Conviction Under POCSO Act

Port Blair, Jan 11: Yet in another case under POCSO Act, 2012, on 10th January 2022, the Hon'ble Special Judge (POCSO) Shri. Binay Halder, resident of Shaheed Dweep has been convicted for a term of 20 years of rigorous imprisonment together with fine of Rs. 5,00,00/- in default of payment of such fine within 6 months imprisonment.

Flight services top contributor of sharp spike in Covid-19, residents demand reduction in flight frequency



Port Blair, Jan 11: Although the risk of flight transmission of Covid-19 is very low, the official data released by the administration on a daily basis is a clear pointer that air-passengers coming from mainland are the top contributors in the surge in Covid-19 cases in the islands. About 14 flights with over 2000 passengers land in the Port Blair airport on a daily basis. Out of this, RT-PCR tests are conducted on only those passengers who have not received both their doses. Out of the 400 odd passengers who go through the RT-PCR tests, a good number of the passengers are tested positive. In view of the recent surge in Covid-19 cases in the islands and after having detailed information about air passengers, now it is clear that air passengers are the single most contributors in spreading Covid-19 in the islands. Residents now demanded that the flight frequency from the mainland may be reduced to 6-7 flights per day. The administration has already closed down all tourist spots in the islands and restricted all sorts of tourism activities. Since tourism activities have been restricted, there is no point in welcoming tourists from the mainland. Residents also demand that the administration should reduce the flight frequency to 6-7 and only those islands with emergency treatment and those having emergency back in their home in mainland may be allowed to travel by flight. With schools and colleges across the country closed down and online classes on, students studying in mainland are back in their homes at Port Blair and parents have no worries. Reducing the flight frequency will in no way affect their studies. High time, administration work on the options of limiting the flight operation for bringing down the active Covid-19 cases.

ANTCC President suspends six Congress leaders for indiscipline, rude behavior

Port Blair, Jan 11: Sending out a stern message that indiscipline in the party cannot be tolerated, Mr. Rangal Halder, President, Andaman & Nicobar Territorial Congress (ANTCC) suspended six Congress leaders from the primary membership of the Congress party for a period of six years on the charge of indiscipline and rude behaviour with the ANTCC President.



According to a release from the ANTCC office, the ANTCC President suspended the Youth Congress State Vice-President, Miss S. Bindia Banerjee, Youth Congress State General Secretary, Mr. Vikram Mahila Congress NGO Co-ordinator, Mrs. Ruchi Ahuja for six years from the primary membership of the party for indiscipline and misbehavior. In the suspension letter, Mr. Halder accused that these leaders behaved with him in a very rude manner on 8th Jan 2022, and used unparliamentary and filthy language inside his chamber. They also banged the table of ANTCC President. He added that this kind of behaviour cannot be tolerated and doesn't send the right signal to the party cadres.

Hence, he suspended these party leaders for 6 years and warned that if they enter the party office or take part in any party programme during this suspension period, then action will be initiated to expel them from the party forever. Further, he also wrote a letter to Superintendent of Police, South Andaman and intimated him to restrain the outsiders namely Ms. Ruchi Ahuja, Mr. Vikram, Mr. Sonu Raj, Ms. Fareeda Bibi and Ms. Sunita Chhabra from entering the office of ANTCC, Gandhi Bhawan, Port Blair.

Meanwhile, Mr. Santhosh Kumar Kolkunda, National General Secretary, Indian Youth Congress has said that the right of action against Youth Congress leaders rests with the National General Secretary. The ANTCC President cannot send recommendations to the National General Secretary, Youth Congress and based on his recommendation, disciplinary action can be initiated only by the National General Secretary. He said the Youth Congress is a frontal organization of the Congress party and has a system in place for initiating disciplinary action. Any disciplinary action on any member of the Youth Congress has to be initiated according to the prescribed rules and regulations. Indiscipline in the organization cannot be tolerated at any cost, but there is a laid down procedure for initiating disciplinary action, he said.

