Port Blair, Dec. 21: In a sad incident that happened in Little Andaman Island today, the Onge Tribal Chief, Tai breathed his last after having detained in the Primary Health Centre, Ramakrishnapur for more than ten days. He was around 60 years old and is survived by his wife.

Sources inform that Tai was taken to the Primary Health Centre after he was

When the condition of the tribal chiefstarted deteriorating, it was decided to refer him to the GB Pant Hospital, Port Blair but the decision was too late. People are of the opinion that early diagnosis and refer to the GB Pant through airlift could have saved the Chief's life.

A strategic bulwark

The third India-Central Asia Dialogue convened by External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar on Sunday is one in a series of timely connections to the region by New Delhi this year, spurred in some measure by events in Afghanistan. The dialogue has been held a month before leaders of all five Central Asian Republics (CARs) come to New Delhi as chief guests for the Republic Day celebrations, and a month after National Security Adviser Ajit Doval's "Regional Security Dialogue" with his CAR counterparts to discuss Afghanistan. Among the issues discussed on Sunday were extending "immediate" humanitarian aid to Afghanistan, increasing trade, and improving connectivity. It is significant that the CAR Foreign Ministers chose to come to New Delhi, an indicator that India's outreach to Central Asia, a region neglected by South Block for several decades, is being reciprocated. The joint statement, that they share a "broad regional consensus" on Afghanistan, is apt, given that, like India, all the Central Asian neighbours of Afghanistan worry about the threat of terrorism, radicalisation, narcotics, and refugees. However, unlike India, most of the CARs maintain bilateral talks with the Taliban regime; Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan have reopened missions there. Trade between India and Central Asia has long languished below \$2 billion, with all sides keen to grow this. In addition, India's \$1 billion Line of Credit for projects in Central Asia, and connectivity initiatives such as Chabahar port, the International North-South Transport Corridor and the Turkmenistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan-India gas pipeline were all part of the dialogue.

While the strengthening of India-Central Asia ties and a revival of their traditional, historical and cultural links are much needed, it is also important to recognise the geopolitical cross-currents that complicate such efforts. While Russia continues to wield influence in the CAR governments, China's Belt and Road Initiative and \$100 billion trade (by some estimates) have made it a central figure in the region. The U.S. has also been seeking a foothold in the region, especially after Afghanistan. Meanwhile, India's land connectivity to Central Asia is hampered by Pakistan which is building strong links and transit trade agreements with each of the CARs. The alternative route, via Iran's Chabahar, has received a setback after the Taliban takeover of Kabul, and the development of the Indian-managed Shahid Beheshti terminal there continues to suffer due to the threat of American sanctions. While India has strengthened ties with other parts of Asia, it must now redouble its efforts towards Central Asia if it is to counter the 'Great Game' rivalries playing out in the region, and reclaim its shared history with countries that are an important market, a source for energy, and also a bulwark against the threats of extremism and radicalisation.

Before India gained independence from British rule, Mahatma Gandhi announced that Ram Rajya would be brought once the country was free. Fearlessness, purity of heart, cultivation of spiritual knowledge, charity, self- control, sacrifice, austerity, simplicity, non-violence, truthfulness, freedom from anger, tranquility, aversion to fault finding, compassion for all living beings, freedom from covetousness, gentleness, modesty, steady determination, vigour, forgiveness, fortitude, cleanliness, and freedom from envy and from the passion for honour — these qualities are said to belong to men endowed with a divine nature. On the other hand, hypocrisy, arrogance, self-conceit, harshness, anger and ignorance belong to the one who is born in a demoniacal state. Describing such persons at length, the Gita says: "The demoniacal know not what to do and what to refrain from; neither purity nor right conduct nor truth is found in them." Such persons are filled with insatiable desires and work with impure resolves. Given over to lust and anger, they strive to obtain by unlawful means hoards of wealth for sensual enjoyment. They also make a show of devotion, which is contrary to spiritual principles. No Evidence to Suggest That Existing COVID-19 Vaccines Don't Work on Omicron: Union Health Minister



New Delhi, Dec. 21: There is no evidence to suggest that existing vaccines do not work on Omicron variant of coronavirus, though some of the mutations reported on spike gene may decrease the efficacy of existing vaccines, the Rajya Sabha was informed on Tuesday.

