are unemployed. In our country 82 per cent of workers employed in the unorganised sector have no job security or other benefits," he added. (PTI)

No inputs of threat to Bharat Jodo Yatra in J&K: DGP Dilbag Singh be taken, they will be

SRINAGAR, JAN 17 /--/ Jammu and Kashmir DGP Dilbag Singh on Tuesday said there are no inputs of a possible threat to Rahul Gandhi-led 'Bharat Jodo Yatra' and that adequate security will be provided to the march when it reaches the Union Territory.

The Yatra will enter Jammu from Punjab in a day or two. For a few days, the march will be in different districts of Jammu and then it will enter the Kashmir Valley. "The Yatra will be in Kashmir for three to four days. We have discussed that (in the security review We meeting). have discussed the arrangements at the range-level and the district-level. Whatever

security measures need to

taken," Singh told reporters here. The march, which started from Kanyakumari Tamil Nadu on September 7, will conclude with Gandhi hoisting the national flag in Srinagar. It has so far covered Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Telangana, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and

Punjab. Asked if there was any threat input about the Yatra, the top cop said: "There is no such input." To a question on whether the Yatra will be allowed on foot, the DGP replied that it will be regulated in such a manner that people do not face any

inconvenience. "These things will be regulated because there is traffic and other things. A huge yatra can cause inconvenience to people as roads can get blocked. This is a Yatra and is taken both on foot as well as using vehicles. "Our endeavour will be to take forward the march with vehicles wherever there is a single road, and in rest of the places, the participants may be advised to walk on foot where the roads allow," Singh said. He asserted that the Yatra can be "guided from the security point of view as well wherever it is needed". AICC J-K in-charge Rajni Patil, earlier in the day, said the Jammu and Kashmir administration has granted permission for a

culmination of the Bharat Jodo Yatraat Srinagar's Shere-Kashmir Stadium on

January 30 Patil said the Yatra will enter Lakhanpur (in Jammu and Kashmir) from Punjab Thursday evening. "After halting for the night, Gandhi will lead the yatra from Hatli Morh in Kathua from 7 am the next morning (January 20)," Patil said, adding that the rally will reach Jammu on January 23. She added that Gandhi will leave the Union Territory on January 24, crossing Udhampur and Ramban towns. DGP Singh also said that measures will be put in place for smooth celebration of the Republic

Media report on 'multiple side-effects of Covid vaccines'ill-informed, erroneous: HealthMin

NEW DELHI, JAN 17 /--/ The Union health ministry on Tuesday said media reports claiming admission of 'multiple side-effects of Covid-19 vaccines' by Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation(CDSCO) officials are ill-informed and erroneous. Citing an RTI response, a recent news report had claimed that ICMR and CDSCO officials have admitted to side-effects of Covid-19 vaccines, citing a plethora of ramifications arising out of them. "It is clarified that the news report is ill-informed and provides erroneous information," the ministry said, referring to the report. In line with the policy of the Union ministry of health of proactive disclosure aligned with global scientific evidence in the public domain, the ICMR provides responses to questions under the RTI Act related to advantages and disadvantages of Covid-19 vaccines. The ICMR response simply provided links of reputed websites of the World Health Organization (WHO), Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the ministry of health where compiled global evidence on various Covid-19 vaccines is available, the ministry said in

BJP govt's neo-liberal policies benefiting only corporates, multi-billionaires: Kerala CM

KOCHI, JAN 17 /--/ Kerala chief minister Pinarayi Vijayan on Tuesday criticised the "neo-liberal economic policies" of the ruling BJP at the Centre saying only the corporates and the multi-billionaires are its beneficiaries. Vijavan said the jobs in the organised sector have come down drastically while no steps have been taken to fill the over 10 lakh vacant positions in the Central government. "Under the BJP rule, corporates are flourishing in our country. The number of multibillionaires is also increasing. But our country is in the 107th position in the global hunger index and in the poverty index we are at the 131th position. WPI, CPI: Signs of easing inflation

Easing of supply side pressure, especially with respect to fruits and vegetables, along with a favourable base effect has helped in moderation of wholesale inflation. Due to high base effect and softening of global commodity prices, the wholesale inflation is expected to come in around 3.1 per cent in the March quarter of FY'23. Similar to Consumer Price Index (CPI), the Wholesale Price Index (WPI) is also losing momentum, driven by both base effects and falling food prices. Further declines are expected in import costs to keep WPI contained in the coming months, but CPI pass through may be limited for now. The significance of the downtrend in CPI and WPI inflation is that it will enable the monetary policy committee to pause after one more, say, a 25-basis point rate hike in February. Therefore, higher rates will not impact the growth recovery underway in the economy now. With signs of easing inflation, it will be a tough task for RBI to decide on the trajectory of interest rates in next monetary policy meeting. The RBI's monetary policy committee is scheduled to meet on February 6-8 to decide on the policy interest rate. The RBI has so far hiked rates by 2.25 percentage points since May, with the latest 35 basis point hike in December, 2022.