DSS Vessel Sindhu providing efficient service

Port Blair, Jan 11: The newly inducted passenger-cum-cargo vessel Sindhu of the Directorate of Shipping Services with technical and operational constraints was ineffective in providing passenger services post delivery. The vessel Sindhu had to abandon her maiden voyage to Hut Bay on 25th August 2021 and returned to Port. In order to address the shortcomings which were technical in nature and to improve the operational ability of the vessel, the Directorate of Shipping Services took up strongly with the builder of the vessel M/s. Cochin Shipyard and Ltd and the Technical Consultant M/s. Shipping Corporation of India Ltd. Accordingly the team consisting of experts of Cochin Shipyard Limited, Service Engineers of Kawasaki and Nabtesco and Senior Officer of SCI Ltd along with the officials of Directorate of Shipping Services took up the investigation to find out the cause of such difficulties in operating the vessel. Further technical deficiencies were attended by the respective experts and the vessel undertook long sea trial to different ports in Southern Group of Islands. During the voyage the expert team examined various constraints on the vessel such as Bow Thruster performance, Azimuth Thruster performance, steering at slow speed, visibility from control position in wheelhouse, steering of vessel in 2 knots stem wind condition etc. The expert team made certain suggestion on the above

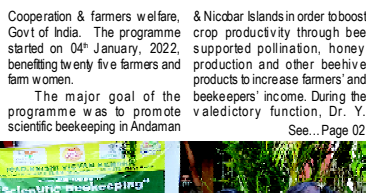

Assam protests

The first day of the 36-hour civil disobedience passed off more or less peacefully with reports of only minor acts of sabotage and sporadic attempts at ticketless travel from different parts of the Brahmaputra valley. About 200 persons were arrested from all over the region. Of these, about 70 were preventive arrests and the remaining for attempting to travel ticketless. The All Assam Students Union and the All Assam Gana Sangram Parishad had given a call for a 36-hour ticketless travel in government buses, trains and ferries, non-payment of entertainment tax in cinema halls and boycott of financial transactions in post offices.

Panel on EVMs

A one-day countrywide general election and introduction of electronic voting machines within three years are among the major recommendations made by an expert panel constituted by the election commission. The six-member panel has also recommended that the chief secretary of a state be its chief electoral officer.

Pope John Paul, breaking a nine-day silence on the crisis in his homeland, said Poles were forced to sign declarations that go against their conscience. "Under the threat of losing jobs, citizens are being forced to sign declarations that go against their conviction," the Polish-born Pontiff said. He added that European and world concern over the situation in Poland was justifiably intense.

Hockey finals

Pakistan and Munich Olympic champions Germany will meet in the finals of the fifth Hockey World Cup. In the semi-finals, Pakistan defeated Netherlands 4-2 while Germany beat Australia 11-8 in the tiebreaker.

Precaution vaccine..

A&N Administration is making sure that inoculation of Healthcare, Frontline Workers & people above 60 with co-morbidities continues without any hiccups for the safety of the eligible beneficiaries. The Govt. of India has already issued guidelines stating that no new registration is required to get a COVID precaution vaccine dose. The Centre has informed that the precautionary vaccine dose will be the same vaccine as

administered previously in the first two doses. Those completed 270 days after the second dose are eligible to receive COVID precautionary vaccine dose. The beneficiaries have to bring an Aadhaar card and second dose certificate copy. The eligible population who have taken two doses of Corona vaccine can directly walk-in to any COVID vaccination centre all over the islands.

COVID-19 status in A&N Isles

Port Blair, Jan 11: During the RT-PCR test conducted on 308 passengers who arrived here yesterday, 73 positive cases have been detected. Yesterday, 13 flights with 1589 passengers arrived, out of which, the RT-PCR test was conducted on 308 passengers (including 13 foreign travelers) and the reports are awaited. During RAT conducted on 57 passengers bound for North & Middle Andaman at Ferrargung, no positive cases have been detected. At Mohanpura Bus Terminus, a test was conducted on 43 passengers and all were found negative. At Phoenix Bay Jetty, 5 passengers were tested with RAT and all were found negative. At Helipad, 07 passengers were tested with RAT and all were found negative. Till 3pm, 276 eligible beneficiaries were vaccinated which include 36 beneficiaries in the age group of 15-18 years.

GOVT OWNING THE MAJORITY STAKE IN VODAFONE IDEA MAY HELP SUSTAINABILITY

Four months after the centre stepped in to offer some relief to the telecom industry, Vodafone Idea has decided to opt for converting the interest on spectrum and adjusted gross revenue (AGR) into equity, a move that will see the government become the largest shareholder in the country's third largest telecom company.