"There are limited available data, and no peerreviewed evidence, on vaccine efficacy or effectiveness to date for Omicron," Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya said in a written reply.

He was responding to a question on whether the vaccinations that are given in the country are effective to develop immunity for this variant. "However, vaccine protection is also by antibodies as well as by cellular immunity, which is expected to be relatively better preserved. Hence vaccines are expected to still offer protection against severe disease and, vaccination with the available vaccines remains crucial," he added.

Listing the steps taken by the Government after the news of the spread of Omicron variant of COVID-19 in various countries, Mr. Mandaviya said his Ministry, on the basis of risk assessment, reviewed the existing travel guidelines and revised rules for international arrivals were issued on November 28 which were further amended two days later. According to the guidelines, regions or countries have been re-classified as 'at-risk' based on epidemiological situation of COVID-19 there and reporting of Omicron variant from these countries. List of such 'at-risk' regions or countries is dynamic in nature and has been updated from time to time. All travellers coming from countries deemed 'at-risk' will also mandatorily undergo COVID-19 testing on arrival through RT-PCR, followed by mandatory home quarantine for 7 days, Mr. Mandaviya

A repeat RT-PCR testing shall also be done on eighth day of arrival in India to be monitored by State health authorities. Two per cent of travellers from 'non-atrisk' countries will be tested at random for COVID-19. Individuals tested positive shall be subjected to Whole Genomic Sequencing at identified INSACOG network laboratories to determine the presence of SARSCoV-2 variants (including Omicron).

States and Union Territories have been asked to undertake several activities which include strict monitoring of international travellers in the community, contact tracing of positive individuals and follow up for 14 days, genome sequencing of positive samples through INSACOG Labs in a prompt manner, Mr. Mandaviya said.

Revert to Night Curfews, **Containment Zones to Combat Omicron: Centre tells States**

New Delhi, Dec. 21: The Union Health Ministry has written to States to impose restrictions such as night curfews and declare containment zones if districts either have a 10% positivity rate or occupancy in oxygen-supported or Intensive Care Units rises to

The Health Secretary's letter said Omicron was at least "three times more transmissible" than the Delta variant and therefore, "greater foresight, data analysis, dynamic decision making and strict & prompt containment action" was required at the local and district level.

So far about 200 cases of COVID's fast-spreading strain Omicron have been confirmed in India, 77 of whom had recovered or migrated, according to the Ministry on Tuesday.

Maharashtra and Delhi have reported the highest number of cases of the new variant at 54 each. They are followed by Telangana (20 cases), Karnataka (19), Rajasthan (18), Kerala (15) and Gujarat (14).

India had reported 5,326 cases of COVID infections over the past 24 hours, the lowest daily case count in 581 days. The total number



of cases reported in the country now stands at 3.48 crore. As per the Ministry bulletin, there are now 79,097 active cases in the country, the lowest in 574 days.

The Centre has specified a multi-point action plan that recommends that States impose night curfew, strictly regulate large gatherings, curtail numbers in marriages and funerals, restrict numbers in offices, industries and public transport.

Where new clusters of COVID-19 positive cases emerged they should be promptly notified as "Containment Zones" and samples from clusters ought to be sent to designated labs for genome sequencing, the said.

Authorities should also be undertaking "right proportion" of RTPCR tests in total tests being conducted daily, contact tracing of all positive persons.

Jammu and Kashmir Delimitation Draft 'Divisive', Says Gupkar Alliance



Jammu, Dec. 21: The People's Alliance for the Gupkar Declaration (PAGD), an amalgam of the regional political parties. on Tuesday described the proposed distribution of seven fresh Assembly seats for Jammu and Kashmir as "divisive, unacceptable" and "with potential to further deepen the alienation among people".

The Gupkar Alliance has called for a "peaceful protest" against the proposed increase of six seats in the Jammu province and one in the Kashmiri division in the Union Territory on January

In a joint statement release on Tuesday evening, the Gupkar Alliance, said, "The leaders of PAGD have unanimously expressed their deep dissatisfaction and shock with regard to recommendations of the Commission. The constitutionality of the Commission under the reorganization act has been challenged in the Supreme Court of India. The recommendations are highly disappointing and divisive and will further disempower the people of Kashmir."