The wholesale price-based inflation declined to a 22-month low of 4.95 per cent in December 2022, mainly due to fall in prices of food articles, especially vegetables, on easing supply side pressure and a higher base of last year. This is the seventh straight month of declining WPI-based inflation. It was 5.85 per cent in November 2022 and 14.27 per cent in December 2021. Even though declining prices of vegetables and onions pulled down inflation rate of food articles, wheat, pulses and potato remained expensive, along with protein-rich items like milk and 'egg, meat and fish'. The last low level of WPI inflation was recorded in February 2021 at 4.83 per cent. The deceleration in WPI comes in line with retail inflation data released last week, which showed CPI inflation eased to 5.72 per cent in December. The CPI-based inflation remained within the RBI's upper tolerance limit of 6 per cent for the second month in a row.

As per data released on Monday, WPI inflation in fuel and power rose marginally from 17.35 per cent in November to 18.09 per cent in December 2022, while in manufactured products it softened to 3.37 per cent last month. WPI inflation in crude petroleum & natural gas cooled to 39.71 per cent in December, against 48.23 per cent in the previous month. Core inflation too declined to 25-month low of 3.2 per cent in December 2022 due to lower input cost, especially of commodities.

Sinking of land at Joshimath fallout of reckless construction activities

It appears that nothing short of a total disaster will convince authorities, especially under the present government, that reckless development without addressing environmental or social issues, does not lead to progress.

The unfolding tragedy in Joshimath, considered a holy town for being the gateway to the hill shrine of Badrinath, is but the latest in a long series of disasters in the Uttarakhand Himalayas caused by unrestrained construction, infrastructure and urbanisation in these fragile mountains. These human-induced calamities, in the western Himalayas in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand, have been in the recent past, exacerbated by the effects of humaninduced climate change like extreme rainfall leading to floods, landslides and so on.

Joshimath, at an altitude of 6000 feet, has now been badly hit by land subsidence i.e., sinking of the land, causing large cracks and structural damage of roads, buildings and other infrastructure affecting almost a quarter of the town. Over 720 houses have so far been assessed as severely damaged in four badly affected zones, and 89 buildings including residences and hotels have been earmarked for immediate demolition as being unsafe for inhabitants and for nearby buildings. Several hundred inhabitants have been shifted to safer locations, while others are awaiting similar arrangements.

Meanwhile affected inhabitants of Joshimath are up in arms at the destruction of their town despite repeated earlier warnings, and at the casual manner in which the district administration, the state government and even the central government has approached the disaster. Their approach is one of dealing with the immediate problem of damaged buildings through evacuation, compensation and shifting to temporary shelters, adding to the long list of "development refugees" in India where people lose their homes, savings and livelihoods while contractors and commercial ventures reap the harvest of destructive development. All those affected by the Joshimath disaster, who are victims of wilful

governmental negligence, must be fully rehabilitated and given due compensation immediately so that they too do not have to wait indefinitely as supplicants for what is due to them.

However, the longer-term issue of on-going and continuing construction activities related to roads, hydro-electric projects and haphazard urbanisation without taking into consideration the fragility of the mountain ecosystem and its vulnerabilities, must also be addressed. Whereas decisions regarding immediate response measures in the aftermath of the Joshimath disaster were taken at a meeting of state and central government officials, the National Disaster Management Authority, Geological Survey of India, and the National Institute of Hydrology, numerous earlier reports by these very institutions and the Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology raising danger signals have been ignored. Study reports by these institutions, including high-powered committees set up by the state government dating back to the famous MC Mishra Committee report of around 50 years ago, and other experts have underlined the geomorphological, geological and seismic fragility of the region and the consequent dangers of major construction activities.