Vodafone Idea, hit by huge AGR dues, high debt and falling customer base, has been looking to raise funds for some time now, but with little success. In September 2021, the government stepped in and announced several measures to help the telecom industry, including a four-year moratorium on dues and rationalisation of the definition of adjusted gross

revenue (AGR). It also gave an option for the companies to convert the interest component into government equity.

In October 2021, Vodafone Idea's board approved the deferment of spectrum auction installments as well as AGR-related dues. The board, which met on Monday, has now approved the conversion of the full amount of such interest related to spectrum auction installments and AGR dues into equity.

The net present value (NPV) of this interest is expected to be about Rs 16,000 crore as per the company's best estimates, subject to confirmation by the DoT. Since the average price of the company's shares at the relevant date of 14.08.2021 was below

par value, the equity shares will be issued to the Government at par value of Rs 10 per share, subject to final confirmation by the DoT, Vodafone Idea said.

The stock had closed at Rs 14.85 on Monday. So, the government is set to get the stake at a discount. Not surprisingly, the shares slumped 20 percent on Tuesday to Rs 11.90.

Following the conversion, it is expected that the government will hold around 35.8 percent of the total outstanding shares of Vodafone Idea. The promoter shareholding will get diluted, with Vodafone Group holding 28.50 percent and Aitya Bria Group holding around 17.8 percent. At the end of September 2021, promoters had held 72.05 percent stake in the company. While the Aitya Bria Group had held 18.48 percent, the foreign shareholding stood at 53.57 percent.

There is no doubt that Vodafone Idea needs funds to survive, make further investments in its infrastructure and also get ready for the upcoming 5G auctions. In the September quarter, the company reported a consolidated net loss of Rs 7,132 crore on revenue of Rs 9,406 crore. Its gross debt as of September 30, 2021 stood at over Rs 1.94 lakh crore.

The move to convert the interest dues into equity will mean lower cash outflows, which could instead be used to augment its network and infrastructure.

The government getting a stake in the company could increase the chance of Vodafone Idea's long-term

survival. However, this will come at the cost of dilution of stake of existing promoters. With the promoters no longer the largest stakeholders, they may not be able to take future decisions on their own. Once the government becomes the largest stakeholder, the restructuring of the board and the Vodafone Idea management will also have to be watched out for.

Vodafone Idea said that the governance and other rights of the promoter shareholders are governed by a Shareholders Agreement (SHA) to which the company is a party and are also incorporated in the Articles of Association of the company. The rights are subject to a minimum qualifying threshold of 21 percent for each promoter group, and in light of the conversion of interest into equity, the promoters have mutually agreed to amend the existing SHA for reducing the minimum qualifying threshold from 21 percent to 13 percent for the purpose of exercising certain governing rights e.g. appointment of directors and relating to appointment of certain key officials etc., it said. Tony Verghese, partner at J. Sagar Associates said that while Vodafone Idea's move to convert its dues into government equity will definitely keep the company afloat for some time, with the current shareholders - Vodafone and Aitya Bria Group - now becoming lesser stakeholders in the company, it needs to be seen how things will improve from the perspective of overall sustainability of business and

expansion.

"It is unlikely that the business will sustain for a long period, unless the government comes out with a definitive plan of reviving the business of Vodafone Idea in consultation with the existing shareholders," added Verghese.

One view in the past has been that Vodafone Idea and BSNL be merged. A Deutsche Bank report had said last year that this was the best option. But, the state-owned BSNL and MTNL already have their own set of challenges.

The government had in the past planned to merge the two companies, but it didn't make much headway. The government had offered a Rs 70,000 crore relief package to the two loss-making telecom companies back in 2019, but that may not be enough, given the telcos would need support towards the rollout of 4G network as also plan for 5G in future. The government is looking to sell non-core assets at BSNL to generate funds. In the longer term, a substantial hike in average revenue per user (ARPU) will be the best way forward for the sustainability of Vodafone Idea and the wider telecom industry, say analysts.

In November 2021, Bharti Airtel, Vodafone Idea and Reliance Jio raised tariffs on prepaid plans by around 20 percent. The full impact of this tariff hike will be visible on the earnings of telecom companies in the Jan-March quarter. But, more price hikes may be needed later this year.

Medical breakthrough! US surgeons successfully transplant pig heart into human patient

London, 11th Jan, 2022: In what is dubbed as a 'first-of-its-kind surgery', the US surgeons have performed a successful transplant of a 'porcine' heart into an adult human with end-stage heart disease.