The Commission's recommendations are "unacceptable to the people of the region", the alliance appealed to the people "to remain united and not fall prey to the divisive and disruptive designs of BJP".

"It's unacceptable to all the communities. It will divide the ranks of people and further deepen their alienation," Gupkar Alliance spokesman and CPI(M) leader M.Y. Tarigami said, after the Alliance's meeting in Jammu.

The Alliance meeting was chaired by National Conference president Farooq Abdullah and was also attended by Peoples Democratic Party president Mehbooba Mufti.

Mr. Tarigami said the decisions of the August 5, " which unconstitutional and unilateral" and "without taking stakeholders from J&K and Ladakh onboard", have already been challenged before the Supreme Court by many political parties and individuals.

"Many among us have challenged the J&K Reorganisation Act, under which the delimitation was constituted. The Government of India should have avoided to go forward with this commission in a hurried rush, as it is neither in national interest and not in the interest of people of Jammu and Kashmir," Mr. Tarigami said.

He said the constitutional frame of delimitation, including census, "have been ignored in proposal of delimitation commission".

"The delimitation in J&K should be as per fresh census across country. The criteria of delimitation should have been as per population and followed in letter and spirit." Mr. Tarigami said.

Dr. Abdullah, during the Alliance meeting, expressed his unhappiness over the report, terming it "not as per the wishes and interest of people" and "a step to create wedge on regional and community basis".

Besides the allocation of six seats for the Jammu division and one for the Kashmir division, the commission has also reserved 16 seats, out of 90, for the Schedule Tribes and Schedule Castes.

Nicholas Latifi Speaks Out after Death Threats Following Abu Dhabi Crash

Canadian Nicholas Latifi spoke out on Tuesday after receiving death threats and online abuse over a crash at the Dec. 12 Abu Dhabi Grand Prix that led to Red Bull's Max Verstappen winning the Formula One title and Lewis Hamilton missing out.

The Williams driver brought out the safety carlate in the race, with a change in procedure giving Verstappen the opportunity to pass Mercedes' Hamilton on the last lap.

Before the crash, Hamilton had been heading for a record eighth title.

Latifi said in a statement on his website that he had decided to address the issue of abuse after staying off social media to let things settle down.

He said he hoped to spark another conversation about the "drastic consequences" of online bullying.

"I've received thousands of messages to my social media accounts...most have been supportive, but there's been a lot of hate and abuse, too," said the 26-year-old.

"As we've seen time and time again, across all different sports, it only takes one incident at the wrong time to have things completely blown out of



proportion and bring out the worst in people who are so-called 'fans' of the sport.

"What shocked me was the extreme tone of the hate, abuse, and even the death threats I received."

Latifi said that he had apologised to his team for the crash and that the rest was out of his control. He said that he was no stranger to negative comments about his performances and that having a thick skin was part of being an athlete.

"But many of the comments I received last week crossed the line into something far more

extreme. It concerns me how somebody else might react if this same level of abuse was ever directed at them," he added.

Latifi's situation was similar to that of German Timo Glock in 2008, when the Toyota driver received death threats after being passed by Hamilton on the last corner of the last lap of the final race in Brazil.

Hamilton won that title, his first, with Ferrari's Felipe Massa losing out.

Verstappen spoke out in Latifi's defence last week, saying accidents were just a part of motor racing and it would be unfair to blame the Canadian.

Japan Stun India 5-3 to set up Title Clash against Korea in ACT Hockey

Dhaka, **Dec. 21**: Defending champions and Olympic bronze medal list India suffered a stunning 3-5 defeat against Japan in the second semifinal of the Asian Champions Trophy men's hockey to urnament here on Tuesday.

India were the overwhelming favourites before the start of the match after having thrashed the same opponents 6-0 in their last round robin match and also on head-to-head record, but the Japanese had other plans.

The Japanese looked a completely different side on Tuesday as they toyed with the defence of the Manpreet Singh-led side from the beginning. Japan scored through Shota Yamada (1st minute, penal ty), Raiki F ujishima (2nd minute), Yoshiki Kirishita (14th), Kosei Kawabe (35th) and Ryoma Ooka (41st).