These experts have pointed out that Joshimath, and many other towns in the region, have been built over very weak and unstable soil and stone substrate consisting of loose material left behind by glacial movement and earlier landslides. This limits the carrying capacity of settlements which have, however, grown haphazardly and to over-burdened size in terms of residents and increasing numbers of tourists. The region is classified as seismic Zone-V, the highest level of vulnerability to earthquakes and seismic activity, which can be exacerbated by heavy

construction activity such as blasting and tunnelling as done in the area. Blockage of natural drainage by poorly planned construction can also cause instability and exacerbate landslides. As a result, satellite data reveal that Joshimath has been sinking at a rate of 6.5cm per year.

The chief minister of the BJP government of Uttarakhand, Pushkar Singh Dhami, has misleadingly described this as a "natural disaster" while, on the other hand, construction activities at the NTPC's Tapovan-Vishnugarh "run of the river" hydel project, whose tunnelling work has been undertaken close to the town, and the Joshimath-Badrinath highway, have been halted in response to local anger. Blasting has been prohibited in the area, but locals have pointed to sign-boards announcing schedules for blasting in different construction pockets. Even now, despite the ban on construction, TV channels have reported that, in the absence of any monitoring, some sort of construction activity is taking place in the area. This total lack of regulation and enforcement is characteristic of infrastructure construction in the region. The famous Char Dham Highway linking major religious sites was allowed by the Supreme Court to be widened and proceed unhindered, with no regulation imposed. Joshimath is today paying the price for this "development at any cost" approach.

It is likely that other parts of Joshimath town will also suffer from subsidence in months and years to come. Other towns and locations in the region are also similarly vulnerable. The valley town of Rudraprayag has already reported cases of major cracks in residences and other buildings.

It is clear that, whatever measures are taken to tackle the current Joshimath disaster, a comprehensive review is required of infrastructure and other construction activities in the fragile western Himalayan region. What is required is a wellconceived pathway towards environmentally sensitive development minimising harm to local residents and visitors. (IPA)

Governors let loose on states are part and parcel of Modi's SOP. It should undermined, part of the basic not surprise anybody that all opposition-ruled states have Governors



Exposure of highway stretch in Uttarakhand to landslides likely to increase: Study

NEW DELHI, JAN 17 /--/ vulnerability of the highway stretch in Uttarakhand between Joshimath and Rishikesh to landslides is likely to increase, owing to continued vegetation removal and destabilising of

An average landslide density of 1.25 landslides per km was recorded by scientists for the 247-km-long stretch on NH-7 highway. The study conducted a systematic survey of landslides and derived a statistical model, aimed at quantifying landslide susceptibility along the NH-7 at a high spatial resolution, the findings said. Based on an inventory of more than 300 landslides along the corridor following exceptionally high rainfall in September and October 2022, the study identified the main factors governing the occurrence of massmovement events. The findings of the study were brought out in a preprint paper by scientists from University of Potsdam in Germany and Indian Institute of Technology in Roorkee.

"The highest density of landslides occurs between Rishikesh and Srinagar within lithozone 2 and between Pipalkoti and Joshimath in lithozone 1," the study said. "Lithozones

encompass rocks of similar lithology, or composition. We did a regrouping of the lithologies from the geological map of Uttarakhand," said study author Jurgen Mey, Institute of Environmental Science and Geography at the University of Potsdam. The high landslide density in lithozone 2 is likely related due to the pronounced fissility, or the capacity to shear along the grain, and cleavage of the dominating shales and phyllites associated with material softening, percolation and weathering, causing a general decrease in rock strength, the study said. "Yes, these rocks are vulnerable to heavy rainfall. But many parts of the Himalayas have similar features, so it is hard to avoid such terrains. However, with proper stability measures, such slopes can be made safer," said Reet Kamal Tiwari, assistant professor, Department of Civil Engineering at Indian Institute of Technology in Pun-

Tectonic activity too contributes to a general decrease in rock strength by creating shear surfaces with low friction angles, the study said. "Because the Himalayas are tectonically active, these rocks have been deformed and modified so that they feature a lot of discontinuities, along which they can fail more easily. Adding the steep slopes and the high intensity rainfall (trigger), landslides will be frequent," said Mey. Road segments, where the adjoining hill slopes parallel bedding, joints or foliation planes are particularly vulnerable, the study said. The study found an intriguing spatial agreement between recent constructions for road widenings and landslide occurrences in the region under investigation. The road was widened by removing vegetation and excavating soil and rocks, potentially creating unstable slopes, the study said. "Land cover change and climate change are the dynamic factors influencing landslide occurrence, whereas, slope degree and the soil are constant factors.