The 57-year-old Maryland resident with terminal heart disease received a successful transplant of a genetically-modified pig heart and said to be still doing well three days later.

"It was the only currently available option for the patient," the University of Maryland Medicine said on Monday (January 10, 2022) after performing the historic surgery. "This organ transplant demonstrated for the first time that a genetically-modified animal heart can function like a human heart without

immediate rejection by the body," the University said in a statement. The patient, David Bennett, is currently being monitored over the next days and weeks to determine whether the transplant provides lifesaving benefits. He, the University said, had been deemed ineligible for a conventional heart transplant at UMMC as well as at several other leading transplant centres that reviewed his medical records.

"It was either die or do this transplant. I want to live. I know it's a shot in the dark, but it's my last choice," Bennett, who had been hospitalized and bedridden for the past few months, said before the surgery.

Bartley P Griffith, MD, who surgically transplanted the pig

heart, said that this was a breakthrough surgery and brings us one step closer to solving the organ shortage crisis.

"We are proceeding cautiously, but we are also optimistic that this first-in-the-world surgery will provide an important new option for patients in the future," Griffith said.

It is noteworthy that the US Food and Drug Administration had granted emergency authorization for the surgery on New Year's Eve through its expanded access (compassionate use) provision.

It is used when an experimental medical product, in this case, the genetically-modified pig's heart, is the only option available for a patient faced with a serious or life-threatening medical condition.

Covid-19: India's rising cases take a pause after a fortnight India added 1.68 lakh new cases, 277 deaths in past 24 hours

Port Blair, 11th Jan, 2022: After sustained surge over the past few days, India registered a marginal dip in the new cases on Tuesday. Total 1,68,063 new cases were registered in the last 24 hours, lower from 1,79,723 yesterday.

India added 277 fatalities in the last 24 hours ended on 8 am Tuesday. Also, 69,959 people recovered. Notably, the daily cases have been on an upturn

since December 28.

Total 15,79,928 tests were conducted in past 24 hours, higher than previous day's 13,52 lakh. The daily positivity rate, which has been on a rise, took a pause too on Tuesday and recorded at 10.64 per cent against 13.29 per cent yesterday.

The Union Health Ministry data showed country's active case load at 8,21,446 as on Tuesday. India's active case is 2.29 per cent of the

country's total positive cases, while recovery rate stands at 96.36 per cent.

Total fatalities reached 4,84,213 which is 1.35 per cent of the total cases. The weekly positivity rate is reported at 8.85 per cent.

India added 428 new Omicron cases on Tuesday taking the country's tally to 4,461, with 1,711 recoveries.

The nationwide Omicron status shows Maharashtra registered 31

new cases taking the State's tally to 1,247, followed by Rajasthan, with 116 new cases in the past 24 hours taking the State's Omicron tally to 645. Delhi added 33 new cases in 24 hours taking the tally to 546.

Vaccinations - India started administering booster shots (precaution dose) to the frontline and healthcare workers as well as senior citizens from Monday. Total 82.76 lakh doses were administered

on Monday including 9.36 lakh as precaution doses to the eligible target groups. So far, total

152.78 crore doses have been administered since the start of the vaccination drive in January last year.

HOW TO REMAIN YOUTHFUL AND RESILIENT DESPITE STRESS

A bit of stress can be good for your mental and physical wellbeing, but too much can lead to anxiety, depression and other health problems. It can also make you age faster. So learning to become more stress-resistant is important if you're not in a hurry to grow old fast.

Studies have shown that people who aren't good at managing their stress can increase their risk of dying prematurely by 43 percent. The increase in deaths might in part be due to the effect stress has on DNA.

DNA, which is found in nearly every cell (except red blood cells), contains genes that code for the building blocks (proteins) that comprise your body. DNA consists of two strands woven together in the famous "double helix". Your cells are constantly making copies of themselves, and when a cell divides, the two strands unravel and an identical copy is made of each—well, most of the time.

Sometimes mistakes happen during the replication process, especially at the ends of DNA strands. These mistakes can cause mutations in the copied DNA, leading to the cell becoming cancerous. Luckily, cells have protective caps called telomeres at the ends of the DNA strand that are designed to ensure these mistakes don't happen.

Telomeres are like sequences of beads (telomeric repeats). Each time the cell divides, the next generation loses one bead of telomeric repeats. Unfortunately, each cell has a fixed number of these repeats, meaning that it can only replicate a certain number of times before the protective telomeric caps are eroded.