"We will see an increase in landslides in future, if the land use continues to change as per the current trend. We need to analyse these trends and keep them in front of us during town planning and other such activities," said Tiwari. In fact, these disturbances have led to frequent landslides along the NH-7 previously as there have been previous studies also reporting about 300 landslides occurring

along the road more than 10

years ago, the study said. "Our data indicates that 20 40 per cent of the recorded landslides are reactivated slope failures which underscores that slopes are recurrently unstable during periods with intense rainfall," the study said. "We will see more landslides in the future in the Himalayan region if such heavy rainfall instances continue," said During mapping, the sci-

entists also noticed that some slopes were engineered during the last years with retaining walls, yet many of which also failed. Damages and fatalities may become even more frequent in the future, the study said. The entire Upper Ganga basin is susceptible to extreme rainfall events and climate change projections - although subject to high uncertainties - indicate a trend towards more frequent extreme events due to elevation-dependent warming and a likely increase of summer monsoon precipitation by 4-25 per cent, the study said. It also said that exposure to landslides was likely to increase. Pak PM seeks 'sincere' talks with India to resolve 'burning' issues; says UAE can play important role

Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has sought "serious" and "sincere" talks with his Indian counterpart Narendra Modi for the resolution of the "burning" issues, including on Kashmir, and said the UAE could play an important role in facilitating the resumption of dialogue between two nuclear-armed neighbours.

Prime Minister Sharif made these comments during an interview with the Dubai-based Al Arabiya news channel on Monday. Relations between India and Pakistan have been strained over the Kashmir issue and crossborder terrorism emanating from Pakistan. India has previously rejected any third-party mediation on the Kashmir issue. "My message to the Indian leadership and Prime Minister Narendra Modi is that let us sit down on the table and have serious and sincere talks to resolve our burning issues like Kashmir," Sharif said. 

UK home secy orders extradition of arms dealer Sanjay Bhandari to India

LONDON, JAN 17 /--/ British home secretary Suella Braverman has ordered the extradition of Sanjay Bhandari, an accused middleman and consultant in arms deals, to India to face charges of tax evasion and money laundering

According to Home Office sources, the extradition was ordered last week and Bhandari now has 14 days until the end of this month to appeal against the order in the

administrative division of the High Court in London. The 60-year-old faced two extradition requests the Indian authorities, the first related to money laundering and the second to tax evasion. development after a UK court in

November ruled that Bhandari can be extradited to India to face charges of tax evasion and money laundering and paved the way for the British government to order his extradition. District judge Michael Snow, who heard the case at Westminster Magistrates' Court in London last year, had concluded that there are no bars to him being extradited and decided to send the case to the Indian-origin home secretary

The judge concluded a prima facie case had been established with respect to both extradition requests. "He failed to declare his overseas income and assets...He benefited from the income and assets that had not been declared. A reasonable jury can properly infer benefit from his undeclared income and purchase of substantial assets overseas," the court said in its ruling. The Indian government's extradition request for Bhandari had been certified by then UK Home Secretary Priti Patel in June 2020 and he was arrested on an extradition warrant the following month that year. The London-based businessman has been on bail on security provided to the court as he fought extradition on the cases against him by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and Enforcement Directorate (ED). According to the court documents, Bhandari is wanted in India for intended prosecution for an offence of money laundering contrary to the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) 2002 and for offences of tax evasion contrary to the Black Money (Undisclosed Foreign Income and Asset), Imposition of Tax Act 2015 and Income Tax Act 1961.

Bhandari, who was resident in India for tax purposes at the time in 2015, is accused of concealing overseas assets. using backdated documents, benefiting from the assets not declared to the Indian tax authorities and then falsely informing the authorities that he did not possess any overseas assets. He, however, denies the allegations. The UK's Crown Prosecution Service (CPS), on behalf of the Indian authorities, argued that Bhandari's conduct amounts to "fraud by false representation" in the British jurisdiction. Bhandari's defence team had sought to argue against the prima facie case and also on human rights grounds, claiming a "real risk" that he would be subjected to torture by the police and of a breach of his Article 3 of the European Convention of Human Rights (ECHR) rights because of the conditions in Indian prisons, from "non-state agents and from the prison guards". "Assurances have been given in this case. It is the Government's case that the defendant will be held at ward No. 4 Central Jail No. 3, Tihar Jail Complex in New Delhi," the judgment noted. "India is a friendly country governed by the rule of law. I have not been made aware of any assurance that has not been honoured," it added. (PTI)

Indian student from Punjab dies in car crash in Australia

Punjab was killed in a fatal car crash in Australia's Canberra, a media report said. Kunal Chopra from Hoshiarpur district, who held a student visa in Australia,

was returning from work around 7 am when his car collided with a concrete numping truck on William Hovell Drive in Canberra last week, SBS Punjabi, a multi-cultural and multi-



lingual broadcaster in Australia, reported. According to the preliminary investigations, Chopra's car crossed to the wrong side of the road into the path of the city-bound truck. Chopra was announced dead on the spot. This was Canberra territory's first road fatality for 2023. Acting Inspector for Road Policing Travis Mills said the major collisions team continued to investigate the accident of Chopra, who arrived in Australia in February last year. "We are heartbroken, and his family back home is shattered and inconsolable," Honey Malhotra, a cousin of Chopra who stayed with him in Canberra, told SBS Punjabi. Malhotra said he was making arrangements to send Chopra's mortal remains to his family in India. Friend and community representative, Gurpreet Singh Gill, said the tragedy has left the tight-knit Indian community in Canberra in deep shock. "We are in touch with his family, and also with the Indian High Commission, which is helping with the repatriation of his mortal remains to India," Gill told SBS Punjabi, urging young students to remain vigilant on the roads. Chopra's accident comes days after the Shepparton crash that left four men of Indian origin dead, another tragedy that shocked the community in Australia. (PTI)

HOUSTON, JAN 17 /--/ Indian-American Krishna Special Award for the

86-year-old community leader's contributions towards connecting the Indian diaspora with the mainstream America as the US celebrated the legacy of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. King, a champion of civil rights for Blacks, was born on January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Georgia. Vavilala, a longtime Houstonian

and the founder and chairman of the Foundation of India Studies (FIS), has in the past led several MLK Grande Parades, dressed as Mahatma Gandhi with the sole purpose of bringing the Indian community closer to the Black community, based on the principles of non-violence, which both Gandhi and MLK Jr. had followed. The award -- a trophy and a plaque -- was presented by Charles Stamps, the chairman and CEO of MLK Jr. Parade Foundation, at its glitzier gala night on Sunday amidst thunderous applause. Charles spoke highly of Vavilala and appreciated his dedication to spreading the message of both Mahatma Gandhi and MLK Jr, who were continents apart, yet shared the same vision and followed the same path.

A strong believer in promoting peace and racial harmony, Vavilala while accepting the award said: "Initially when I was called about this award, I thought it was a hoax. Having lived in this country for over five decades. I have observed that there is very little social interaction between the Blacks and the Indian communities in our daily lives. So, I wanted to do something about it. I must be one of the very few people in America who has seen Gandhi in person." "The memory of me as a nine-year-old seeing Gandhi during his visit to Rajahmundry, my hometown in 1946, is still stuck in my mind," he narrated. "My grandmother took me and my two sisters on a bullock cart to see Mahatma Gandhi," Vavilala stated. "My inspiration to participate in the MLK parades came after I got the Gandhi statue installed in Hermann park, in 2003-2004," he

"We all know, Martin Luther King Jr. had established a historic link between India and America, by adopting Mahatma Gandhi's philosophy of non-violence in his civil rights movement. It is my belief that the Indian diaspora should participate in the annual MLK parades to help bring about social justice and racial harmony," he added. Meanwhile, members and supporters of the FIS on Monday morning braved the wintry weather and walked in the 29th Martin Luther King Jr. Grand Parade in midtown, Houston. "FIS's participation in the MLK parades is purely to pay homage to the late civil rights leader who had adopted Gandhi's methods of passive resistance and non-violence in his struggle to achieve equal civil rights for the Black community, thus enabling permanent bondage between people of America and the people of India. This relationship is expected to endure the test of times for many generations to come," Vavilala told PTI

The 17-year-old organisation has routinely participated in MLK parades for 12 years and also won the parade's Grand Marshall Award in 2015. Vavilala, a BITS Pilani alumni, is a retired Electrical Engineer, originally from Andhra Pradesh and now a naturalised American citizen settled in Houston.