This number of cell divisions is called the Hayflick limit. Once a cell reaches the Hayflick limit (up to 60 cell divisions, for most cells), it self-destructs (safely). This is the essence of ageing.

Some cells in the body, especially the immune cells that fight infection, possess molecules called telomerase. Telomerase

can add the beads back (telomeric repeats) in immune cells (and some others, such as cancerous cells), meaning that ageing can be reversed in these cells. Telomerase can add the beads back, meaning that ageing can be reversed in the cells in question.

This makes sense as immune cells have to replicate many times to fight viruses and bacteria. Without telomerase, they would reach their Hayflick limit and disappear, leaving organisms with no protection. Unfortunately, however, even telomerase stops working properly when people reach their 80s and lose their immune cells to ageing.

It's not all beyond your control



Smoking, excess alcohol consumption, being overweight and stress are all associated with telomere loss. Telomerase does not work as efficiently when a person suffers from excessive stress, and this causes premature ageing.

Adopting a healthy lifestyle, such as eating a plant-based diet, can stop and even reverse the process. And physical activity, especially intense exercise, can also increase telomerase activity. So leading a healthy life can decrease the speed of ageing as can managing your stress.

As we mentioned earlier, not all stress is bad. In psychology, we differentiate between "eustress" (positive stress), which is necessary for us to succeed at work, in sport and in relationships, and "distress" (negative stress), when pressure becomes

too much for us to manage. Distress is what most of us mean when we say or feel that we are stressed; it is also what might speed up ageing in your cells.

So there is no need to protect yourself from all stress, only the distress that lasts for a long time, is relentless and prevents you from living your life to the full.

Embracing stressful events and using coping strategies such as seeking help from friends or becoming resourceful when dealing with challenges, can create stress resilience, which in turn is associated with longer telomeres. Also, reappraising an anxiety-provoking event, such as taking on a public speaking engagement, by perceiving it as exciting can help you to manage stress. These techniques can stop eustress from becoming distress and enhance stress resilience.

Resilience is the ability to bounce back after adversity and become resistant to daily stressors. Besides problem-solving, social support and effective use of coping strategies, mindfulness can also help you become more resistant to daily stressors.

Other techniques include doing things that enhance your positive emotions, such as reading a book, listening to music, or playing a computer game. Experiencing positive emotions broadens your mind, allowing you to perceive and draw from your psychological, intellectual and social resources, especially when experiencing adversity.

We can't yet be sure that these psychological strategies affect telomeres and by extension the ageing process. However, telomere length and telomerase activity in your cells do seem to be negatively affected by stress and positively affected by stress management. So if you have lifestyle changes you can make to help you develop stress resilience, you might want to adopt them. They might not make you live as long as an Arctic shark, but they could add some precious years onto your life.

COVID-19: No 'holy dip' in Ganga on Makar Sankranti

The Uttarakhand government has banned devotees from taking a holy bath in the Ganga on the occasion of Makar Sankranti on January 14 in the wake of an alarming rise in COVID-19 cases in the state.

"The entry of devotees to Har ki Pauri in Haridwar, Triveni ghat in Rishikesh, and other ghats has been banned," said an order issued by Haridwar District Magistrate Vinay Shankar Pandey and Dehradun District Magistrate R. Rajesh Kumar.

The prospect of a third wave of COVID-19 is looming large with an increase in the number of cases, said the order.

On Monday, the government

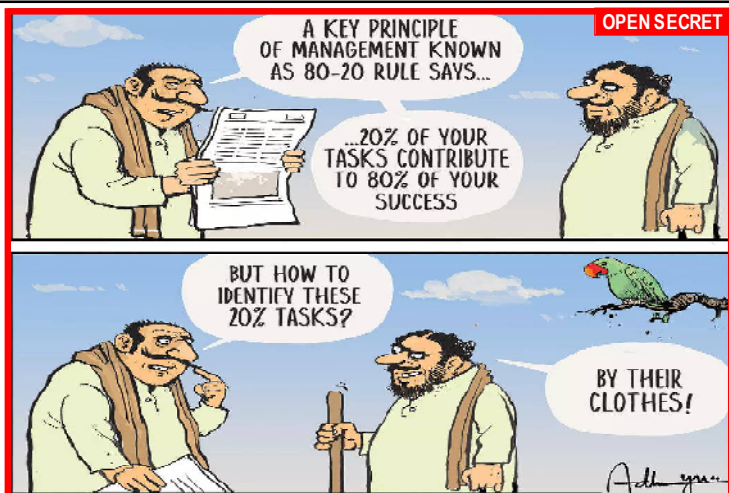

BCCI to earn extra 130 crore after Tata replaces Vivo as IPL title sponsors

NEW DELHI: The Tata Group has replaced Vivo as the title sponsors for IPL. Vivo has terminated its contract with the BCCI and according to the deal document accessed by TOI, the board is expected to earn around Rs 130 crore more from the deal it had with Vivo which was supposed to run till 2023.

The relationship between BCCI and Vivo had hit rough waters in 2020 when the latter decided to opt out of sponsoring the 2020 IPL season in UAE.

With two new IPL teams coming in and the number of matches going up, BCCI was slated to earn Rs 996 crore from Vivo over the next two editions. Vivo had

offered Rs 484 cr and Rs 512 cr instead of Rs 440 cr for the two remaining seasons. Tata has offered

seasons to Rs 1124 cr. The Tata Group also wants to extend the deal to a five-year contract. BCCI is supposed to invite fresh tenders for the title sponsorship for the 2024-28 cycle. However, BCCI will give Tata an option to right to match once the fresh bidding happens in 2024. This will mean Tata will have to match the highest bid to retain IPL's title sponsorship and it will ensure BCCI doesn't miss out on a hefty value.

BCCI, in the past, had a contract with DLF (IPL's first title sponsor) which had a clause that a contract could be extended beyond five years if both parties

BFI relents to reinstate Tokyo-returned men's boxers in national set-up

NEW DELHI: Boxing Federation of India (BFI) on Tuesday paved the way for World Championships silver medalist Amit Panghal and four other men's boxers who participated in Tokyo to return to the national set-up after allowing them to join the elite men's coaching camp, which is currently underway in NIS Patiala.

The boxers have been called to the domestic fold for the first time since they failed Olympic campaign in Tokyo in July-August where none of them could bag a medal, with super heavy weight boxer Satish Kumar (+91kg) being the lone quarterfinalist. The other three who participated in Tokyo included Manish Kaushik (63kg), Vikas Krishan (69kg) and Ashish Kumar (75kg). During this period, all five boxers missed the men's World Championships in Serbia's Belgrade and one-of-national camp in Patiala between December 11

and 24 due to their non-participation in the senior Nationals in Bellary in September last year. Since the men's Nationals was planned just a month after the Tokyo Games, the boxers were either busy attending felicitation functions organised by their respective employers or nursing injuries. When the Sports Authority of India (SAI) announced the dates for the year's first national boxing coaching camp for the elite men, they were communicated to the SAI. It raised quite a few eyebrows after the names of all five Tokyo-returned pugilists didn't find a mention in the list. The names for 79 campers (52 athletes and 27 coaching & support staff personnel) were proposed by the Boxing Federation of India (BFI) for a 71-day camp. Being an important calendar year with the Commonwealth, Asian Games and World Championships lined up, many saw it as an anomaly on the BFI's part to keep these

boxers out of the national set-up. However, BFI secretary general Hemanta Kalita informed TOI on Tuesday that the names of these boxers have been included in the camp and later the SAI also came out with a media release. "Their (Amit Manish, Vikas, Ashish and Satish) names have been included in the camp from today itself and the same has been communicated to the SAI. We had the BFI's Executive Council (EC) meeting yesterday where it was unanimously decided to include their names. The total number of athletes in the camp has gone up to 57 now."

Asked why it wasn't done earlier, Kalita explained: "Previously, we had an EC meeting where everyone unanimously decided to make the Nationals (Bellary, September) participation mandatory for all. It's an important event in the BFI's calendar. Those winning the gold and silver will be included in the camp. Since, all these boxers didn't participate, we excluded their names from the camp. Now that we have allowed everyone to join the camp, it will be mandatory for their part to participate in the next National championships."

Earlier, speaking to TOI on Monday, reigning Asian Games champion Panghal had doubted the BFI's intentions behind leaving them out of the camp. "I don't know why they aren't including my name in the camp. I am fit and ready to join my teammates in Patiala. I fail to understand that despite being part of the Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS) core group and counted among the country's best boxers, the federation has chosen to keep me out of the camp. Just because of one bad performance (in Tokyo) doesn't mean that I have suddenly become unworthy."