Over the years, Vavilala has kept Gandhi's vision relevant in Houston and was instrumental in proposing the installation of a life-size Gandhi statue at Herman Park, a constant reminder of "peace in a cowboy state" of Texas. Vavilala was instrumental in 2006 in establishing the India studies programme at the University of Houston and responsible for initiating the India Studies programme at Texas Southern University in May 2022. Germany to appoint regional official as defence minister


BERLIN, JAN 17 /--/ German Chancellor Olaf Scholz will appoint a regional official as the new defence minister following the resignation of the much-criticised Christine Lambrecht, the DPA news agency reported Tuesday.

The defence minister-designate, Boris Pistorius, is a member of Scholz' Social Democrats, and has been serving as interior minister of Lower Saxony since 2013. The 62year-old Pistorius will have to steer the project of modernising Germany's military and oversee expanding weapons deliveries to Ukraine. Pistorius will also quickly be thrown into the deep end of the new job.

US defence secretary Lloyd Austin is scheduled to visit Berlin this week and then host a meeting of allies at the Ramstein Air Base in western Germany. On Sunday, the German and French governments will hold bilateral talks that include a meeting of the countries' joint security council. Lambrecht had been defence minister since Scholz became chancellor in December 2021. Critics had long portrayed her as out of her depth. (AP)

The President also said inequality worldwide has continued to grow and inequality brings with it huge political and social collateral damage. "What we call populism is essentially a reaction to growing inequality. We all know that: Extreme inequality undermines social cohesion. It creates resentment, causing us to seek scapegoats. And it is politically toxic, eating away at our faith in democracy," he added. "The number of democracies worldwide has diminished very much. According to Freedom House, around 50 per cent of the world's population lived in democracies ten years ago Today, that figure is just 20 per cent. "Business as usual is no longer an option: We must take steps to defend steadfastly the foundations. that are a prerequisite for civilised coexistence," the President said.

ISLAMABAD, JAN 17 /--/ Nine men were lashed in public in southern Afghanistan on Tuesday as punishment for different crimes under the country's new rulers, a

Taliban-appointed official said.

The lashings were the latest example of harsh policies imposed by the Taliban since they seized power in the country in August 2021 policies that reflect their interpretation of Islamic law or Sharia. Haji Zaid, a spokesman for the Governor's Office in southern Kandahar province, said in a tweet that the lashings took place at the sports stadium in the city of Kandahar, the provincial capital.

Each man was lashed between 35 and 39 times in front of Taliban officials, religious clerics, elders, and local people, he said.

Zaid's tweet did not elaborate on the crimes the nine were accused of or provide other details.

The spokesperson and other Taliban officials in Kandahar could not immediately be reached for more comment. Last month, the Taliban executed an Afghan convicted of killing another man, the first public execution since the former insurgents returned to power.

The execution was carried out with an assault rifle by the victim's father in western Farah province as hundreds of spectators and many top Taliban officials watched. No country has officially recognised the new Afghan government under the Taliban, who previously ruled Afghanistan in the late 1990s. (AP)

Kishan likely to play in middle-order as India face plucky New Zealand

HYDERABAD, **JAN 17** /--/ Having stirred a debate after being left out of the squad despite a world record double hundred, Ishan Kishan is expected to be in the playing eleven in the upcoming ODI series against a tough New Zealand. KL Rahul's unavailability due to personal reasons opens up a slot for Kishan, but he may not be asked to open during the threematch series starting here on Wednesday. Kishan had to sit out of the Sri Lanka series despite scoring the fastest double hundred in the history of ODIs, against Bangladesh in the preceding series. Shubman Gill, who was rewarded for his consistency and picked ahead of Kishan to open alongside skipper Rohit Sharma, made the most of the opportunities with scores of 70, 21 and 116 in the Sri Lanka series. No changes are expected to the opening combination against the Black Caps but Rahul's unavailability means Kishan is expected to keep wickets. Kishan has batted in the middle-order thrice in the 10 ODIs he had played, therefore adjustment should not be an issue. KS Bharat, who is the second wicketkeeper in the squad, is likely to warm the bench as he is more of a cover in Rahul's absence. In a World Cup year, every game is significant and India would aim to build on the gains from the Sri Lanka series even though the performance of their opponents was underwhelming to say the least. The big takeaways for India from the Sri Lanka series was the performance of the top three and Mohammed Siraj's ability to pick up wickets with the new ball. Like Gill and Virat Kohli, Rohit also looked in sublime touch with scores of 83 and 42 but would like to get a big hundred which has also eluded him for some time now.

Kohli though is back to scoring hundreds at will and looks hungrier for runs more than ever, which should set alarm bells ringing in the New Zealand camp. While he was one of India's steady batters in ODIs in 2022, Shreyas Iyer failed

to convert his starts in three games as scores of 28, 28 and 38 would suggest and to make matters worse, the middle-order batter now has been ruled out of the three-match series against New Zealand owing to a back injury. In Iyer's absence, the indomitable Suryakumar Yadav will get at least three chances to cement his place in the side. Surya and Hardik Pandya in the middle-order will surely add firepower at the back-end. Rajat Patidar, who plays for Madhya Pradesh in the domestic circuit and Royal Challengers Bangalore in the Indian Premier League, has

been named as Iyer's replacement for the rubber against the visiting Kiwis. Patidar has earlier been part of ODI team for past few series. Besides Rahul, Axar Patel has also been given a break for the series and his like-for-like replacement in the eleven could be Shahbaz Ahmed. It remains to be seen if the team management gives Shahbaz a go or bring in Washington Sundar, who could be handy against the lefthanders in the New Zealand camp. India have so far preferred to play a finger and a wrist spinner each in the playing eleven,

Chahal and Kuldeep Yadav, who provided the much needed wickets in the middle overs in the two games against Sri Lanka. Whether Kuldeep and Chahal could be played together like it used to happen five years back or the team management decides otherwise is there to be seen. Chahal did not play after the first ODI due to a sore shoulder but he should be available for selection for the seriesopener. Siraj, Mohammad Shami and Umran Malik will be the likely specialist pacers in the team with Hardik Pandya being the all-rounder. Though New Zealand don't have the services of star players Kane Williamson and Tim Southee for the series, the hosts will have to be at their best to better the visitors. Stand-incaptain Tom Latham played a blinder the last time the two teams met in an ODI. The team is coming from a high of a series against Pakistan in Karachi. Opener Finn Allen, who was not at his destructive best in Karachi, would be looking to take the attack to the India bowlers. The hosts need to find a way to stop the belligerent Glenn Phillips who single-handely won New Zealand the decider against Pakistan despite being half-fit. (PTI)

I am not too loyal to players: Jurgen Klopp



LIVERPOOL, JAN 17 /--/ Jurgen Klopp says he will not leave Liverpool unless he is told to go, hinting at a major overhaul of his ageing squad at the end of the season. A sixth Premier League defeat of the campaign at the weekend means the 2020 champions are 10 points outside the top four with just over half the season remaining. Klopp last year signed a contract extension until 2026 and the 55-year-old stressed only the sack would prevent him seeing that through. "Either the manager's position changes or a lot of other things change," he said. "So as far as I am concerned unless someone tells me I will not go. "So that means may be there is a point where we have to change other stuff. We will see that, but that is something for the future. Like summer or whatever. Not now. "I have space and time to think about it -- we have to play better football now." Captain Jordan Henderson (32), Fabinho (29) and 31-yearold Thiago Alcantara remain first-choice picks in a midfield that is showing its age but Klopp denied he was being too loyal to the old guard. "The problem is too complex. You have a good player who did a lot of good things in the past and then in your mind (you think) maybe that's it for him." said the Liverpool boss, speaking of the need for rejuvenation.

"If you can then go out and bring in another player to replace (him) that makes sense. If you cannot bring anybody in you cannot bring anybody out. That is the situation." Klopp, whose team face Wolves in an FA Cup third-round replay on Tuesday, also rejected the suggestion that longer-serving players had stopped listening to him. "I was not that often in a similar situation but I know exactly how it works when things don't go well," he said. "There is a list of things you go through and one of the things is the players aren't listening to the coach anymore. "In Germany we say the manager doesn't reach the team anymore. So I understand it looks like this sometimes but it is just not the case. You can take that off the list." (AFP)

Small stadiums, high temperatures: what Ronaldo can expect in Saudi

RIYADH, JAN 17 /--/ After lighting up football's biggest stages, Cristiano Ronaldo faces a very different reality in Saudi Arabia with smaller stadiums and less exalted teams -- and some very high temperatures.

Ronaldo, 37, says he's embracing the "challenge" of the Saudi Pro

League, a step into the unknown for a player who is more used to Real Madrid's heaving Santiago Bernabeu stadium or the Dreams" "Theatre Manchester United's Old Trafford. The transition has been eased by the combined 400 million euros he'll receive in wages from his new team, Al Nassr, and a separate payment to act as an ambassador for an expected Saudi World Cup bid, according to sources close to the club. But it will be a big adjustment for the five-time Ballon d'Or winner, who will soon be running out at modest venues including the 6.000-seat Al Batin Stadium. After an exhibition appearance against his great rival Lionel Messi's Paris Saint-Germain in the Saudi capital Riyadh on Thursday, Ronaldo will make his Saudi Pro League debut for Al Nassr on Sunday. The 16-team league will take Ronaldo from Dammam on the Gulf coast to Jeddah on the Red Sea, as well as desert-bound provincial cities

such as Majma'ah and Hofuf, a hub for Saudi Arabia's date industry. While Al Hilal and Al Ittihad, the giants of Saudi football, play in 62,000-capacity home grounds, a handful of Pro League teams have small venues for less than 10,000 fans, and some pitches are surrounded by running tracks. "Sometimes the stadiums are not in the best condition," Moqbel al-Zabni, editor-in-chief of the Al Riyadiah newspaper, told AFP, cautioning that

Although the Pro League's standards cannot match the heights of England, Spain and Italy, where Ronaldo has spent his career so far, it is a competitive division. The Saudi league was launched in 1976 but in the 14 years since the Pro League became the top tier, there have been six different winners. Khalif said the league's "strength and diversity" were comparable to English football, insisting it would be no "walk in the park' for Ronaldo. The Pro League is packed with 128 foreign players from 48 countries, with each team allowed to sign eight. At Al Nassr, coached by Frenchman

Nassr, coached by Frenchman Rudi Garcia, Ronaldo's team-mates include Colombia and ex-Arsenal goalkeeper David Ospina and Brazilian midfielder Luis Gustavo, formerly of Bayern Munich. Ronaldo's first task will be to keep Al Nassr on top of the league and secure their first title in four years. But the other teams will be highly motivated to stop him. "Ronaldo is a legend... and all teams will play to beat Ronaldo," said Khalif.

SAUNAMARA (ODISHA), JAN 17 /--/ In the small village that has given India some of its biggest hockey players, it all starts with sticks made from bamboo or kendu tree. Every evening more than 100 children at Saunamara, a hamlet of little over 2000 tribal inhabitants in Odisha's Sundargarh district, play on a dusty ground, pursuing their dreams of becoming the next Dilip Tirkey, Amit Rohidas or Subhadra Pradhan.

Their fortunes, though, could change soon as an artificial turf will be ready by next month. That means the village, which is located just over 100km from Birsa Munda Stadium, the world's largest all-seater hockey-specific venue in Rourkela, could churn out more international players. Saunamara is now known as the 'Hockey Village' of India as it has given the country former men's team captain and Hockey India

president Tirkey, current national team player Amit Rohidas, India junior team vicecaptain Dipsan Tirkey and ex-India women's skipper Subhadra, among others. This village is part of the Balisankara block of Sundargarh district, which is now considered the cradle of Indian hockey, having given more than 60 national team players, both male and female. "There were no proper hockey ground in my village when I grow up. We had to play wherever we get some space. But now my village is going to have an artificial turf," Tirkey, one of the finest defenders of his time and most capped player for India with 421 matches, told PTI. "I am very happy for the children of my village and, at the same time, feeling proud of the contribution of my village for Indian hockey," said the 45-year-old, who made his India debut in 1995 and retired in 2010,

before becoming HI chief. He said the artificial surface being laid out at his village is a sand-filled turf, which is most appropriate for schools and is a publicly accessible facility, because of its lower cost and multi-functionality. The astro turf used for international matches costs at least Rs 4 crore but the price is lower for sand-filled artificial pitches. The Odisha government has started laying synthetic turfs in all the 17 blocks of the Sundargarh district and some of them are already completed. The laying of the artificial surface at the Saunamara village, with the accompanying field marking, is completed. Only the goal posts are to be erected. It will also have change rooms and other facilities at the front side which will have a proper entrance. (PTI)
